Thoughts from the Second Floor Front XXIX Sunday in Ordinary Time

October 22, 2023

In the first reading this weekend we meet Cyrus, King of the Persians. He is the anointed of God, i.e. Cyrus is recognized as *mashia*, that is Hebrew for Messiah, which is derived from the Greek *Christus* which means Anointed, from which we get our English word Christ. The term *mashia* was applied to kings of this world and carries with it no divine connotations. Cyrus was called the *mashia* because he freed the Jewish people from their enslavement to the Babylonians and because he was God's agent. Immediately after defeating the Babylonians, Cyrus issued an order calling for the repatriation of the Jewish people back to their homeland. He facilitated that repatriation with physical infrastructure as well, ensuring that they could rebuild the city of Jerusalem which had fallen into ruins during the period of their exile.

Do not miss the point. God chose a pagan, a person that the Jews did not expect, to act on their behalf, to do His will.

That is the main problem with the Pharisees and the Herodians. These two groups hated each other with a kind of tribal hatred. The Herodians came to power because they aligned themselves with Rome, the oppressors of Israel, thereby incurring the unending wrath of the leadership. The Herodians hated the Pharisees because they could claim religious superiority because they asserted their religious purity. The fact that they have colluded to entrap Jesus in his speech demonstrates the extent of their motivation to get Him. But Jesus once again bests them just when they believe they have got Him where they want Him. He is the one who draws them into a logical trap from which they cannot escape.

The question Jesus asks seems straightforward enough. It is Ceasar's image; it is Ceasar's coin. Give it back to him. The religious leadership and their thinking was so fiercely narrowed that all they could see was the hated Romans and their oppressive system of taxation. They think they see Jesus but they do not see who Jesus is. I wonder if they even see who they themselves are. The coin belongs to Caesar because it bears his image. Whose image do they bear? Whose image do you bear?

In Genesis the sacred writer teaches that God made us: God created mankind in his image; in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them. So there you have it. The coin bears Caesar's image. We bear God's image. That does not mean that God looks like a bald headed man in his mid-sixties, who has poor posture and walks with a slight limp. In a way we have been divinized. Not because we exist but because Jesus exists. It was St. Athanasius, 4th and 5th century, who said that God became man so that man might become God. Setting aside the lack of gender pronoun inclusivity, you get the point. Jesus became one like us so that we can become like Jesus.

Just as Jesus called the religious leaders in His day to be transformed so too does He call us to a transformation. That change is difficult because, simply put, change is difficult. As you read this column, fold your arms. Once you are settled, fold them the other way with the other arm on top. Not easy to get comfortable, is it? And the call we have received to be like Christ may make us uncomfortable but the call is there. St. John Henry Newman famously asserted: *To live is to change and to be perfect is to have changed often.* That is a call to pursue perfection and it is a dynamic force in the faith of the gospel which is a necessary characteristic of a life of a disciple. And the change that is required is not to drop a few pounds or get a Botox treatment. The image we are to pursue is the image of Jesus. The change is not to make a more polite person with a more appealing personality. The change we are to achieve is to make us more like Jesus.


RESPECT LIFE

He is always with


us. Jesus promised this when he gave the disciples the same mission he gives to each of us: Go.


