Thoughts from the Second Floor Front XXI Sunday in Ordinary Time

August 27, 2023

Away on vacation I once again tried to read William Faulkner. I consider it a great literary failing on my part that I have found Faulkner so difficult to engage and even more challenging to understand. I know that he has been hailed as a great writer, perhaps one of the greatest that America has produced. The reason I turned my eye to his work is that other writers, most among my favorites – Flannery O'Connor, Walker Percy, James Lee Burke and even Thomas Merton, all reported that Faulkner's writing had a great influence on them and their writing.

I believe that I may have actually picked up the thread that I have been searching for so long in my efforts at reading Faulkner. The thought struck me that I was interested in Faulkner because of his influence on those other writers. Then I thought who has influenced me? My family of course, my mom and dad and my sisters and brothers and friends who mean so much and offer so much. Beyond that, the teachers with whom I have had the privileged experience of studying and some teachers with whom I had the pained experience of studying. Certainly priests, several I have known. Some of whom have gone to God – all too soon I believe; many in the archdiocese and beyond who are some of the finest priests I know. Religious women who have shown a dedication to the Gospel values they learned and the charism that drew them to religious life. Parishioners who exemplify what it means to be a disciple.

Who has influenced you? In the gospel passage today St. Peter demonstrates that he has certainly been influenced by Jesus. "Who do you say that I am?" It was not that Jesus had any doubts about His own identity at that point. Every one of us has to arrive at a decision as to who we are. For most of us the issue is fairly well settled by the time we are in our early or mid-twenties. However, I do believe that maturation is complete later and later in our contemporary culture. There are a lot of 35 -year-old adolescents in our world.

This question of Jesus' identity serves as the catalyst for Peter's confession of faith in the reading from St. Matthew's gospel today. Peter's statement is a recognition of Jesus' identity, which is a major issue in all of the Gospel accounts. Every disciple, that includes you, must answer the question: Who do you say that I am? The question is not a matter of cognitive inquiry like some discussion point from the rarefied atmosphere of a theology class in graduate school. Each believer must be able to answer that question for himself or herself. In answering it there must be a correlation between belief and the manner in which one lives.

By accepting the gospel as the truth and recognizing that Jesus is *the Christ, the Son of the living God*, one ought to be able to, not only incorporate that belief into the daily routines of one's life, but to incarnate the life of Christ into the life we lead. The manner in which this is done will not usually be marked by the drama of St. Peter's confession. We are called to be Christ to others and that often involves placing others ahead of ourselves. Parents know this, spouses know this, friends know this, Disciples of the Lord Christ are to know and live that reality.

The saints are great heroes and models of faith. St. Peter was flawed and some would say deeply flawed in his sometime halting and stumbling response to the Lord. Despite his flaws, Jesus chose him to be the rock on which the church is built. *You are Peter and on this rock I will build my church*. We, too, are flawed as well and at times our response may not be our best. Just as Jesus chose Peter, He has chosen you to do some task that He has not assigned to anyone else. Pray for that conviction that Peter showed in today's gospel and the eventual resolve he lived as the Rock.


