Thoughts from the Second Floor Front XI Sunday in Ordinary Time

June 18, 2023

With this week's celebrations we once again pick up on what the Liturgical Calendar refers to as "Ordinary Time." The liturgical cycle identifies the Extra-ordinary times as well: Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter. But for now we are to settle into the regular, common celebrations of the mysteries of our faith. Is there really anything ordinary in the life of a committed disciple? Reflect on the opening verse of today's gospel proclamation: At the sight of the crowds, Jesus' heart was moved with pity for them because they were troubled and abandoned, like sheep without a shepherd. In English it takes four words to express the sense of what Jesus experienced when He saw the crowd: was moved with pity. In the original language, Greek, it was only one word: splandidzomai. It is a funny word and it is fun to say. However, it carries within it a unique connotation. Jesus was often moved with pity. This is not a tongue clicking pity as in – There, there, isn't that shame. Or too bad for them. The connotation is that the person experiencing this is moved to action, moved to do something because of what he or she is seeing.

In response to what it was He saw in the suffering of the people who were troubled and abandoned, Jesus commissioned the disciples and they became apostles. The word apostle means one who is sent. Jesus identifies the Twelve and sends them on mission. He commissioned and empowered them to do what He did. Although we cannot be counted among the Twelve, like them we are called to action on behalf of those who are troubled and abandoned. We, too, have been empowered and commissioned. At our Baptism we received the gift of the Holy Spirit. At a later date, that gift was confirmed and we were empowered and received the commission to action.

Now the point is do we respond to who and what we see in the same manner that Jesus and His original band of Apostles did? In this passage we have the clearest distinction between John the Baptist's preaching and Jesus' preaching. John said: Repent! The Kingdom of God is coming. Jesus said: The Kingdom of God is here. As recipients of the great power and commission we have received, believers may not remain unresponsive. To do so is to bring condemnation upon ourselves. There is a sense of urgency in the sense that we are moved with pity.

There are any number of ways that we can respond to the grace of the moment when we are *splandidzomai*-ed, when we are moved with pity. Some of the ways to respond are financial. Donating to Catholic Charities, Catholic Relief Services, Nutritional Development Services, the Pontifical Mission Society, the Propagation of the Faith – all of which can be contacted easily.

But finances are not the only means to respond to the sense that you are moved with pity. Check in on an elderly neighbor, pick up groceries for that same neighbor. Make sandwiches for our Loaves and Fishes effort through which we respond to the mandate given to us in Matthew Chapter Five. Remember what you do for the least of His brothers and sisters, you do for Him.






Welcome to the Matthew XXV Garden Season 3





Beneficiary Spotlight: St. John's Hospice



"The house I was living in started falling apart and I had no choice but to leave, but I had nowhere to turn. I was homeless and living on the streets for two years. I don't know how I made it through the winter months, but I know God was with me, looking over me. The streets were getting too dangerous, and I knew I needed shelter. I spoke to my pastor, and he recommended St. John's Hospice. The first time I walked through the doors here, I loved it. St. John's Hospice has clothed me, fed me, and kept me safe. They have also helped support me through counseling, case management services, and anything I could possibly need. Next week I start a new job, and I know this opportunity would not have been possible without the support of the staff here. In addition to helping the 52 residents that call St. John's Hospice home, individuals experiencing homelessness can come to the dining hall for a hot lunch every day. They are met with dignity. Through the support of the Catholic Charities Appeal, these services are made possible. People are given a second chance in their life. The Appeal helps feed the hungry and provides shelter to those experiencing homelessness. I don't know where I would be in my life without St. John's Hospice." - John, Resident, St. John's Hospice

John Fisher, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops celebrates Religious Freedom Week. Join us in promoting religious freedom For the Good of All.

Sts. Thomas More and John Fisher were Renaissance men. Talented and energetic, they contributed to the humanist scholarship of early modern England. More wrote theological and philosophical treatises, while making a career as a lawver and government official. Bishop John Fisher worked as an administrator at Cambridge, confronted the challenge Martin Luther presented to Christian Europe, and most importantly served as Bishop of Rochester. As a bishop, he is notable for his dedication to preaching at a time when bishops tended to focus on politics. These men were brilliant. They both corresponded with Erasmus, who helped Bishop Fisher learn Greek and Hebrew, and who also famously referred to More as a man for all seasons.

Above all their accomplishments, these men bore witness to a deep faith in Christ and his Church. More considered joining religious life and was assiduous in his devotional practices. As a married man, he committed himself wholly to his vocation as a father. At the time, disciplinary practices with children tended to be severe, but More's children testify to his warmth, patience, and generosity.

St. John Fisher was a model shepherd and demonstrated remarkable humility. He remained in the small Diocese of Rochester his entire episcopal ministry, devoting himself to his local church rather than seeking promotion to a larger, more powerful diocese.

More and Fisher are well-known for opposing King Henry's divorce. Ultimately, it was their refusal to sign an oath of suprema-

Beginning June 22, the Feast of Saints Thomas More and cy that led them to be executed. King Henry VIII claimed to be the supreme head of the Church in England, asserting sovereign power over English Christians. Neither Fisher nor More could abide this claim, and their steadfastness to their consciences put them in conflict with the king. They were convicted of treason.

> It is good to love one's country, but ultimate loyalty is due only to Christ and his kingdom. In the moments just before his execution, More is said to have stated, "I die the King's good servant, but God's first." They never rose up to incite rebellion or foment revolution. They were no traitors. But when the law of the king came into conflict with the law of Christ, they submitted to Christ. These men gave their lives for the freedom of the Church and for freedom of conscience. They bear witness to the truth that no government can make a claim on a person's soul. May their example continue to illuminate the path for us, as we seek to faithfully serve our Church and country.




