

Dear Parishioners,

Today's Scriptures contain several challenges that deserve our attention as we grow in our identity as faithful disciples. Key among them must be the call to love our neighbor and to be perfect and holy as God is perfect and holy.

Taken from Matthew's Sermon on the Mount, today's Gospel demonstrates that this call is lived out in the events of our daily lives. In reading this Gospel, it is hard not to be reminded of *Les Misérables* by Victor Hugo. Early on in the story, Jean Valjean, the lovable scoundrel, is arrested for stealing silver from the house of the local bishop. What makes the crime so foolhardy is that Jean had been taken in by the bishop when others had rejected him because of his criminal background.

As he stands before the bishop, the inevitability of prison faces him. But there's a twist: **The bishop doesn't condemn him; instead, he points out that Jean Valjean has forgotten to take the matching candlesticks**. Of course, this is not what the police expected and, in the end, they have to release Jean. Unable to understand what has happened he remains silent, while the bishop quietly remarks: "Today I have bought your soul for God, use this treasure to become an honest and upright man." Clearly, the bishop is not preoccupied with the things of this world. His focus is on those in need, those he can help and serve. **He sees the potential in Jean Valjean, not simply the past.**

As Christians, we glimpse the very nature of God in Christ. He brings us the gifts of perfection, mercy, and holiness. To share in his life is to share in those gifts and to make a public statement that God's standards are our standards; his goals are our goals. Therefore, if he comes with these divine attributes, they should be part of our lives too. If we truly believe in the kingdom of God, then all that Jesus teaches should be visible in our lives.

As we move into Lent this week, our common task is to see if we really do reflect Christ's Gospel. Remember that holiness and mercy are not simply pious words that fade like incense or that come and go like a summer breeze. True holiness and mercy are witnessed in serving those in need – those who suffer or who need that extra help through the obstacles of life, having a true heart for all who find life burdensome, and seeing the potential in others rather than their past.

True holiness is more than just striving after a state of moral innocence or spiritual perfection. It begins there, but it cannot end there – it always has a practical side to it. It takes us above and beyond what is acceptable behavior for everyone else.

Jean Valjean wondered to himself where the saintly bishop learned his compassion and forgiveness. His answer was the Gospel – the word and example proclaimed by Christ. We know it too. And we give thanks for it.





Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

Lv 19:1-2, 17-18 | 1 Cor 3:16-23 | Mt 5:38-48

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Today is the last Sunday in Ordinary Time before Lent begins. I realize in saying it that way, however, it sounds like a warning ("the bookstore will be closing in five minutes, please bring your purchases to the register!") rather than an acknowledgement of the celebration that it is. So let me put it another way: Today is the 7th - of 33 - Sundays in Ordinary Time this year, which means, we've only just begun. We are in some of the earliest days of the Church's "ordered" (ordinary/numbered) approach to helping us mature and grow in faith. We do this by living with and in the life of Christ over the course of a year. At each step we celebrate the life, passion, death, and resurrection of Christ, but we also set aside different seasons to focus on those specific elements. And so it makes sense that as we approach Lent, we hear more about what exactly God asks of us. Lent will be a season of preparation for Christ's passion; have we prepared our hearts accordingly to receive him? Today's readings remind us of what sets us back: hatred for others; desire for revenge; grudges; worldly wisdom; all things which are destructive of God's temple - our souls, as Saint Paul says. Having a heart full of these things means there is no room for love, which means there is no room for Christ. Let us pray for God's help in ridding ourselves of all that is destructive, and for the strength to grow a heart only for him.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I'd argue that in some ways, Lent actually starts before Ash Wednesday since it requires forethought and planning. We have to prepare for a season of preparation! We have to figure out what to fast from or add to our spiritual lives, and how we might specifically direct our almsgiving. But how ready are we to respond in a meaningful way to the fact that Christ died for love of us? His death transformed our death into the promise of eternal life. Today's Gospel offers practical actions, things which all Christians should strive for daily, but especially observe during Lent if a spiritual reset is needed. Jesus tells us to turn the other cheek. Hand over your cloak. Go the extra mile: "Give to the one who asks of you, and do not turn your back on one who wants to borrow." Love your enemies and pray for your persecutors. Lent is a call to act out of love, especially in tough situations. Take these next couple of days to prepare for Ash Wednesday and the weeks that follow.

REFLECT Spend some time taking stock of your spiritual life. Are you holding contempt for someone, or seeking revenge for something? Where might you be falling short in striving to imitate Christ? Bring these thoughts to God in prayer.




CALLING ALL MUSICIANS AND SINGERS
