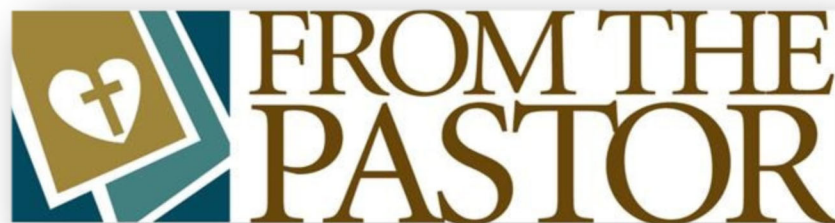

Dear Parishioners,

On this third Sunday of Easter, we continue to celebrate in a more pronounced way the power and meaning of the Resurrection. Luke and Peter, whose words we hear today, were witnesses to the Resurrection and had interactions with the risen Christ. They were among the first to grapple with what it all meant and to share its Good News. We are recipients of that Good News and come together in worship – to be glad and rejoice in it.

Just as we return to their texts today, Luke and Peter turned to the most sacred texts of their time to make meaning of the Resurrection. As we still do, they sang the ancient psalms of David: My heart has been glad and my tongue has exulted ... because you will not abandon my soul to the netherworld, nor will you suffer your holy one to see corruption. A thousand years after King David, this verse was sung anew by the disciples who witnessed the Resurrection. After their experience of Jesus and the first Easter, they found new meaning in these ancient lines about salvation.

Prior to Jesus, this psalm was sung in joyful anticipation of a king like David to restore his powerful throne. God's people would triumph, saved from corruption and the netherworld, through this mighty and regal descent. But when judges, prophets, and kings [like David] failed to turn his people from sin and its destruction, and bring them to repentance, God sent his only Son as priest, prophet, and king. He would reconcile us to the Father and would save our souls not through silver or gold but by his own precious blood.

It was difficult for the disciples to understand all the events surrounding Jesus. Cleopas and his companion were debating all that had happened as they walked to Emmaus. It was not until a traveling companion interpreted Scripture for them and broke bread with them that they saw Jesus and comprehended how he had fulfilled the Scriptures.

Fulfillment in Christ was known by God before the foundation of the world, Peter tells us. Salvation through Christ's sacrificial love poured forth was always the plan. The world was founded on it, the disciples witnessed it, and we are all redeemed by it. This is what we continue to celebrate this Easter season: God's love and mercy from the foundation of the world through Christ, broken and shared for us. Let us be glad and rejoice!

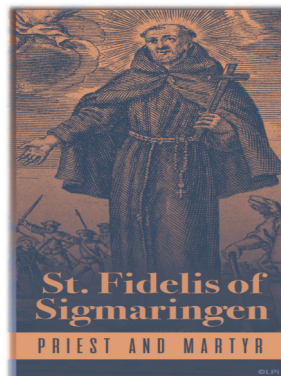

### GROW AS A DISCIPLE

PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

The two disciples had every reason and opportunity to see that it was Jesus walking beside them. They knew that the tomb was empty and the women who had discovered it had relayed what the angel had told them: Jesus was alive. It had only been three days since he had died. Yet, even as he was in their midst, the two disciples' *eyes were prevented from recognizing* it was Jesus. Only when he broke bread with them did they perceive and understand. Jesus walks beside us as well, but perhaps our eyes, like those of the two disciples, are prevented from recognizing him. What clouds our vision? It could be fear, doubt, despair, as on that road to Emmaus. Or maybe it is pride or hardness of heart. Like the early disciples, we must speak to Jesus, and tell him our story. Jesus comes to meet us, and we in turn have an opportunity to encounter him in many ways, most particularly in the breaking of the bread – the Eucharist. No matter how frantic or chaotic our lives may have become, attending Mass serves as an anchor, and a reminder of Jesus' presence with us every day.

### GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

It took them a minute to "get it," but once the disciples recognized Jesus they didn't hesitate. They made a hasty return to Jerusalem to share the news with the other disciples: "The Lord has truly been raised and has appeared to Simon!" Having encountered Jesus in the breaking of the bread, they felt compelled to share the Good News of his resurrection with others. As Catholics, we can ask the Lord for eyes to see Jesus in our daily lives and especially at Mass. Nourished by the Eucharist, we can share our love for Jesus and our hope in the resurrection with others we encounter. Wherever we are and whatever we do, we can rest assured that Jesus walks alongside us.

**PRAY** Pray with the psalmist: "Lord, you will show us the path of life."



## Burning Heart Moments

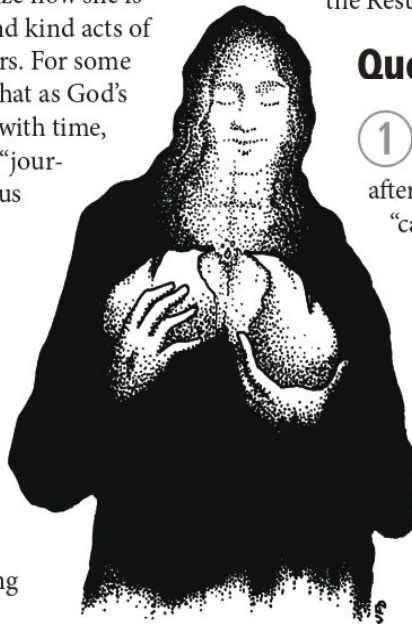
*This Week's Readings at Mass*

- Acts 2:14, 22-33 • Peter's discourse
- 1 Peter 1:17-21 • Filial obedience
- Luke 24:13-35 • The Road to Emmaus

The chosen readings continue to follow a pattern through this Easter season. The first reading is a speech given by Peter in the Acts of the Apostles soon after the Resurrection. He is speaking to a crowd of Jews, connecting the dots for them between King David and Jesus. He explains that David's statement of faith—"you will not abandon my soul to the netherworld, nor will you suffer your holy one to see corruption"—was a prophecy of Jesus' resurrection. The Gospel tells the story of another appearance of the risen Jesus to his friends.

Luke gives us a beautiful story of a common Christian shared experience: having Jesus present with us in a time sadness or distress but not recognizing him at the moment. We might wonder why "their eyes were kept from recognizing him." We have probably also had experiences where Jesus' presence was clear to us even if it wasn't clear to others. For example, we might know someone whose spouse has died. In her grief she might feel entirely abandoned by God. From the outside, though, we can see how lovingly God is still caring for her. We can recognize how she is surrounded by the compassionate and kind acts of her friends and other family members. For some reason, she simply can't experience that as God's presence at the moment. Hopefully, with time, she will be able to look back on that "journey to Emmaus" and realize how Jesus was present with her.

The experience of not recognizing Jesus at the moment happens in good times too. Unfortunately, we don't always associate our "burning heart moments" with Jesus. St. Ignatius taught that the more we can pay attention to the movements of our hearts, the more we can discern how God is present to us and what God is inviting

us to in the moment. For example, when considering a job change, or deepening a relationship, or taking up some new endeavor, if we feel "our hearts burning within us" that is a sign of Jesus' presence. Ignatius taught that, as in Luke's story, it helps to share these burning heart moments with someone else rather than keep them to ourselves. Another person can strengthen and validate our experience, share in our joy, and accompany us on the road *back* toward the Resurrection, not away from it.

### Questions of the Week

- 1 Share about a time when you realized Jesus' presence with you after the fact, even though you didn't "catch" it at the time.
- 2 When have you had a burning heart moment that clued you in to something important in your life?



## SAFE ENVIRONMENT TRAINING AND RENEWAL

Safe Environment Training is mandatory for diocesan clergy, employees and **active volunteers** working with youth or vulnerable adults. **Safe Environment Training must be completed during the employee onboarding process or prior to volunteer participation. Training must be renewed every three (3) years** thereafter for all clergy, employees and active volunteers. The VIRTUS® online training course – Protecting God's Children – provides flexible accessibility and is available in English, Spanish, Vietnamese and Korean languages.

**Volunteers and employees who serve in Homebound Ministries, bringing the Eucharist to the sick, or serve with vulnerable adults are required to take the combined training course – Protecting God's Children & Vulnerable Adults – which incorporates the Protecting God's Children training material.**

## ST. ANTHONY PARISH'S DIAPERS AND WIPES DRIVE

In the United States, 1 in 3 families struggle to provide enough diapers for their children; often parents have to decide whether to feed their family or buy diapers. But babies who are left in a dirty diaper for too long can suffer from diaper rash, infections, and, in some severe cases, kidney damage. Soiled diapers can also lead to prolonged crying and poor sleep. The impact can be devastating to children and their parents. So, how can you help?

Over this weekend and the next, Outreach will be holding a Diapers and Wipes Drive for the very low-income families served by St. Joseph Family Center. Please leave packages of diapers and wipes in the box provided in the vestibule, or, at Saturday Masses, you may give them to Maria Gardner. The Center will appreciate receiving ANY diaper sizes, but especially requests sizes 4, 5 and 6 since children wear them over the course of many more months.

Donations of feminine hygiene supplies are needed too. Research found that almost two-thirds of low-income women in the U.S. could not afford such products at some time in the prior year, while nearly half sometimes had to choose between buying them or food. Your donation will help alleviate the mental and physical health problems, as well as social stigma and exclusion, caused by the lack of these supplies.

## Mass Intentions

**Do you love someone?** When we love another person, we TALK to the one we love, and we LISTEN very carefully to the response from our beloved. We listen carefully because what this person says is VERY important to us. By talking and listening we learn more about our beloved. In Christianity, that loving dialogue between the lover and the loved is called **PRAYER**.

Prayer is extremely simple: it is just communication with God, conversation with God. **One simply cannot be a Christian without prayer**, any more than one can be a Christian without **faith, hope or love**. What communication is to our friendships or marriage relationship with our spouse, **prayer is to our relationship with God**. If we say we love God but do not pray, we lie. For love is intimacy, and intimacy is communication, and communication with God is prayer.

If God is necessary, prayer is necessary, for **prayer is our spiritual lifeline to God**. In prayer, we “**plug in to God**”, the source of all good; we “**charge our spiritual batteries**”, we feed our souls. Without prayer our souls starve.

**The highest form of Christian prayer is the Mass.** Why? Because at Mass we meet and receive our Eucharistic Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. As the Catechism states, “*The Eucharist...is the culmination both of God's action in sanctifying the world in Christ and of the worship men offer to Christ and through Him to the Father in the Holy Spirit*”. (CCC 1325) **At Mass, we join ourselves to the perfect prayer and offering of Jesus to the Father in the Spirit!** By receiving Jesus in Word and Sacrament we become what we consume.....”**living images of Christ**”. Fed on His Body and Blood, we depart from Mass to go and **TRANSFORM THE WORLD by our LOVE**.

Now, back to my initial question – Do you love someone? I presume that your answer is “**yes**”, thus, my next question is, “**When is the last time that you had a Mass said for your beloved (living or deceased) spouse, children, parents, friends, or enemies?**” Everyone needs prayer. There are NO exceptions. **If you are not prayerfully interceding for the persons that God has surrounded you with, who will?**

Do you know of someone who is unemployed, lonely, sick, facing death, deceased, bitter, an atheist, an enemy.....**THEN PRAY FOR THEM** and remember that **your gift of the Sacrifice of the Mass is the greatest gift of LOVE that you could ever give another person.**
