

Dear Parishioners,

When learning a new sport, it is vital to know the rules. Basketball players cannot kick the ball, but they can pass it with their hands; soccer players cannot touch the ball with their hands, but they can use their feet to dribble and kick it; football players cannot cross the line of scrimmage until play begins, but they can move in certain directions beforehand. The rules are helpful, keeping athletes in line so the game can run smoothly, objectives can be met, and goals achieved.

Each of us has our own Christian "athletic" adventure of "running the race toward the prize of the eternal crown" as Saint Paul often analogizes (Cf., 1 Cor 9:24-25, 2 Tim 4:7, Phil 3:14). This is a lifelong route along a path of moral living, striving for holiness. There are waystations designed to nourish and hydrate us: Scripture, Church teaching, the sacraments, and prayer, to name a few. They elucidate for us how to avoid sin and how to do good. They are the rules of the game, per se.

This is helpful, for as obstinate humans, clear teaching often comes in handy. This is true especially for children, who need to be taught clear boundaries, often through clear delineation: "Do not steal toys"; "Do help your sister." Yet as we mature developmentally and especially in our spiritual lives, it is essential to understand the wider context and rationale behind the commandments we heard as children.

Jesus was raised learning all the precepts of the Jewish law – hundreds of commandments. As a faithful Jew, honoring the law was paramount for Jesus. So as we come upon him in today's Gospel, he is instructing his disciples on how to reprimand sinners. At first glance, it appears that Jesus is reinforcing a rule-based morality. After all, at the time of Jesus, the rules were clear and consequences for breaking them serious. Women, for instance, were stoned on the spot for committing adultery.

In this context, however, Jesus is proposing a more merciful way: Talk to the sinner directly, then bring a witness or two along, finally involve the Church if necessary. Jesus' goal is not simply to reprimand the sinner but to rebuild the broken relationship. The desire to correct stems from love, the manner of addressing it stems from and manifests love, and all of it is housed within the greater body of love – a community caring for and looking out for its members. The way of Jesus always promotes reconciliation and love.

Saint Paul, in today's second reading, takes a page directly from Jesus' teaching when he describes love as the fulfillment of the law. Paul tells the Roman Church that all the negative commandments – what one should not do – can be achieved by the positive directive to love your neighbor as yourself.

Jesus and Paul both knew that a healthy spirituality cannot be maintained by the mere avoidance of sin. God is offering us so much more, namely the pursuit of virtue and the abundant life that comes through love. We need look no further than the gifts of the cross and the Eucharist to see the extent to which Christ was willing to stretch to reconcile us by his love. May the same be true of us, guided by a positive understanding of morality that leads us into right relationship, with God and with one another.



GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Years ago, I was asked to take in a hound dog and I was happy to do so, but it wasn't until I brought the dog home that I discovered how adamantly opposed my husband was to the idea. When asked, he had never said "no," but he thought I should just know he didn't want the dog. Obviously, we needed to work on our communication skills! Proper communication and what it means to love in relationship are what come to mind when I hear the start of today's Gospel. Jesus is instructing us on what to do when another angers, hurts, or offends us. Not surprisingly, it doesn't include calling our sister or best friend to vent, or posting about it on social media, regardless of how vaguely we word the situation. Instead we are to go to that person directly and "tell him his fault between you and him alone." If they listen, we have won them over. How many times have others hurt us but we never bother to tell them? How often do we simply assume the other person knows they have done us wrong? We owe it to one another to be honest and upfront - to give the other person a chance to apologize and us a chance to extend forgiveness. We also owe it to one another to be willing to receive them in charity, open-hearted, when they come to us to speak of our faults.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In the same way that the Gospel addresses speaking truth to another and "winning them over," the prophet Ezekiel recounts the Lord's instruction to him that he has a duty to "speak out to dissuade the wicked from his way." This, of course, was the role and mission of the prophets. To make known the word and law of God and call the people to respond. A prophet warned, counseled, taught, and encouraged. They called the people to obedience to God, denouncing idolatry, injustice, and empty rituals. Jesus himself came as priest, prophet, and king and by our baptism, "the whole People of God participates in these three offices of Christ and bears the responsibilities for mission and service that flow from them." (CCC 783) Through the centuries, people have tried to do this in various ways – from passing laws to standing on street corners with signs. But let's remember that even as we are meant to "speak out," we are also meant to listen. We too must be re-converted to the truth when we sin; we too must be dissuaded from our wicked ways. This is how we best fulfill our prophetic mission.

PRAY Witnessing to Christ in today's world sometimes feels overwhelming or hopeless. Spend some concerted time in prayer with the words from today's psalm: "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts."

A Two-Way Challenge

This Week's Readings at Mass


The first reading and the Gospel reading today both address the responsibility of believers to call out and name injustice and sinfulness when they see it. In the Old Testament reading, God tells the prophet, Ezekiel, that he must speak out to dissuade wicked people from doing harm, or he will be responsible for their deaths. Likewise, Jesus gives his disciples instructions for confronting those who have done wrong.

Jesus' teaching in the Gospel reading today about reconciling someone who has sinned is a challenge for two kinds of Christians. First, it is a challenge to those in the Church community who judge others publicly—boldly proclaiming in print, from the pulpit, or in the media. It is often easier for an accuser to go public with an accusation than address the matter privately and with more humility and sensitivity first. Jesus is asking such accusers to do the hard work of personal conversation first, which may have the effect of helping the accuser to grow in understanding and acceptance of the "sinner." (Of course, Jesus isn't asking people to put themselves in danger to do so, for example, asking a victim to approach her rapist in private.)

Jesus' words are also a challenge for other Christians who are too hesitant or timid to call out sinfulness and injustice when they see it. Sometimes we let injustice continue because it doesn't hurt us directly—the sin isn't "against" us. Interesting-

ly, the phrase "against you" was not in most of the ancient manuscripts of this Gospel, meaning



"Whatever you bind on earth is bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven."

Sheepish Question:

What is it about the good news of Jesus that I'm keeping from people I love? Why?

it was probably added later. So Jesus was calling on his disciples to privately point out their brother's sin (before escalating to a broader audience), regardless of whether they were directly impacted. Jesus is asking for courage here to stand up for any victim who is hurt by another's behavior. When a white person confronts another white person privately for a racist comment, that is the first step toward growth and reconciliation.



Training must be renewed every three (3) years thereafter for all clergy, employees and active volunteers. The VIRTUS® online training course – Protecting God's Children – provides flexible accessibility and is available in English, Spanish, Vietnamese and Korean languages.

Volunteers and employees who serve in Homebound Ministries, bringing the Eucharist to the sick, or serve with vulnerable adults are required to take the combined training course – Protecting God's Children & Vulnerable Adults – which incorporates the Protecting God's Children training material.



SIGN-UP FOR SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION

We are accepting sign-ups for the Sacrament of Confirmation and encourage parents to sign up your children.

Why it is important to be confirmed?

Confirmation is a sacrament of initiation in which the one who is confirmed (confirmandi) receives the gifts of the Holy Spirit through the imposition of hand and anointing with oils by the bishop. This sacrament establishes young adults as full-fledged members of the faith and it is called *confirmation* because the faith given in baptism is now confirmed and made strong. During your baptism, your parents and godparents make promises to renounce Satan and believe in God and the Church on your behalf. At confirmation, you renew those same promises, this time speaking for yourself. During confirmation, the focus is on the Holy Spirit, who confirmed the apostles on Pentecost and gave them the courage to practice their faith. We believe that the same Holy Spirit confirms Catholics during the sacrament of confirmation and gives



them the same gifts of wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude (courage), knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord. These gifts are supernatural graces given to the soul. It might be a time for your children to experience those graces.

SUNDAY OBLIGATION OF ATTENDING MASS

Q. To fulfill the Sunday obligation to attend Mass, how long or for what parts must you be present? What is the penitential rite? Must you be present for that? When may you leave and still fulfill the obligation? If you left for the homily or while Communion was being distributed, then returned, would you fulfill the obligation?

A. The present Code of Canon Law reads: "On Sundays and other holy days of obligation the faithful are bound to participate in the Mass." It doesn't say part or parts of the Mass. The expectation is that the person will attend a complete Mass. A Catholic Catechism quotes the canon and states, "Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin."

Before Vatican II, moral theologians and canonists would talk about the three principal parts of Mass as the Offertory, Consecration and Communion. If you missed any one of those parts, they wrote, you would not have fulfilled the obligation of hearing Mass.

Today, canonists and liturgists do not use that terminology. They speak of the gathering, the Liturgy of the Word, the Liturgy of the Eucharist, and the commissioning as the main divisions of Mass.

And moralists are more likely to speak of substantial observance of the law and what that might mean. They would assert that the law imposes a serious obligation. But some would question whether a person seriously or gravely violates the law if on one occasion he or she does not attend Sunday Mass. And all moralists would acknowledge that to miss a few minutes would not be a serious matter.

If you look at your missalette or recall your experience on Sundays, the penitential rite is part of the Mass. It takes place after the entrance song, right after the priest has entered the sanctuary and greeted the people. It can take different forms. One commonly used is the Confession of fault (Confiteor) and Lord, have mercy (Kyrie, eleison). So, if you come after these prayers, you are late for Mass.

Just as there can be excuses for missing Mass, there could be excuses for coming late or leaving early or missing part of the celebration. A parent might have to take a crying child from the church. A person may feel ill or need to use the restroom. There would be no fault in leaving for such reasons. But to step outside because of boredom would hardly be sufficient causes.

A hospital worker may have to leave early, or a mother may have to hurry home to watch children while Dad takes a turn at going to Mass. A traveler may have to make a bus or plane. Surely such reasons would excuse from fault. But to be first out of the parking lot, no!

While an emergency may demand that a person leave before the end of Mass, one who has departed before the consecration and Communion can hardly be said to have attended Mass. But the emergency may excuse that person from further effort to go to Mass.


