#### Dear Parishioners,

Fear is one of the most common of all emotions. We all fall into its grasp from time to time. It can be very real and even cause us to freeze up and not act as we should. The disciples certainly experienced this when Christ appeared in their midst as they were listening to the two disciples [recount] what had taken place on the way.

The risen Christ came, offering them reassurance and peace. It is one thing to hear a story about Christ's post-resurrection appearance, it is another to see it with your own eyes. The evangelist does not hold back in describing their fear – even their incredulity. They see Jesus but they immediately think it might be a ghost or a hallucination.

But Jesus will not allow that fear to have the last word. Reassuring them of his real, actual presence, he proves it by the most common of all actions: He invites them to look at his hands and feet, and to touch him so they will sense the reality of flesh and bones, which a ghost does not have. And then eats in front of them – something else a ghost would not do. But more than just ameliorating the disciples' fear, Jesus presence has a triple purpose: to prove his resurrection, to help them understand the fulfilled Scriptures, and to prepare them for their mission before the world.

Jesus calls them witnesses – martyrs in Greek – disciples who give all to proclaim the risen Christ. Peter becomes one of the great examples of this change. In our first reading, we saw a different Peter from the Good Friday man who denied Jesus three times. Filled with the truth of the Resurrection and the power of the Spirit, he is the very opposite of fearful. Now he has the courage to stand before those who condemned Jesus – to proclaim him as the fulfillment of the prophetic promises and to call all to repentance. Saint John matches this powerful message with a reminder to his community of the immensity of Jesus' forgiveness.

So, what about us? It is easy in our broken humanity to allow fear and doubt to control us.

Yet they must never have the last word: Christ always finds a way to reassure us of the truth and reality of the Resurrection, and its offer of life. As believers, we find that reassurance in the sacramental and liturgical life of the Church where the Scriptures are proclaimed and the Spirit is at work. Here we encounter Christ. Here he takes away our fears and doubts and frees us to go out and share the Good News.

I have tried to proclaim that Good News to the best of my ability in the last 26 years of my priesthood. I do hope and pray that the Lord, and you all will help me to proclaim that Good news here at St. Anthony Parish for many years to come. My wish is that of a community that we have heard so often in the Easter readings of the Acts of the Apostles: "The community of believers was of one heart and mind".

### Third Sunday of Easter

Acts 5:27-32, 40b-41 | Rev 5:11-14 | Jn 21:1-19 or 21:1-14

#### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

The accounts of Jesus' appearances to the disciples after his resurrection often puzzle me, and today's reading is no exception. There stands Jesus, within sight, yet the Apostles "did not realize that it was Jesus." Hello?! I know we're in the midst of a daylight saving time debate, but I'm fairly sure "dawn" meant the sun was up. Yet as soon as Jesus speaks and they follow his instructions, they realize he is their Lord. Simon Peter wastes no time; he dives into the sea and makes for the shore. Peter and the disciples show us that while it is important to recognize Jesus, it's what we do next that matters. As we learn in Acts, they boldly say his name despite the Sanhedrin's warning, and most will go on to be martyred for the Church. Thanks to them, we recognize Jesus - in the Eucharist, in Scripture, and in Tradition, and on the crucifixes in our homes and churches. Peter challenges us to "dive in," moving from faith to action. The specifics will differ for each of us, but we can study the lives of the Apostles and the saints to find inspiration.

#### GO EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Is it a Catholic thing or the fact that I'm a closet introvert? I sometimes struggle with talking about Jesus. Which is why today's reading from Acts challenges me. The Sanhedrin had warned the Apostles not to even speak Jesus' name. Yet they don't cower in fear or simply go back to the relatively quiet lives they led before they met Jesus. They rejoice to be found worthy "to suffer dishonor for the sake of [Jesus'] name." Their commitment challenges us to be bold – not only with our words but with our actions as well. In the same way that teaching another person math or spelling helps us learn, witnessing to our faith by sharing it with others helps us deepen our faith and answer God's call to be his disciple, striving to build his kingdom on earth.

**STUDY** This week, look up the feast days and read about the saint of the day. What can we learn from their example?



#### Feast on the Beach

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Acts 5:27-32, 40b-41 Disciples' second trial before the Sanhedrin
- ► Revelation 5:11-14 Praise to the lamb
- ▶ John 21:1-19 or 21:1-14 Appearance at the Sea of Tiberias

As usual in the Gospel stories, Jesus meets people where they are at, busily going about their daily lives. In this story, sometime after Jesus' resurrection, the disciples are back working at their profession-fishing. They have a rough night and come up empty, without any fish to eat or sell for their living. Then, as in a previous story in the Gospel of Luke, Jesus asks them to try again, and suddenly their catch is so big they can barely bring it all to shore. At that point, the beloved disciple recognizes it is Jesus on the shore, and he has a breakfast feast ready for them. Interestingly, even though Jesus could have provided everything for this wonderful meal on the beach after a long, hard night of work, he asks them to contribute to the meal by sharing some of the fish they just caught.

Jesus doesn't just give in one direction. He wants the relationship to go both ways-with each party sharing something with the others. How many times have we given something to a friend or loved one only to have them give us something in return? Or perhaps when we thought we were "serving" the less fortunate, we discovered their desire to serve us or give something to us in return. We can probably all recognize the uncomfortable feeling of inequality or a power differential when someone from


"above" gives something to someone "below" who can't return the favor. Jesus seems to understand this. We will never be equal to him, but he still wants us



to contribute what we can in the relationship so that there is some mutuality.

So it was with the disciples that morning when they had breakfast together on the beach. Jesus provided some of the food, and they provided some of it. Later, the conversation turned to what Jesus asked Peter to do for him. After all that time of Jesus doing things for the apostles, now comes the time when Jesus wants Peter to rise to the occasion and start doing the same for others by feeding and tending his sheep.

#### GOD'S OVERFLOWING KINDNESS


The superabundance of God's kindness ties all of today's readings together. Especially when life overwhelms us, the Lord provides all we need, and then some. In the Acts of the Apostles, Peter takes the lead when facing the Sanhedrin. We might expect the man who denied Jesus to crumble under the imposing glare of the high priest. Instead, the Holy Spirit helps him testify to his faith in Jesus Christ. What Peter had lacked before, courage and conviction, God provides in abundance. Similarly, today's Gospel shows Jesus providing a surplus of fish for the disciples. They have no luck fishing until the Lord intercedes. Jesus supplies an almost ridiculous number of fish, and he cooks it for them, too. As our reading from Revelation affirms, the overflowing riches of God require constant praise. #### **2022 Mass Intention Book**

The 2022 Mass Intention Book is now available to accept requests for prayer intentions. *Just a few reminders*:

- A \$10 stipend (offering), as determined by diocesan policy, is requested for each Mass intention.
- Mass intentions must be paid BEFORE the day the Mass is said
- You are permitted to put down up to TWO individual names per intention.
- There is availability for ONE intention per Mass time.
- Please be mindful of others who are trying to reserve Mass intentions. We, therefore, ask you to practice prudence in reserving your Masses, being mindful that others may have the same date in mind.
- Intentions cannot be made on Holy Days and some parish feasts days as these are Masses that are offered 'Pro Populo' (for the people of the parish).
- You may submit your Mass request by mail, drop it off in person, or drop it in the collection basket.

A request may be made for: a person who is living, a person who is deceased, members of a family, in Thanksgiving, etc.

#### YOUTH MINISTRY

#### A Right and Just Man

Saint Joseph is a strong example of the virtues of faith, hope, and love. Faith is the strong, abiding trust that God is actively working on our behalf. It is relying on God and admitting our human weakness. St. Joseph shows us how to take the gift of faith we've been given, however small, and increase it by walking step by step with our Lord. When St. Joseph realized Mary was pregnant with a child that wasn't his, he had faith that God would see them through. In the midst of the most confusing and terrifying time, Joseph was able to look back into the eyes of the woman God had entrusted to his keeping and be reminded of his purpose to be a man of God.

Hope is the ability to cast aside fear, doubt, and anxiety of the present moment and recognize that whatever storm you are walking through is not the end of the story, and in fact, that storm may be the very thing God is using to save and change your life. It is not wishful thinking; it is assured confidence in the providence of God. Before, during, and after the birth of Jesus, St. Joseph held onto the hope that no matter the circumstances or darkness laid ahead, God had not and would not abandon them. When Herod gives the order to slaughter all male children under the age of two in Bethlehem, God tells Joseph in a dream to immediately flee Egypt. Joseph must have been terrified at the thought of leaving in the middle of the night to a strange land - Joseph had to cling to hope and not be discouraged by despair. He had to have hope that God would provide for him and his family in a new and foreign land.

Love is seeking and willing the good of others, rather than ourselves. Love puts others first. Love does not chase after its own desires, but sacrifices so the desires of others might be fulfilled. In every moment of his life, St. Joseph lived and breathed a deep and abiding love for Mary. This high, holy, and chaste love allowed Joseph to fully give himself without expecting anything in return, or to fulfill a desire of his own. He loved God loves and was therefore, the perfect foster father for Jesus, and for us.






# Middle School Ministry: 6th - 8th grade youth
