A WORD FROM FR MIKE

The Assumption of Mary into heaven is one of the oldest celebrations of Mary. It is easily traced back to at least the 5th century and some historians say it was celebrated as far back as the 3rd century or before. Yet it was not an official feast of the church until 1950 when Pope Pius XII announced it as divinely revealed dogma in the Bull Munificentissimus Deus.

Some people have a problem with it because they question whether it is scripturally based. Intuitively, we can think of it as the fulfillment of the Bible's deepest themes of God's promise to bring all to Him. As Paul tells us today each of us will be brought to life in Christ in our proper time.

Mary is our true model of holiness. In obscurity of faith, Mary accepts God's plan (Lk 1:26-38). Mary gives us Jesus (Lk 2:6-7). Mary is filled with Jesus and brings him to others (Lk 1:41). Mary accepts and lives the prophecy of the sword (Lk 11:27-28). Mary listens to God's word and puts it into practice (Lk 1:27-28). Mary lives both the intimacy and the hiddenness of Nazareth (Lk 2:51). At Cana, Mary hastens Christ's manifestation, begins her mediation with Him and shows us the way to salvation: "Do whatever He tells you" (Jn 2:5). Mary fulfills in herself the evangelical beatitudes of humility, meekness, mercy, sorrowing and single-heartedness (Mt 5:1-11). Mary participates in the redemptive passion of her Son (Jn 19:25). Mary stands beneath the Cross (Jn 19:25). Mary accepts the motherhood of all humanity (Jn 19:27). In prayer and total availability, Mary is receptive to the Holy Spirit (Acts 1:2). Mary lives in herself the full realization of the plan of salvation, that is, the participation in God's life, in joy and light. Reflecting on Mary and her Assumption gives us great hope that God's promises will be fulfilled for us in their time. Mary was fully human like us, yet because of her grace and holiness she has been able to realize God's promise of the destiny of redeemed humanity immediately. She witnesses to the future that is open to every human to share in the inheritance of the holy ones in light (Col 1:12).

Mary is available to us. We can ask her for the grace to help us overcome our temptations. She knows the Father's plans and she can help us in discerning His plans for us. She will assist us on our journey toward heaven. O Immaculate Heart of Mary, true model of every holiness; give us trust to become saints.

What Would Mary Do?

I would argue that Mary was the most exemplary steward who ever lived. Her answer was always "Yes." Yes, Lord, I am Your handmaiden. Yes, I will visit Elizabeth, and help her in the last difficult months of pregnancy. Yes, I will bring my son up in the Mosaic law and present him at the Temple of Jerusalem. Yes, I will give him to the crowds and to public ministry. Yes, I will offer him on this Cross, if it is Your will.
