



PASTOR'S NOTE

June 18 ~ The Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

In today's gospel we see Jesus summoning his disciples in order to send them out in ministry. Jesus issues that same summons to us, his disciples in this time and age. Very simply, he sends us to do the spiritual and corporal works of mercy that we were taught earlier in our lives. They give us a model for how we should treat all others — as if they were Christ in disguise. Jesus attended to the spiritual well-being of those he companioned and ministered to; he also responded to the basic needs of people. Jesus calls you and me to be about these same works now. Through them, God uses us to channel his mercy to others.

Dear Parishioners.

For a parish to flourish, it should stand on 2 solid pillars: the spiritual and the material. The scriptural passage: "if the Lord does not build the house, in vain do its builders labor" (Ps 127:1) can well justify the spiritual pillar of a parish; for a parish to be vibrant, it needs to be a praying community, a spiritual community that puts God at the center of all it does. Thus, regular participation at weekend and (as much as possible) at weekday masses, monthly vespers and benediction, weekly Thursday adoration followed by rosary and benediction, sacramental confession, etc. are some of the spiritual activities that make us grow closer to the Lord, in holiness, and in commitment. Yet, the spiritual pillar alone cannot make a parish stand and flourish. The material pillar is equally important and necessary.


There is no doubt that without sufficient financial support, a parish cannot flourish. Bills (power, heating gas/oil, communication), maintenance of buildings, employees' salaries, room and board, etc., are some of the areas that require money. As it is, for the past 2 years, our parish (though not drowning), has not done well financially. Last year, our parish incurred a deficit of \$24,801. This year, as of April 2023, she runs a deficit of \$15,703. The amount of money coming in weekly, so far, cannot support the needs of the parish. I want this beautiful parish to flourish (and surely so do you), but I can't do it alone. I need your support. According to financial experts of the archdiocese, without an increase in offertory, we will run at a loss yet next year. It is not a crisis; this can be fixed, and it can only be done by EACH and EVERY parishioner of Ste. Anne. For our next year budget (income and expenditure) to be even, an increase in offertory of 23% higher is necessary. Thus, I want to invite and earnestly plead with everyone to prepare your minds to this increase in your weekly tithe. I believe in you; together we can do that.

I am working with the finance committee and the archdiocese to come out with a plan that will help us with a twofold goal: increasing the number of volunteers, as well as increasing tithing (donation to the church). As soon as the program is ready, we will unfold it to the entire community. Also, online donation is very much encouraged; this is helpful and easier as, even if you were to go away on vacation, your financial support to your parish will be ongoing.

Dear parishioners, we are all members of Ste. Anne church and if one member fails to be active, the whole body will be negatively affected. On the other hand, if each and every one puts in more effort and actively participates in the life of the parish, we will do miracles. I find the following words by Viktor Frankl inspiring as we look to being more involved in our parish, both spiritually and materially: "If I don't do it, who will do it? And if I don't do it right now, when should I do it? But if I do it for my own sake only, what am I?"

Thanks for all you have been doing for our beloved parish and God bless you!

Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

In the backyard of the house where I live with other priests, there is a lemon tree which produces a huge amount of fruit. One evening in the spring I needed some lemons for a chicken dish. I glanced from the kitchen and saw the tree bursting with large, bright, gorgeous lemons, hanging thick on seemingly every branch. Turning to Fr. Bob (I'll change his name to protect the innocent) who sat on the couch, I said, "Father, could you pick a few lemons for me?" He said sure and into the backyard he went. He returned a few minutes later emptyhanded. "John, there's no lemons. Sorry." I said, "What are you talking about?" I looked again and saw the grapefruit tree on the other side of the yard, which had recently been picked clean of fruit. He didn't see the abundant fruit because he was looking in the wrong place!

Like Fr. Bob, we sadly don't see the fruit all around us. We think that the culture is spiraling down, young people avoid church, and the future looks bleak. Why go out into the world and work? The world looks like a fruitless tree.

Jesus doesn't see things that way. This week he tells us, "The harvest is abundant, but the laborers are few." Look again: there is spiritual fruit hanging all around us! The lonely ready to be visited. The sick ready to be healed. The forgotten ready to be remembered. The poor ready to be treated with dignity. The sad ready to be consoled. The young ready for the Gospel. So, let's ask the Lord to send laborers to get to work. And he will. He might send you and me. Just remember to look at the correct trees. — Father John Muir

What does it mean to be God's "special possession"? Our world is dominated by things, objects, possessions. To say we are a materialistic culture is an understatement. In that context, it can be really hard to fully appreciate the meaning of being "possessed" by God. I have so many possessions, after all. I acquire and discard them without thought. I am even overwhelmed by them. Sometimes, it feels like they possess me.

But then I think of the week after Christmas in a house with small children. In that week, there is always The Toy. 
Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament
