Thoughts from the Second Floor Front II Sunday of Lent

February 25, 2024

Lent is all about transformation, moving from the darkness of sin to the brightness of renewed disciple-ship. To do that we will no doubt need to change which in Lent requires Grace and resolve. Flannery O'Connor wrote that people resist Grace because Grace requires change and change is difficult. The manner we respond to the need for Grace and change is evident though our words and actions. In a General Audience Pope Francis, prior to his visit to Philadelphia in 2015, told the assembly the three most important expressions that are so necessary for a family to embrace. Our Holy Father added: *They are simple expressions, but not so simple to put into practice!* They are: May I? Thank you. I'm sorry.

On the first Sunday of Lent we heard Jesus use the imperative mood when He called out to His followers: *Repent!* That requires the change about which O'Connor wrote. We are required to say I'm sorry to God through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Confession not only cleanses a person spiritually but it also names evil for what it is, objectifies it and requires sinners to take responsibility for it. Once evil has been honestly engaged, then with God's grace and the support of other believers, evil can be overcome by goodness. St. John Henry Newman once said: *People are generally not as bad as they could be. But they are not as good as the might be.*

From the Hebrew Scriptures this week we read that Abraham was called to change. With a direction from God which is more than counterintuitive we have the story of Abraham and Isaac. The story we hear to-day in the first reading from Genesis reveals that a life of faith involves: a time of darkness, a trial and loving trust. Both characters, Abraham and Isaac, manifest their faith in God and in each other. Abraham does not understand what he has been ordered to do. We are rightly horrified at the prospect of human sacrifice. Ending the life of his only son would seem to, not just impede the fulfillment of God's plan, it would end any possibility of Abraham's children being as countless as the stars in the sky. Still Abraham trusted. Isaac did not understand what it was that his father was requiring of him. Still Isaac trusted. How about us?

There are aspects of our life over which we have no control. I am not talking about the weather. On that topic alone we expend enormous amounts of our personal resources. Whoever would have thought that an entire television network would dedicate itself to reporting about the weather? Yet despite all our interest, there is absolutely nothing that any of us can do to affect a change. But what about those things in our life we can change? What about those things in our life that do not belong in the life of a believer, the life of a disciple. The season of Lent is all about change. Are we, like Abraham, courageous enough to follow a life of faith that involves challenges to us at the deepest level of our being?

Rejoice in our Catholic faith. It empowers us to recognize the ability of God to live and act in and through us. A noted physicist was once asked what the strongest force in the universe was. He answered as a scientist and a believer: Love. He further explained that loving The Love, the One who first loved, enables you to draw on that love and then extend it to others. That is faith. Life without faith is death.

In these days of Lent and beyond, when we are tested, tried and in darkness realize that our faith will enable us not to be well but to be victorious. Have you noticed that in the celebration of Mass in Lent all the prayers tend to look forward to Easter and beyond? Keep your eyes fixed on that future glory and embrace the moment.

Lent is the annual preparation for Easter observance calling us to reform our lives and to open our hearts to the spiritual blessings God has promised to bestow on us. Lent begins Ash Wednesday and ends Holy Thursday evening when the Triduum begins.

What Must I do?

According to the Church's Canon Law, all healthy Catholics from age 18 to 59 are required to fast and abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, and to abstain from meat on all other Fridays of Lent. Youth 14 and older are also to abstain from meat on those days. "Fasting" means that no more than one main meal is eaten daily, while in the same day no more than two partial meals are eaten which together don't equal the one main meal.

What Should I do?

Take the necessary steps to get yourself on the road to conversion and spiritual renewal. To help you do this, the three main Lenten disciplines urged are prayer, fasting and almsgiving. We are invited during Lent to practice these disciplines often. But these aren't just chores we must do because the Church strongly urges them; they are above all opportunities to grow in faith and in love for God.

Why Prayer, Fasting and Alms?

The Lenten basic practices of prayer, fasting and almsgiving are rooted in Jesus' original guidance about how to be his disciples that we find in the Sermon on the Mount (Mt Chapters 5-7). The Catechism of the Catholic Church (#1966-1972) also reminds us that Jesus here outlines for us the new law which, if we embrace and implement it, will lead us more surely to the interior renewal and growth in holiness and perfection that Jesus expects of us as his disciples.

Should I set Lenten Goals?

Absolutely. Reflect prayerfully about your Lenten resolutions before making them. Then make yourself a list. But be modest. You may be setting yourself up for disappointment if you set unrealistic goals. And doing a little with love and devotion is spiritually more beneficial than trying to do much but doing it halfheartedly.


Saint Gregory of Narek, Monk and Doctor of the Church

Gregory was raised in a monastery and eventually entered the Narek Monastery, known as Narekavank in what is now Turkey, as a monk and lived there for nearly the entirety of his life.

At the time, Armenia was experiencing a literature, paint-

ing, architecture, and theological renaissance, in which Gregory participated.

As an Armenian monk, Gregory lived humbly and taught at the monastic school. He wrote his prayers in the encyclopedia of prayer for all nations in hopes the book would one day guide people of all stations around the world to prayer.



He was a leader of the well-developed school of Armenian mysticism at the Monastery and was asked to answer the question, "What can one offer to God, our creator, who already has everything and knows everything better than we could ever express it?"

In his Book of Prayer, also called the Book of Lamentations or the Song of Songs, Gregory wrote that the answer to the question is "the sighs of the heart." The book contains 91 prayers and was completed one year before he died.

Several miracles and traditions have been traced back to Gregory and he is known as "the watchful angel in human form."

Gregory of Narek was venerated as a saint by the Armenian Catholic Church and is also recognized as a saint of the Roman Catholic church. On April 12, 1015, Pope Francis officially proclaimed Gregory of Narek as a Doctor of the Church.



From Laudato Si' (236):


It is in the Eucharist that all that has been created finds its greatest exaltation... In the Eucharist, fullness is already

Eucharist is itself an act of cosmic love... The







The story of four modern American Catholics who made literature out of their search for God. In the mid-twentieth century four American Catholics came to believe that the



Abraham's obedience foreshadows the obedience of Jesus to God's promise of salvation. The obedience of Abraham is rewarded in the birth to him, through Isaac, of many nations. The obedience of Jesus is rewarded in the salvation of all people for all time.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The second Sunday of Lent every year recalls the Transfiguration of the Lord. Since the fourth century, Mount Tabor has been the focus of devotion to this event. As mountains go, it is not particularly lofty, rising about fifteen hundred feet, within view of the Sea of Galilee and very close to Nazareth. Scripture doesn't identify the mountain, but in the year 348 Saint Cyril of Jerusalem said he preferred Mount Tabor to Mount Hermon as the site of the Transfiguration, and his opinion won. It has long been a strategic military

site, and ancient fortresses are visible on the heights. Over the centuries, churches and fortified monasteries rose on the constructing the present church on the site in 1924.

The top of the mountain is divided into Greek Orthodox and Latin (that's us) zones. At one time, tourists arrived on the summit by bus, but this is no longer permitted. Some ride bicycles up a challenging and winding path, while others take the four thousand three hundred steps constructed for Christian pilgrims in the fourth century. It's hard to imagine the fishermen following Jesus up this craggy mountain without complaint. Visitors will sympathize with Peter's plan to construct booths and stay put with Jesus, Moses, and Elijah for a while, enjoying the view, and planning the trip back down.





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
