

Thoughts From the Second Floor Front XVI Sunday in Ordinary Time

July 17, 2022

The Kingdom of God is present, but not yet. The rather enigmatic statement can be off putting, even confusing, and many could perceive it as contradictory. Another articulation may better express the point. The Kingdom of God is here but not fully. God always has more to share with us. As Catholics we use the term mystery freely. The word is not meant to be dismissive as in: Oh, you are never really going to understand it, it's a mystery. We think with our weather satellites and personal computers, cell phones and other advanced technology we have reached a point where we are in charge of all things. We live in an age that has made an idol of empiricism.

In choosing an idol over God we fall victim to the same temptation that the ancients experienced in the 8th century BC. We choose idols because they offer us the illusion that we can be in control. We want a quick fix and go for something that is within our reach. Another aspect of modernity and how we have been fooled into thinking that everything is within our grasp, is the expectation of instantaneity. Call it immediate gratification or by any other name it is the same belief that we require it now. Think about the use of computers. When the cursor freezes on the screen and you shake the mouse and then nothing happens you might mutter: *What's wrong with this darn thing?* Forgetting that this darn thing is so complicated it is almost like magic that it works at all. God's ways are not our ways and God's time is not our time.

Our first reading this weekend tells of Abraham, the Father of our Faith. There's a man who entered into mystery. God appeared to him and told him: Go. God did not say where to go, just go. And with that, Abraham's journey began. The Danish philosopher and founder of the school of Philosophy known as Existentialism, Søren Kierkegaard, wrote a book entitled Fear and Trembling. In it he wrote of the faith Abraham had in God as displayed in the call to sacrifice his son Isaac. The Dane compared this faith commitment as a Leap of Faith, standing on the cliff of a mountain at midnight and walking off the edge.

In today's excerpt we see Abraham practicing a virtue that was highly valued in his culture, the virtue of Hospitality. In a harsh world in which he lived, the people in that ancient culture practiced hospitality because it was a matter of survival. Death by starvation or dehydration was a constant threat and the need was always immediate. Martha is charged with the details of hospitality and seems to be airing her mild resentment over the fact that she is doing the heavy lifting while Mary attends to the word Jesus is offering,

This passage was often used to justify the contemplative life of prayer. Does contemplation ever need justification? It is not a good approach to the issue. Remember, ours is a both and religion – faith and reason, body and spirit, prayer and work. In their formation, members of the Society of Jesus are taught Ignatian spirituality. One of the emphases of that approach to the spiritual world, to which we are all drawn, makes this “both-and” methodology clear from the outset. *Contemplavi et actione*. Contemplation and action. To be reflective even while engaged in the mission, the ministry or task.

When the opportunity to show hospitality comes your way, and it will, make every effort to be conscious of what you are doing. We have the actions in the many ministries in our parish. But contemplation and action are within your reach each day. Pray for the gift of discernment and the strength to recognize the moment, to recognize the grace and seize for your good and the good of others.

Anointing of the Sick

When: Sunday, July 24th at the 11:00 am Mass.

Where: Please sit in the 6 front pews all around the front of the church. You may have one other person with you if you wish.

Who: Please let us know if you wish to receive this Sacrament by emailing the PLC at stcorn1@comcast.net or by calling the PLC at (610) 459-2502. This will give us an idea of how many people wish to participate and help us to record who has received the Sacrament.

Why: When the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is given, the hoped-for effect is that, if it be God's will, the person be physically healed of illness. But even if there is no physical healing, the primary effect of the Sacrament is a spiritual healing by which the sick person receives the Holy Spirit's gift of peace and courage to deal with the difficulties that accompany serious illness or the frailty of old age. A person should not wait until they are at the point of death to receive this Sacrament.

Crucifix or Cross?

Now here is a question that I think is really good and important to understand; why do we Catholics display a crucifix while other Christian churches have a cross.

Today, churches often place a cross at the front of their worship space, but this practice apparently was unknown to the earliest Christians, who displayed only bread and wine for Holy Communion. By the 13th century, however, Pope Innocent III required either a crucifix or plain cross to stand on the altar of Roman Catholic churches.

When a T-shaped cross contains a depiction of Jesus, the symbol is called a **crucifix**. Our Roman Catholic churches around the world use the crucifix as a primary symbol of Christian faith.

Archaeologists and art historians have found evidence that various Christians carried crucifixes with them and used the symbol in their churches consistently from about 680 onward. Graffiti in Roman catacombs shows portrayals of Christ on the cross much earlier than that. This graffiti also pictures plain crosses. When the crucifixion became a



universally accepted Christian symbol is hard to say.

Most Protestant churches never display a crucifix but often show a plain Latin cross (image on left). A Latin cross looks like a lower-case letter "t."

As part of the Reformation (1517 to 1648), many Protestants purposely stripped their churches of decoration, believing previous practices had become ostentatious and distracted from proper worship. In addition, some Protestants read literally the Second Commandment of Exodus 20, which prohibits making graven images. They believed a depiction of any human form is idolatrous. Crucifixes, therefore, disappeared from Protestant sanctuaries.

In describing how a Roman Catholic church should be furnished for worship, the U.S. Council of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Divine Worship states, *"There is also to be a cross, with the figure of Christ crucified upon it, either on the altar or near it, where it is clearly visible to the assembled congregation. It is appropriate that such a cross, which calls to mind for the faithful the saving Passion of the Lord, remain near the altar even outside of liturgical celebrations."*

I will pick up next week with further consideration of the differences of the Crucifix and the Cross.





The St. Cornelius Literary Society

The next selection for the bookish among us is A Furnace Full of God by Rebekah Scott.

Rebekah and Patrick, burned-out newspaper journalists from the USA and England, were captured by the generous spirit they found on the Camino de Santiago pilgrimage trail. They sold up their American lives and moved to Spain in 2006, to a town of twenty farmers in the middle of the 500-mile, thousand-year-old pilgrim road. They did their best to catch the ancient rhythms of seedtime, harvest, pig-stickings and saints' days. The year 2010 was a Holy Year, when more than 300,000 pilgrims walked to the shrine city of Santiago de Compostela. Some stayed at Peaceable Kingdom, the farmhouse where the couple offered a night's food and lodging in exchange for whatever the pilgrim wanted to give. They were nuns, bums, Oxford dons, mystics, fugitives, hippies, and lunatics, as well as greyhounds, barn cats, roosters, and donkeys. Most moved on after a day or two, but some came to stay. A Furnace Full of God is their story.
