

#### Dear Parishioners,

In today's Gospel reading, we continue to hear from the Bread of Life Discourse in John. Unlike the Synoptic Gospels, John's Gospel does not contain an institution narrative (Jesus' words and the narrative surrounding them during the Last Supper when he gave us the Eucharist), so **this discourse serves as the foundation for his Eucharistic theology**. In today's reading, Jesus summarizes what he has said previously, but also adds to it by **identifying the living bread with his flesh which he gives** *for the life of the world*. In other words, he identifies this bread with the sacrifice he will make on the cross.

When the Jewish listeners wonder how he can give them his flesh to eat, he asserts, *unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you*. It was against Jewish law to consume blood, so this requirement would have been offensive to Jews. The argument has been made that if Jesus meant his words metaphorically, he would have said so here.

When we consume the Eucharist, we eat and drink Christ's body and blood. We take into our bodies the death and resurrection of Christ – our salvation. The *Catechism* says: "the principal fruit of receiving the Eucharist ... is an intimate union with Christ Jesus." We take Christ's body into our bodies, becoming what we receive. The Eucharistic banquet is the foundation of life in Christ (*CCC* 1391). When we eat Christ's flesh and drink his blood, we are not simply reminded of his death on the cross, we partake of it.

In John's Gospel, Jesus is the Word made flesh. Jesus communicates the Father to us. The idea that Jesus is the Word of God has its roots in wisdom literature. We see in today's first reading that wisdom is depicted as something to be consumed. Those who consume the food and drink that Wisdom has prepared grow in understanding, and this understanding leads to life: *Forsake foolishness that you may live*. Jesus receives his life from the Father. Those who eat his flesh and drink his blood receive his life – the life of the Father, life eternal.

When we are baptized, we receive new life in the Spirit as sons and daughters of God. But this life in the Spirit must be sustained. Just as we need food to preserve our bodily life, so do we need the Eucharist to preserve our spiritual life. Each time we receive the Eucharist, the life of grace we received at our baptism is preserved, increased, and renewed (*CCC* 1392). We are brought into union with Christ and his Church. Our venial sins are wiped away, and we are preserved from mortal sins. Celebrating the Eucharist each Sunday is not something extra we do as Christians; it is the essence of who we are. We are God's people, called together to receive him in his word and in this sacrament.





# Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Prov 9:1-6 | Eph 5:15-20 | John 6:51-58




We tell our children, from a young age through their teen years: make wise choices. It's a sort of catch-all to cover the endless possibilities of circumstances - good, bad, or neutral - they might find themselves in. But what does it mean to be wise? To have wisdom? In today's first reading from Proverbs, we are shown a depiction of wisdom herself, spreading a table where the guests will dine when they arrive. "Come, eat of my food, and drink of the wine I have mixed!" she says. This invitation is echoed in the Gospel, by Wisdom personified: Jesus Christ. "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day." Simplicity of heart and the forsaking of foolishness are the only criteria for accepting the offering of wisdom. It seems we are to come and be fed. But how do we discern, in our fast-paced, consumer-based world, what exactly is a wise choice? It's hard to advance in true wisdom; it is acquired by the humble and the simple, not the busy and the overcomplicated. Often, what the Christian deems important the world finds "foolish." It can be hard to keep our priorities rightly ordered, but advancing on the path to wisdom begins first by recognizing the centrality of God in our lives and humbly allowing him in.

#### **GO EVANGELIZE**

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In Paul's Letter to the Ephesians, he instructs the people, saying, "Watch carefully how you live." I'd like to think that's where we got our "make wise choices" instruction, but I can't be sure. Again, the dichotomy between foolishness and wisdom is addressed. Wisdom is described as being prudent, which is living with one eye in the present, but also one eye toward the future, and being filled with the Holy Spirit. Elaborating even further, Paul provides a beautiful image of "singing and playing to the Lord in your hearts, giving thanks always and for everything." In the life of one living with wisdom, there is a turning toward true joy. Living in a spirit of gladness is in direct opposition to living in a spirit of fear or comparison. Since wisdom and understanding are both gifts given to us by the Holy Spirit, we can invite him into our midst and ask him to increase our wisdom, understanding, and our capacity for joy.

**ENGAGE** Cultivating wisdom and understanding is a lofty, but worthy, goal! This week, spend some time familiarizing yourself with the Wisdom literature of the Bible (which consists of Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Songs, Wisdom, and Sirach) by reading the introductions to one or more of them. Explore some of the Scriptures themselves.
