Thoughts from the Second Floor Front XXIV Sunday in Ordinary Time

September 17, 2023

Wrath and anger are hateful thing, Yet the sinner hugs them tight.

Sirach 27: 30

Old Sirach certainly knew human nature. Recently, I was listening to a lecture by Thomas Merton in a series of talks given to cloistered religious women at Gethsemane in the late 1960's. Merton told a story to illustrate the need for forgiveness and detachment. Two Zen monks were on a journey keeping silent as is their custom. As they walked on in silence, they came upon a beautiful young woman sitting by a riverbank. She called to them and asked them to help her cross the river as she was frightened to go in alone. One of the monks picked her up and carried her across the river to the other side. After putting her down, the two continued on their journey, again in silence. They had walked for a few miles when one monk turned to the other and said: "You should not have touched that young woman." The other monk, the one who carried the young woman said in surprise: "Are you still carrying her? I put her down a few miles back."

Holding onto resentment, hatred or the belief that you have somehow been slighted seems only to bring a unique kind of burden to those who cannot forgive another. Not surprisingly, this most often happens with family members. The community that constituted Matthew's church was certainly a very small group. The were living in an environment that was, in many ways, openly hostile to their very existence through persecutions by both Roman and Jewish authorities. Villages and cities in the ancient world were very small affairs. They were no longer as closely attached to the Jewish traditions and practices and certainly not engaging in the pagan practices of their Roman neighbors. The early Christians would have been known in their communities simply because they were so different from others. Eventually they would be expelled from the synagogues in the year 90 A.D. with the endorsement of the Eighteen Curses and Benediction issued by the Council of Jamnia. The behavior of Christians would have given evidence of who they are - not unlike a family in a small town known for the loud arguments that take place in their home. Christians would be known, not for arguing, but for acceptance and forgiveness.

The issue of forgiveness becomes even more critical when Peter attempts to put a limit on the number of times one forgives another. Commentary on this passage helps us understand the enormity of the challenge to forgive and the importance of forgiving others. Matthew writes that the wicked servant owed ...a huge amount. A literal translation is ...ten thousand talents. A talent was a unit of coinage of high but varying value depending on its metal (copper, silver or gold). When the same wicked servant claims that I will pay you back in full, he is making an empty promise because the debt is too colossal. The other servant we read owed a much smaller amount, literally a hundred denarii. A denarius was the ordinary daily wage of a day laborer. The difference between the two debts is enormous and brings out the absurdity of the conduct of the Christian who has received the great forgiveness of God and yet refuses to forgive the relatively minor offenses done to him.

Our Holy Father speaks of forgiveness and mercy with great regularity, in homilies, the Angelus address on Sundays and his writings. One of my favorites quotes is this: *The Lord never tires of forgiving. It is we who tire of asking for forgiveness*. May we receive God's mercy and more importantly not only be recipients of God's mercy but vessels of that mercy towards others.


40 HOURS DEVOTION

The Forty Hours Devotion is a special forty-hour period of con-tenuous prayer made before the Blessed Sacrament in solemn exposition. Of course, the focus of this devotion is on the Holy Eucharist.

"I myself am the living bread come down from Heaven. If anyone eats this bread. He shall live forever: the bread I will give is my flesh for the life of the


(John 6:51).

The number forty has always signified a sacred period of time: the rains during the time of Noah lasted 40 days and nights; the Jews wandered through the desert for 40 years, our Lord fasted and prayed for 40 days before beginning His public ministry. The 40 Hours Devotion remembers that traditional "forty-hour period" from our Lord's burial until the resurrection. Actually in the Middle Ages, the Blessed Sacrament was transferred to the repository, "the Easter Sepulcher," for this period of time to signify our Lord's time in the tomb.




The St. Cornelius Literary Society

When Carolyn Weber set out to study Romantic literature at Oxford University, she didn't give much thought to God or spiritual matters - but over the course of her studies she

To an outsider, an orphanage is a last resort. But that's not always true. 80% to 90% of kids living in orphanages have a living parent who would like to take care of them but often can't because they're too poor. At the age of 5, Stephen Ucembe lost his mother to violence. He also lost his sense of a home when he was sent to stay in an orphanage in Kenya. Stephen and two of his siblings lived in the orphanage despite the fact their father was still alive in another part of the country. Stephen's father visited him once in the institution. The next time he heard about him, his father was dead.

Stephen founded the *Kenya Society of Care Leavers* in 2009. He says people in their late teens and early 20s



Then the father became seriously ill. The mother called walked sheepishly into the hospital room. The father motioned his son to him and whispered: "Did you ever think you?"

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TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

We've seen how the rescue of Eucharistic Prayer II from the mists of history changed the style of our prayer, introducing a sleek simplicity to the prayer said aloud by the priest. Remember, before the reform of our prayer in the late 1960s, the priest whispered the words of the Roman

Canon, Eucharistic Prayer I. His voice was not amplified, Nearly ten years before, a son and father had parted his back was to the people, who could only tell what was ways when the business they shared went bankrupt. On November 2, 1968, Pope Paul VI signed off on the plan of the new Mass, and by April 1969, the publication of the revised order of Mass was announced.





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
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
