Thoughts from the Second Floor Front IV Sunday in Lent

March 10, 2024

The Gospel of John is divided into two sections: the Book of Signs and the Book of Glory. Today's excerpt is from the Book of Signs in which our Lord performs seven signs each becoming greater in meaning and more exacting in the response of the participants and the witnesses to the sign. No miracle in the Gospel is performed solely for the benefit of the recipient. Those who are witnesses to the work of Jesus are also called to respond to what they have seen and heard. There are all sorts of characters in the story today and each of them is expected to make a response to the miracle of the man born blind who can now see.

Among the most notable people in our history as a nation who was blind is the great Helen Keller. Her story is ably related in the play The miracle worker. The story revolves around her teacher, Miss Anne Sullivan, and her efforts to educate Helen as a young girl. It is a touching story and brings about a dramatic presentation of what must have been a great struggle for both teacher and student. Helen Keller is immensely quotable. One of her statements is appropriate for our Gospel passage today: "The most pathetic person in the world is someone who has sight but no vision." The gift the man in the gospel received was both vision and faith. Physical sight in Sacred Scripture is often an allegory for one's faith. The man has been given the gift of faith and Jesus assures him that giving others vision is the reason He came into the world.

Our vision, challenged on occasion, affirmed at other times, must be consistent with the call we have as His disciples. I remember reading a book by Cardinal Timothy Dolan, Archbishop of New York – To whom shall we go? The book is a series of meditations on the life and response of St. Peter. As a writer, Dolan is direct and easily accessible. He is basically saying that the believer is best served if he or she, like St. Peter, keeps his or her eyes fixed on Jesus. When St. Peter does this, he is able to accomplish great things. When he focuses on himself or something other than the Christ, he begins to fail.

Evidently part of the means that must be at our disposal is that we are to see things, people and events as God sees them. Is that not a challenge? Take as your example the great prophet Samuel who is sent by God to select a King for Israel. *Do not judge from his appearance...* Samuel is instructed by God. How often we have done that in matters and circumstances less important than selecting the Lord's anointed.

In this season of Lent, **the** penitential season in the Liturgical Year, we are called to put aside those aspects of our life that obscure our ability to see Jesus. We must also make a conscious decision to look for God. Once St. Teresa of Calcutta was asked by the British journalist Malcolm Muggeridge (A thoroughly British name) how she could do the work she does. Going out into the streets of Calcutta and picking up people left to die in the streets amid the filth and refuse in which they lay. He told her: *I wouldn't do that for a million dollars*. She responded: *Neither would I*.

We may not be called on to do the work of a St. Teresa of Calcutta, but as disciples we are called on to see Christ in the world and in each other. We have been given the gift of faith and that is to lead us to collaborate as best we can with the effort to work for the Kingdom of God. With our sight, with our vision, may we throughout this season keep our eyes fixed on Jesus and look for Him in others. And more to the point be Jesus for others so that through our words, our vision, our work, Jesus can be made present in our world. A world that we all know needs Him now.

the PLC. The goal of this Scripture study will be to broaden our knowledge of Scripture, our church's teaching regarding the Scriptures, and how it can enhance



Why is the Fourth Sunday of Lent called Laetare Sunday?

The name comes from the first words of the Entrance

Laetare Sunday

A day of HOPE

Easter is Near

Antiphon for Mass, "Laetare Jerusalem" — "Rejoice, O Jerusalem".

The fourth Sunday marks the half -way point of the Lenten season, even though the Thursday before Laetare Sunday is the actual middle day of Lent.

Signs of joy are allowed on this day, expressing our belief in the

hope of the resurrection and to inspire us as we continue our Lenten commitments to prayer, fasting and almsgiving.

Symbolizing joy, rose-colored Mass vestments may be worn instead of purple, to indicate the contrast between Laetare and the other Sundays of Lent. According to the Roman Missal, instrumental music is permitted and the altar may be decorated with flowers.

The tradition of using the color rose is thought to come from the tradition of the Golden Rose; at one time popes sent golden roses to Catholic heads of state in Europe on this Sunday.

The Fourth Sunday of Lent was once called Refreshment Sunday, or the Sunday of the Five Loaves, for the miracle of the boy with loaves and fishes in the Gospel of John.

The Fourth Sunday of Lent was also previously observed as Mothering Sunday, in reference to Paul's second letter to the Corinthians, where the faithful are called "sons and daughters of God". Families visited the church where they were baptized, or made offerings to the cathedral, or mother-church, on this Sunday.

often, even in our own time, mocked, disregarded, and mistreated rather than thanked and listened to.

The book of Chronicles tells the results of these sins: the destruction of the temple and all of Jerusalem, murder, mayue to wreak works of darkness and violence? We are remindjust as individuals.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Year B of the Lectionary has the Letter to the Ephesians today. Ephesus, today in Turkey, was in the first century a great Greek city, the center for the worship of Diana, the goddess of the hunt. It was a vast city even by modern standards, having nearly half a million people in the time of Paul. Yet that was a time of economic recession and moral decay. No wonder Saint Paul stayed here the longest. It gave him an enormous and religiously curious audience.
