

Thoughts from the Second Floor Front III Sunday of Lent

March 3, 2024

Our Lenten Journey continues as we mark the beginning of the third week in this annual serious but not somber trek towards Easter. This week our guide in Sacred Scripture leads us to water. It was through the waters of baptism that we began our journey and at the end of our journey water will be sprinkled over our sacred remains. The element of water is an essential need for our lives, both physical and spiritual dimensions. I remember somewhere in my reading; I believe it was about the hunger strikers in Ireland in the 80's and 90's, that if you stopped eating today you could live for another 75 to 90 days. If you stop drinking water, you would be dead in a week.

The Israelites cry out for water, the Holy Spirit is poured into the hearts of the Romans and Jesus satisfies the sinful woman's thirst with living water. Her encounter with Jesus changes her life. What slowly emerges in the story from John's gospel is the story of this woman's life and it has not been a good one. When she enters into the dialogue with Jesus, she is snappish, even insulting and sarcastic. However, given the life she's had it is not surprising that she is hostile to Him. "Go call your husband and come back." The woman answered and said to him, "I do not have a husband." Jesus answered her, "You are right in saying, I do not have a husband. For you have had five husbands, and the one you have now is not your husband."

Even in our contemporary culture marrying five times is considered, by most people, outrageous. Why has she done this? We can only speculate but the men to whom she was married in all probability used her for their own pleasure and then, growing bored or hostile to her simply dropped her. She has been consistently maltreated, leading her to be hostile and suspicious of all people because of her own history of relationships.

The Samaritan woman, is about to begin her life of faith. However, she does not know it. When Jesus begins the conversation with her, itself a violation of social mores and the culture of the day, she has no idea that her world is about to be turned on its head. He begins to wear her resistance away and brings her to a level of understanding that changes her life. Through the dialogue with Him, the Samaritan woman gradually begins to appreciate Jesus for who He is. This is demonstrated through her responses and the names and titles she uses to address Jesus:

How can you, a **Jew**, ask me, a Samaritan woman, for a drink?

Sir, you do not even have a bucket.

Sir, give me this water,

...I can see that you are a prophet.

Could he possibly be the **Christ**?

Jew, Sir, Prophet, Christ. She uses all of these titles in the span of one conversation on a hot afternoon in Samaria. She has gradually come to an understanding of who Jesus is. That is the way of life for a disciple. We come to know Jesus early in our life of faith and the more time and effort we spend with Him and on our relationship with Him we come to know Him better. At the end of the story the woman goes off, leaving her water jar behind. Remember she went to the well to get water but after the dialogue with the Master she leaves without the bucket. Why? She no longer needs the water that comes from the well. She has the lifegiving water Jesus told her about earlier.

In and through her encounter with Jesus the woman was transformed. She has become a better and more enthusiastic apostle than the Twelve. Great things can happen when you start a dialogue with God. As our Lenten journey continues may our dialogue continue as well, drawing us more closely into a relationship with Him.


IN COMMUNION WITH OUR SAINTS

Saints Perpetua and Felicity - Martyrs

"When my father in his affection for me was trying to turn me from my purpose by arguments and thus weaken my faith, I said to him, 'Do you see this vessel—waterpot or whatever it may be? Can it be called by any other name than what it is?' 'No,' he replied. 'So also I cannot call myself by any other name than what I am—a Christian.'" So writes PERPETUA, young, beautiful, well-educated, a noblewoman of Carthage, mother of an infant son and chronicler of the persecution of

the Christians by Emperor Septimius Severus.

Despite threats of persecution and death, Perpetua, FELICITY (a slavewoman and expectant mother) and three companions, Revocatus, Secundulus and Saturninus, refused to renounce their Christian faith. For their unwillingness, all were sent to



the public games in the amphitheater. There, Perpetua and Felicity were beheaded, and the others killed by beasts.

Perpetua's mother was a Christian and her father a pagan. He continually pleaded with her to deny her faith. She refused and was imprisoned at 22.

In her diary, Perpetua describes her period of captivity: "What a day of horror! Terrible heat, owing to the crowds! Rough treatment by the soldiers! To crown all, I was tormented with anxiety for my baby.... Such anxieties I suffered for many days, but I obtained leave for my baby to remain in the prison with me, and being relieved of my trouble and anxiety for him, I at once recovered my health, and my prison became a palace to me and I would rather have been there than anywhere else."

Felicity gave birth to a girl a few days before the games commenced.

Perpetua's record of her trial and imprisonment ends the day before the games. "Of what was done in the games themselves, let him write who will." The diary was finished by an eyewitness.



KEEP HOLY THE SABBATH

than to review the Ten Commandments. The first three, having to do with our right relationship to God, get the most ink. The one we busy people probably have the most problem with is keeping holy the Sabbath.

that dirty diaper (poor baby!)?

We need to depend on God to discern how to observe real Sabbath time in our lives. The point of this commandment is that God has given us a great gift: one whole day per week when we are free to rest, worship God, sing, feast, love, and rejoice. Archeologists believe that this striking, gold-domed crown of a shrine is set precisely where the Holy of Holies once was. Jews believe that the rock is the exact spot where Abraham was prepared to sacrifice Isaac. It is not a If we take this commandment literally, babies will go mosque, as some think, but a shrine, the oldest one in the undiapered and dishes will stay on the table, or perhaps Muslim world. For them, the rock is the place from which meals will not be served. The sick will go unattended and the Prophet Mohammed ascended on a visit to heaven. The nothing that has anything to do with physical labor will be Crusaders mistook the shrine for the actual Temple of Solodone. Is mental labor really work? How about changing mon, and the infamous Knights Templar used it as their headquarters and model for their churches elsewhere. The geometric perfection of the shrine is a mathematician's dream. The inscriptions are not exactly hospitable though, since they encourage Christians to "depart from error" and declare that "Jesus son of Mary was only a messenger of God." In ancient times, those who prayed here after walking around the rock were given a certificate entitling the bearer to admission to paradise. The ticket had to be buried with them.
