Dear Parishioners,

In today's readings, Isaiah and Simon Peter encounter God, and their immediate response is to acknowledge their own sinfulness. Isaiah declares his lips unclean, and Peter calls himself a sinful man. When we confess our sinfulness, we also acknowledge God's power to forgive us. To recognize that God is God, and we are not, is an act of praise. And it is this attitude of humility that puts us in a position to be forgiven and healed.

In the first reading, the prophet Isaiah sees God seated on a throne. The seraphim above him cry out, *Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts!*

During Mass, we join the angels in this refrain just before the Eucharistic Prayer. Isaiah says he is doomed because it was believed that no one could see God and live. Upon seeing God, Isaiah acknowledges his unworthiness, declaring he is a man of unclean lips. After he makes this confession, one of the seraphim touches his mouth with an ember from the altar to remove his wickedness and purge his sin. Through this action, Isaiah is made worthy of his call to be God's prophet. At Mass, the celebrant references this event before proclaiming the Gospel. He prays quietly, "Cleanse my heart and my lips, almighty God, that I may worthily proclaim your holy Gospel."

In today's Gospel reading, Simon Peter also witnesses God's mysterious power. Simon has been fishing all night without catching anything. He has cleaned his nets. His work is finished. But when he follows Jesus' instructions to cast his nets one more time, he catches an astounding number of fish. In response to the miraculous sight, Peter falls to his knees and says: *Depart from me*, *Lord, for I am a sinful man*. Peter simultaneously acknowledges Jesus' identity as Lord and his own sinfulness. In response, he will leave everything behind and follow Christ.

Referencing both of these passages, the Catechism says: "Because God is holy, he can forgive the man who realizes that he is a sinner before him" (CCC 208). When we confess our sinfulness in God's presence, we put ourselves in a position to be forgiven. It is this attitude that we take when we pray the Confiteor at Mass. We dare not approach the altar, where the Lamb of God is seated on his throne, without first confessing our own sinfulness. We leave everything behind to follow the one with the power to make us worthy to receive him. I invite you to think about that next time before the Mass in your silent prayerful reflection.

MASS ETIQUETTE

- When we are in the church (specifically in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament), we should keep our volume to a reverential whisper, if conversation is necessary. This is **to promote prayer** to prepare our hearts and minds for Mass. Thank you for your mindfulness.

Bulletin Insert - Marriage Is a Trip and God Has the Map



Gifted pianists or brilliant pediatric surgeons will often speak of their profession as a calling, a pull in the depth of their hearts that only it can fulfill. It is wonderful to have a career or a passion that is a vocation, but in a deeper way, marriage is a Vocation, a call put on one's heart by God, and a way to love that each person fulfills in a unique way.

In the sacrament of marriage, spouses follow the "way" of Jesus (Jn 14:6), making a generous, irrevocable gift of self. The 20th century theologian Hans Urs Von Balthasar wrote, "The inner form of love is a vow." In other words, authentic love is total and forever. Through their vows, couples receive the grace to live out their high calling. Their life in Christ unfolds, and by his grace they become the best version of themselves. And it shows! In fact, married people and their children are more likely to attend church and enjoy better health, finances, life satisfaction, and happiness than their unmarried peers!

Self-gift can seem especially risky in a self-centered culture. Yet God has a plan for each person's life that includes a specific, personalized Vocation. God's plan makes the adventure and the risk worth taking. Young men and women should pray, "God, are you calling me to marriage?" The Vocation of marriage requires discernment and preparation when young, learning to give of oneself through service, self-sacrifice, works of mercy, and choosing to love especially when it's hard.

This World Marriage Day, thank God for the gift of marriage. Witness to the beauty of marriage by going on a date, talking about your marriage with your kids, and showing the world that this Vocation is truly a pilgrimage of faith and hope in love, because God has the map!

"God who created man out of love also calls him to love - the fundamental and innate vocation of every human being... Since God created him man and woman, their mutual love becomes an image of the absolute and unfailing love with which God loves man."

Saints Louis and Zélie Martin

Louis and Zélie Martin, parents of Saint Thérèse of Lisieux, are celebrated for their exemplary Christian marriage and family life. Born in Bordeaux, France, in 1823, Louis became a watchmaker, while Zélie, born in 1831 in Gandelain, mastered lace-making and ran a successful business. Both initially felt called to religious life but found in each other a different vocation.

They met in 1858, married three months later, and quickly formed a strong spiritual bond. The Martins had nine children, though four died in infancy. Zélie found comfort in the Lord, saying, "We shall find our little ones again up above." She balanced motherhood with her business until she passed away from breast cancer at age 46. Louis carried on raising their five daughters in the faith, all of whom later entered religious life. They in turn cared for him when he struggled with dementia in his later years. Louis and Zélie were canonized in 2015.

Discussion Question

Saints Louis and Zélie balanced work, family life and faith. They had great joys but also great hardships in their marriage. What can the lives of Louis and Zélie teach us about becoming saints as a married couple and as a family?
