Thoughts from the Second Floor Front I Sunday of Advent

December 3, 2023

Advent this year is less than the usual four full weeks. The fourth Sunday of Advent is Christmas Eve. As we move into Advent today, the topic in the Gospel passage is time and how little we realize its significance. St. Augustine said: *If you ask me what time it I can tell you. If you asked me what is time I would not know how to begin.* In our youth time matters very little. We dispose of one day and move on to the next as if there were an endless supply of them. We convince ourselves that we are in control of them as well as in control of what we foolishly refer to as <u>my</u> time. People often say to me: Oh I know how busy you are and I don't want to take up any of your time. My usual response is that time is about all I can give you. It was given to me and I can share it. Have you ever had someone say to you: Thank you for taking the time...? I often speak to people about the ministry of presence. One need not say anything profound in order to have an impact on another person's life. Simply taking the time to be present can hold much more impact than speaking.

And now we enter into this Sacred Time, I have a sense that we have lost Advent. We are still holding on to Lent, the major Penitential Season. But Advent, a minor Penitential Season, has all but been swallowed up by the "C" word. And no, I do not mean Christmas. Advent has been swallowed up by Commerce. In his apostolic letter *Dies Domini* (The Day of the Lord) Pope St. John Paul II encouraged people to rediscover the meaning of the Sabbath. You might consider reading that brief statement from the Holy Father. It would be very much worth your time. (Pun intended.) Just as Sunday has been replaced with "the weekend," which is now occupied by sports in the Western World, Advent has been hijacked by shopping. During the fleeting weeks of Advent there will be demands made upon us, some legitimate many not at all. Which calls on us to heed the admonition we receive today: *Be watchful! Be alert!*

We are regularly duped into looking forward to the *tunc* (then) and miss entirely the *nunc* (now). I know myself well enough that I need to be intentional about what it is I am doing and observing. I regularly comment to friends and colleagues that if you want to hide something from me put it on the bulletin board. Take a lesson from that theatrical symbol of a life poorly lived, Willie Lohman. In his play <u>Death of a Salesman</u>, Arthur Miller has Loham literally scream: Attention must be paid! That is sort of what Isaiah the Prophet, St. Paul and John the Baptist do for us throughout Advent. We are called to realign our intellect and our intentions and fix our vision on the arrival of Christ not be fixated on the upcoming Yuletide celebrations.

The call for vigilance that we have all throughout the season of Advent is to be on the watch for the arrival of the Lord into our world. You may think of this arrival occurring at the end of the world. I would offer that the arrival is going to come to you today. In all probability you've picked up the bulletin while you were at Mass. Did you watch for His arrival there and then in the sacred moments of the Liturgy? Or were you checking your cell phone? Did you hear His Word? Or were you chatting about your afternoon plans with the person next to you? Granted that distractions happen; however, sometimes they are self-generated. Being a disciple requires discipline. Waiting requires strength and discipline.

This season of Advent is not to be a period of passivity that only raises levels of frustration. Of Advent, Pope Francis said: [During Advent] "we journey to meet him, to encounter him with our hearts and our lives, to meet him, the living One, as he is; to meet him in faith." All kinds of preparation will go into the next few weeks as the great season of Christmas renews us once again. Be renewed now in the spiritual preparation of watching for the Lord. Would you consider taking up the practice of daily scripture reading? Make a commitment to use these upcoming days as spiritual preparation for the great feast we anticipate but cannot rush.





TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Advent calendars appear now in many homes, and newfangled formats are even available on line. Children have fun up to you! opening the doors and windows keyed to the days counting down to Christmas. Behind each door is a picture related to the Christmas mystery, perhaps a scripture verse or saying, but more and more these days something totally unconnected to religious life, like a small toy or a chocolate treat, appears instead. The Advent calendar is not very old as traditions go. We can trace it back to German-speaking Christians, both


