Thoughts from the Second Floor Front XV Sunday in Ordinary Time

July 16, 2023

Stories are wonderful and powerful teaching tools. We remember stories from our childhood and cannot remember what we had for breakfast last Sunday morning. Jesus knew the power of stories and He used them throughout the Public Ministry. This weekend we enter into a cycle of the parables from Matthew's account. Parables have a particular structure and several important characteristics. Not unlike modern day humor which commonly structures humorous stories in threes. *Three men go into a bar: a Jewish Rabbi, a Protestant minister and a Catholic priest...* Parables also constitute a triad of characters: three men went up to Jerusalem, the lost coin, lost sheep and lost son, the owner of the vineyard sent three messengers to collect the harvest.

Jesus uses parables most effectively in the Public Ministry. The setting and story line of parables emerges from everyday and very real situations in the world at that time. A farmer in a field. A lost Coin. A lost sheep and a son who dishonors his father. Sewing wineskins together. Harvesting grapes. Harvesting wheat. A traveler on the road to Jerusalem. The people in the audience would immediately recognize the topic. Upon hearing the parable of the Good Samaritan, a listener could nudge his neighbor and say something like: *Yep! That happened to my cousin a while ago*. So parables are drawn from life, ordinary life.

But with parables there is always a switch. There is a certain juncture at which the listener can assert: I have no idea who He is talking about. The reality is that parables are so crystal clear that only the dullest of wits and the thickest of skulls could claim to miss the point. When the reality is that Jesus is talking about them. Jesus knows exactly what his listeners were thinking and he is aware of their recalcitrance. ...they look but do not see and hear but do not listen or understand. But the problem is that their lack of understanding is a purposeful, willful and pointed resistance to what is obviously right before their eyes. Jesus' quote of the great prophet Isaiah is right on point: "they will hardly hear with their ears, they have closed their eyes, lest they see with their eyes and hear with their ears.." They have chosen to remain unmoved. As the saying goes: Denial is more than a river in Africa. And people have an extraordinary capacity to engage in denial. Sometimes they are the recipients of assistance in the effort at denial. These people pose the most danger. They are called enablers. They are the most dangerous because they give every appearance of trying to be of assistance and in actual fact are making it more and more difficult for the individual to emerge from denial and be free.

I do not think that the disciples were enablers. Like us they may not have always understood what Jesus was about. However, I do not believe that the were preventing people from seeing and hearing and understanding, despite the reality of their own occasional lack of understanding.

May that also be true of us.





If you were fortunate enough to pick up Bishop Robert Barron's Book <u>This is my Body</u>, I hope you have found it insightful and inspirational.




Camp Cornelius







TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Two centuries ago, Archbishop John Carroll worried that Americans would not appreciate the linguistic veil over our worship, and asked that the liturgy in the new United States be in English, not Latin. How did our liturgy come to be in Latin in the first place? In the first century, the dominant language in the regions where the church first flourished was Greek. Today in much of the world, almost everyone speaks at least a bit of English. Recently, the European Union even

> Just as English is a unifying language today, it was hard to function in the ancient world without a smattering of Greek. Even the word "Eucharist" comes from the Greek for "thanksgiving." For a long time, Greek was the language of worship, even in Rome. Slowly, society in the west shifted to a bias for Latin and against Greek. Latin first appeared in public prayer at the end of the second century, in the colonial outposts of North Africa. Soon, Latin became the language of culture, and so as fixed prayer forms were written, they were transmitted in Latin. From Rome and Africa, over the next four centuries, the new liturgical language of Latin spread north to Gaul and Brit-




