# Thoughts from the Second Floor Front XXVI Sunday in Ordinary Time

October 1, 2023

With the arrival of October, you would think that the glorious light, bright and warm summer days would have faded into a fond memory. The extra summer days we have enjoyed are pretty much over and the wonderful crisp snap of fall has arrived. October marks a new season. Think on the liturgical celebrations that are on our calendar.

The month is dedicated to Our Lady with a special focus on the Rosary. October 13th is the anniversary of the Miracle of the Sun (*O Milogro do Sol* in Portuguese). Look that up and prepare to be amazed at the miracle that took place in Fatima early in the 20th century. A miracle is a unique sort of mystery. As Catholics, we use that word freely. "Oh, it's a mystery" we say. Some in our world would dismiss even the possibility of a miracle let alone admit of mystery. Perhaps because of our supposed technological sophistication there is a sense that science can pretty much explain everything. It is not that a mystery means that we will never understand. What it means is that there is always more to discover. If you think mystery is not a part of your existence, answer this question: have all the plans you made in life worked out exactly as you thought they would?

We are to live in such a way as to make room for and care for the other. There is a risk in that, in living for another. The risk is that in living for another you will in all probability become a better disciple and live the Gospel more fully. Parents know of this singular aspect of humility. Spiritual writers point to the thousands of martyrs, those who gave their all for Christ. Our tradition is filled with stories of heroes who offered themselves so that another can live. For most of us the act of martyrdom in that sense is not even a remote possibility. In that the word martyr means "witness" we can act and live in such a way that gives witness to our relationship to Christ and to others, placing Him and them above ourselves. The Prophet Micah states it directly: You have been told, O mortal, what is good, and what the LORD requires of you: Only to do justice and to love goodness, and to walk humbly with your God (6:8).

This does not mean that we are to suffer the caprice of fate with no ability to make plans or meaningful decisions. Ezekiel, the Psalmist and Paul this weekend offer passionate encouragement to live in a manner that is marked, not by aimless and pointless direction, but firm dedication and commitment. *Turn from wickedness*, the great prophet directs. The Psalmist prays, *Your ways, O Lord, make known to me*. Perhaps the most direct and unequivocal statement, characteristically from St. Paul, *Have in you the same attitude that is also in Christ Jesus*, as he begins the great Christological Hymn of Philippians.

Throughout the month of October we celebrate the heroic men and women of our rich tradition that have lived, and died, in their passionate pursuit of discipleship. The great mystical gift of the Guardian Angels. St. Francis of Assisi, recognized even by non-believers as one of the most significant persons of the Western Tradition. St. Ignatius of Antioch, a martyr in the early church whose letters, written while imprisoned and being transported to Rome for trial, contain powerful exhortations and teaching about the faith. St. Luke the Evangelist, author of the third gospel and the Acts of the Apostles. The feast of the North American Martyrs. All of these are witnesses to the power of the gospel and encouragement to us, disciples in the 21st century.

When, in the gospel passage, "the chief priests and elders of the people," are challenged, Jesus offered another reversal for their consideration. Those who would be deemed unworthy are the ones that Jesus identifies as those who enter the kingdom of God. It seems that our expectations, based on our perceptions of ourselves, may need to be reconsidered. It is not our status that counts as much as our willingness to change and respond to the invitation to collaborate with God's will.

As the days of fall eventually emerge and the spectacular splash of color appear, pay attention not only to the beauty of nature but the beauty of our faith well lived. We are all capable of giving witness to God's mystery at work in us by the manner we live our life.

# The St. Cornelius Literary Society

When Carolyn Weber set out to study Romantic literature at Oxford University, she didn't give much thought to God or spiritual matters - but over the course of her studies she

encountered the Jesus of the Bible and her world turned upside down. Surprised by Oxford chronicles her conversion experience with wit, humor, and insight into how becoming a Christian changed her.

Carolyn Weber arrives at Oxford a feminist from a loving but broken family, suspicious of men and intellectually hostile to all things religious. As she grapples with her Godshaped void alongside the friends,



classmates, and professors she meets, she tackles big questions in search of truth, love, and a life that matters.

From issues of fatherhood, feminism, doubt, doctrine, and love, Weber explores the intricacies of coming to faith with an aching honesty and insight echoing that of the poets and writers she studied. Surprised by Oxford is:

The witty memoir of a skeptical agnostic who comes to a dynamic personal faith in God. Rich with illustration and literary references, gritty, humorous, and spiritually perceptive.

Weber eloquently describes a journey many of us have embarked upon, grappling with tough questions and doubts about the meaning of faith—and ultimately finding it in the most unlikely of places.

If a funeral is scheduled for a Friday, there will be NO exposition.




### October 15, 2023 12:00 Noon







Our Blessed Mother models a profound witness to love and life in the Gospel account of the Visitation. Luke's Gospel tells us that, when Mary learns that her cousin Elizabeth is pregnant, she travels to the hill country "in haste" (Lk 1:39). Despite being unexpectedly pregnant herself, Mary responds to this news with urgency.

She embarks on a long and perhaps difficult journey to be with her cousin during her time of need, bearing Christ to her as He lay quietly hidden in Mary's womb. And, although Jesus is veiled from view, when Mary first arrives John the Baptist leaps for joy in Elizabeth's womb, recognizing the presence of Christ (Lk 1:44). Mary, with Jesus, spends the next three months at Elizabeth's side.

The witness of our Blessed Mother invites us to become more aware of the needs of pregnant and parenting moms in our own parishes and communities. A woman with an unexpected pregnancy may have any number of fears and challenges: facing judgment from her friends and family, losing her job or housing, or being abandoned by the father of her child.

Following Mary's example, we can ask ourselves how to better know these mothers, listen to them, seek understanding, and help them obtain the necessities of life for themselves and their children. How can we, like the Blessed Mother, lovingly support mothers in welcoming and caring for God's gift of life?

Throughout the whole of Scripture, Mary's words are few. Yet, in her sacred encounter with Elizabeth, a powerful declaration pours from her lips. Mary proclaims to all generations that the Lord *lifts up the lowly, fills the hungry with good things,* and remembers his promise of mercy from age to age (Lk 1:46-56). In both word and deed, Mary speaks a

message of *hope*—not only to Elizabeth, but also to every mother in need and to each of us.

Mary's witness is an invitation to step out in love and compassion. It is a summons to *make haste* to help vulnerable women who may be isolated and alone. By doing so, we too can bear Christ within us and help others experience His presence.

Inspired by the Blessed Mother's example and guided by the Holy Spirit, may we offer Christ's presence and love to mothers in their time of need through our faithful service and support.
