Thoughts from the Second Floor Front XIV Sunday in Ordinary Time

July 9, 2023

How do you enter a room? Not when you open the door to a room you know is empty. How do you enter a room when there are other people in it? The Italians have a phrase they use on arrival: "Ecco mi!" Literally: Behold me! Is that how you arrive?

How do you enter into a conversation? Do you dominate the interaction? Speak louder than others? Are you an over talker, someone who continues to speak while another is making an assertion? Hold forth on your opinion without any regard for what others may think? If these character traits are not yours you may know someone who has them.

Contrast them to the description of the entrance of the Messiah in the first reading from the prophet Zechariah and the directive that Jesus gives in the gospel. The characteristic or trait that is apparent in both of these passage is meekness; a certain level of unassuming modesty. Our culture does not readily embrace meekness or modesty. Meekness is equated with weakness and modesty is somehow perceived as an indication of a lack of assertiveness; neither of which have much support in the culture.

The Prophet indicates that the Promised One would arrive in an understated manner marked by meekness. He will not be on a charging stallion, sword in hand; ready to discharge the oppressors of the people. In Jesus' day there was a hope among some that the Messiah would arrive to overthrow the Roman occupiers and do away with their onerous presence, rule and taxes. The gospels present a different image and a gentler approach that Jesus has given to His followers.

Read the gospel passage this week. Notice to whom it is that Jesus sends out his message. His limitless love beckons "...all who labor and are burdened...." The Lord knows the human condition very well. He calls all who labor and are burdened because all of us do labor and are burdened. It seems to be part of the human condition. In Jesus we are called beyond our humanity. We are ultimately called to his divinity. That is not something that should only come at the end of time. We are called to be Jesus for others. Our way is not to hammer other people with scripture quotes to demonstrate the need for conversion. We are not all called to apologetics and missionary like evangelization. Our way is to quietly, modestly and gently imitate the good Lord in the daily and, many times, challenging activities of daily life. It is a challenge to be a faithful Catholic in our contemporary culture. Our society does not embrace the gospel values that we have embraced and cling to in a world marked more by assertiveness, if not violence, rather than the meekness of the Savior.

I have read and heard it asserted that the last socially acceptable form of prejudice in our country is anti-Catholicism. Think back just a few days ago with the blasphemous and disgraceful display of anti-Catholicism for which the Los Angeles Dodgers are responsible. Would the Jewish community tolerated such blatantly bigoted behavior? Would Muslims be patient if the insults flew about their faith practices as it has ours?

Just last week we celebrated Independence Day in our nation, and the freedom we enjoy. Sadly all too often in our contemporary culture freedom is confused with licentiousness. As you go about your daily tasks this week, do so with confidence in God who has called you to be a witness, His witness in our world. A world that on occasion seems to be spinning helplessly and hopelessly further and further away from the center. The insight of Edmund Burke, the 18th century British Parliamentarian still rings true: The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good [people] to do nothing. The good we do may not make headlines. Nevertheless we are charged to do that which is good, despite the opposition.



A specific date to gather and discuss will be announced at a later date.


If you were fortunate enough to pick up Bishop Robert Barron's Book <u>This is my Body</u>, I hope you have found it insightful and inspirational.

Easy to operate: put 2 batteries in and you are good to HEAR!







TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The premier poet of the English language, Geoffrey Chaucer, introduced one of his most beloved characters, the "Wife of Bath," by this telling remark: "Husbands at church door she had five." Four times widowed, she was setting off on a pilgrimage, notably without number five. The church door is a curious detail, pointing to the fourteenth-century wedding custom of marrying on the porch of the parish church. The goal was to give maximum publicity to the consent of the groom and bride, and so consent was

moved from the bride's home to a public venue. The priest would stand in the doorway and begin by sprinkling the couple with holy water. He needed to make sure they weren't too closely related and give them some instruction. He would direct the groom to pay the bride's family a dowry, and then announce the monetary amounts to the interested passersby. Only then would the guests enter the church for the wedding Mass, during which the bride and groom would hold lighted candles. The gradual move from home to church and the shift from the bride's father to the priest's authority helped to protect the freedom of brides who weren't quite as confident as the Wife of






