Thoughts from the Second Floor Front Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord

January 7, 2024

Our celebration of Christmas continues. Liturgically the Christmas season extends to the celebration of the Baptism of the Lord after which we enter into what is called Ordinary Time. It was a custom years ago to keep Christmas until the Feast of the Presentation – in February! In our contemporary culture it seems Christmas decorations go up on or around Halloween and are removed on the 26th. Keeping Christmas is evidently becoming more and more challenging. However, today we are given an opportunity to come to a deeper appreciation of what the world celebrates, too hurriedly, and what we are called to translate in our own unique way, regularly, even daily.

In his Infancy Narrative St. Matthew presents the Magi as the ones who alone recognize this marvelous birth and the extraordinary aspects of this baby's arrival. One of the most ironic aspects of the story is that the Jewish leadership, Herod and his community are thrown into absolute panic. When King Herod heard this, he was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. Matthew's gospel was written for a Jewish audience. Scholars speculate that his community is composed mostly of converts from Judaism. Matthew presents Jesus as the fulfillment off the prophecies concerning the Messiah which are found all throughout the Hebrew Scriptures.

The irony continues in that the Magi, Gentiles, are the only ones see who Jesus is and they seek Him out. It is the Magi who have the Epiphany; it is they who see and understand what the event means. Herod is afraid and the community is confused. How about us? For the weeks of Advent, admittedly more brief than usual, we have been preparing and now throughout the Christmas season we celebrate His birth among us. Do we recognize Him now and beyond the Christmas scenes of greeting cards filled with good wishes and gifts given and received?

A lot of pious lore has risen about these mysterious figures. They are identified as three in number, probably because of the gifts presented when they meet the Christ Child. Even their names have been handed down through tradition: Melchiore, Balthazar and Caspar. The gifts themselves are symbolic and represent a further recognition of who Jesus is and what his future holds. The gift of gold is appropriate for a King. The incense is in keeping with His role as Priest. The myrrh, used in that part of the world then and now to prepare bodies for burial, foreshadows eventually His passion and death. The shadow of the cross is never far in Matthew's account.

Despite Herod's deceptions and false promises of support, the magi, directed in a dream to avoid the King, elect to go home by a different route. We are told that they were warned not to return to Herod and that "they departed for their country by another way." I've seen that verse translated in another manner. The translation by Fr. Ronald Knox, an Anglican priest who converted to the Catholic faith was "... they returned to their county in a manner that was different." The connotation here that Knox is making is not that the route is different but the travelers are. They are different because of their encounter with the Christ Child.

Would that were also true of all of us. We have met the Christ, not as a child but in the profound encounter of Jesus in the Eucharist. Not as that baby in a manger but in the nameless face of the poor and those who have been marginalized. Not in the infant in Mary's arms but in the wrinkled hands, soft as flower petals with paper thin skin of the elderly who simply need a visit, a touch and a kind word.

As we exit church this weekend may what was said of the magi so long ago be true of us. Because of our encounter with Jesus may we return to our homes in a manner that is different.



The St. Cornelius Literary Society

The next read for our Bibliophiles is <u>Death Comes</u> for the Archbishop by Willa Cather.

In the year 1850, two horsemen ride through the New Mexico desert. Jean Marie Latour and Joseph Vaillant have been charged with establishing the first Catholic diocese in that uncharted land of redrock mountains and waterless wilderness. Almost three centuries after the first Franciscan missionaries arrived in the country, the people are adrift from their religious moorings, their missions in



ruins, their children uninstructed. Assisted by his dauntless and valorous vicar, Bishop Latour claims the land and the souls who live there "for the glory of God": sowing the seeds of the Catholic faith in the shallow, the rocky, and the fertile soil of his immense and forbidding jurisdiction.

Bereft of artificiality and imbued with an unstressed spiritual assurance, Death Comes for the Archbishop attains the lofty heights and grand stature of legend. Thanks to Cather's deeply imaginative skill, it does so without sacrificing the solid humanity of its characters or the stark severity of their time and place. The result, in the evocative words of Lee Wilson Dodd, is "a severe, purely designed chalice of handbeaten silver, filled to the brim with the white essential wine of love—love of man to man, love of God to man, love of man to God."


Holy Hour - Join Us!

GOD'S PROMISE TO ALL PEOPLE

Today Isaiah reminds the people of God that the land shall be restored to their possession, they shall rejoice to see their people return from the bondage of exile, and that they shall be a light to the nations. In other words, through the people of Israel, the Savior shall come to all people who seek God with a sincere heart. This brings joy and the radiance of God's glory to all the world and to all people everywhere. Through the fidelity of the people of God, and through God's fidelity to them, all people shall become God's children and rejoice in the fulfillment of God's promise to Israel.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Where on earth would you go to honor the magi? Iran or Saudi Arabia, Tarshish or the Isles come to mind, but Cologne, Germany would be a good choice. There is the largest reliquary in the world: a gilded and ornamented triple casket gleaming high above the altar. In the fourth century, the supposed relics of the wise men were taken from Constantinople to Milan, where they remained until the German Emperor with the unlikely name Frederick Barbarossa (Red Beard) gave them to the Archbishop of Cologne. Ever since, pilgrims have

streamed into the city to honor the magi, the first of all pilgrims, and thus the heavenly patrons of all who have some holy wanderlust.

This largest Gothic cathedral in Europe today was begun in the mid-1200s to house the relics. In medieval times, the relics in a city's possession were often the key to a sound international economy. The reliquary was last opened in 1864, and the remains of three men were indeed discovered. The cathedral is well worth a visit, with enormous twin spires forming the largest façade of any church in the world (it is the model for St. Patrick's in New York). Construction began in 1248 and ended in 1880, a six-hundred-year project. Today, it is a World Heritage Site, described by the U.N. as "an exceptional work of human creative genius." This great treasure of our tradition suffered fourteen direct bomb hits in World the Shrine of the Three Kings has been the centerpiece War II but did not collapse. It survived while the city of the city's cathedral since the fourth century. Today it burned around it, preserved, the townspeople say, by three heavenly patrons.





IT'S 2024, SO I'M EARLY

Vince Lombardi and Tom Hanks inspire a New Year's resolution.

January 7, 2024



If you are searching for a New Year's resolution that will lead you to success in life, it's not too late. In fact, not being late is the whole point. If you have driven down a certain street in Green Bay, Wis., you already understand this. The street is Lombardi Avenue, which runs directly past Lambeau Field, home of the Packers.

There is a large clock outside the football stadium. The clock may confuse or even startle people who don't know about it. Isn't it displaying the wrong time? That depends on how you define "wrong." The clock is set to run 15 minutes ahead. Your wristwatch or phone may say it's 3:15 p.m., but the clock on the stadium says 3:30. It's set to Lombardi Time, to honor a demand the late Packers coach Vince Lombardi insisted his players obey: If you're not 15 minutes early to practice, you're late. And you can expect to be fined.

His point was that people who want to succeed should have the discipline and courtesy not to keep others waiting. It's a matter of respect: respect for the people with whom you work, and respect for yourself. The way to guarantee that you're never late—that you're never in a flustered rush to begin a task—is to get there a quarter-hour early.

"I was like a lot of kids growing up in Green Bay," the Packers' official historian, Cliff Christl, told me. "Lombardi Time was brainwashed into us. Promptness is important. It leads to good things. I still get everywhere 15 minutes before the scheduled start time." You can't go wrong by being early. The actor Steve Zahn tells the story about his big break, being cast in the 1996 movie "That Thing You Do!," written and directed by Tom Hanks. He and three other young actors were hired to portray a rock band called the Wonders. They were on top of the world—they were going to co-star in a movie with Mr. Hanks.

Early in the filming, according to Mr. Zahn, the quartet arrived on the set a little late. The crew was waiting, as was Mr. Hanks. He gestured for them to join him in a trailer, out of earshot of the rest of the crew. His voice was calm and friendly, but his words were deadly serious. "Hey guys," Mr. Hanks said. "That's the last time that you guys show up late. Not just for this movie.

But for the rest of your lives."

Mr. Zahn and the other young actors realized that Mr. Hanks was doing them a favor—he was letting them know that there's a right way and a wrong way to do your work. They got the message. And I can tell you that Mr. Hanks, as busy and celebrated as he is, practices what he preaches. If he invites you to meet him somewhere at a certain hour, he won't be even a second late.

It's an easy New Year's resolution to make, and it will never let you down. As 2023 ends and 2024 begins, keep that in mind at midnight. Or, to be safe, at 11:45.
