Before beginning each lesson, set up the "lesson space" so that your child understands that this is a time to focus. Some parents light a candle as a reminder that Jesus is always present, especially "when two or three are gathered" in His Name! Make this a quiet time with few distractions. This initiation into the sacraments of Reconciliation and Holy Communion should be a reverent and joyful time of anticipation.

Communion Attire!


It's time to shop for your son's suit or your daughter's First Communion dress, and this often brings up a lot of questions. What are the rules? Or, why are there rules?

First Holy Communion is a sacred occasion, making modesty of paramount importance. In addition, the focus should be on the sacrament, keeping the other matters of personal appearance, the party, and the presents in their place.

We have heard from many parish coordinators and catechists over the years who have wondered about the choices in attire for this occasion, as they can be distracting. For this reason, please consider shoes and clothing that are comfortable, modest, and do not need constant attention or adjustment.

Simply put, First Communion is a holy time and Communion attire should reflect this:

- Boys should be dressed in formal attire; think family wedding, where a tie would be expected. A white or black suit is appropriate but not required. As a rule, boys should at least have a white shirt, dark pants, and a tie. No gym shoes!
- For girls, modesty and age-appropriateness are key.
 - White dresses are almost always worn for First Communion, but not required.
 - Shoulders should be covered, and dresses should be at least knee length.
 - Veils are not required, but may be worn. Tiaras are discouraged, as these tend to be a distraction. Wreaths of flowers or bows are acceptable.



What should my child know in order to receive First Holy Communion?

The guidelines from the Diocese provide an outline of what students should KNOW, and what families should be doing in order for students to be ready for the sacrament.

Families should be:

- witnessing to the faith
- attending Mass weekly and on holy days
- praying daily
- learning the teachings of the Church
- growing in their desire for relationship with Christ
- using the Sacrament of Reconciliation

Students should:

- know what sin is, understand the difference between right and wrong
- have a grasp of what God's mercy means
- have a desire to receive Jesus in the Eucharist
- understand that the bread and wine become Jesus' Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity
- understand the different parts of the Mass, and the vestments and vessels used
- know how to pray at least these prayers -
 - Sign of the Cross
 - Our Father
 - Hail Mary
 - Glory Be
 - Act of Contrition
 - Spiritual Communion
 - Mass responses
- Have some familiarity with the saints, especially these six:
 - St. Augustine Patron of the Diocese
 - St. Tarcisius Patron of First Communicants
 - o Blessed Imelda Patron of First Communicants
 - St. John Vianney Patron of Parish Priests
 - St. John Nepomucene Patron of Confessors
 - o St. Ignatius of Antioch Patron of the Middle East Church
