

Thoughts from the Second Floor Front IV Sunday of Easter

May 11, 2025

The liturgy of the Word throughout the season of Easter is structured in the same manner each week: a reading from Acts, a reading from Revelation and a reading from the Fourth Gospel. The most challenging to embrace is, in all probability, the reading from the Book of Revelation. It is a literary genre known as Apocalyptic Literature. The sacred writer does not misrepresent the visions of God he receives, but to us it seems that he is certainly disguising them. Sometimes these disguises take on extraordinary, if not bizarre, forms. Today is a very calm day with the Apocalypse. However, we have to ask what the vision has to do with us in our contemporary experience of the faith.

I would offer that in an analogous way we too are experiencing a "time of great distress." The author was referring to an empire wide persecution against the nascent Church. Domitian, who demanded that all address him as *Dominus et Deus – My Lord and my God*, had engaged in a systematic and savage attack on the new Way, as our faith was initially called. One of John's purposes in writing Revelation was to offer hope to a beleaguered and beaten people. Evil cannot win the day because the victory is already ours in Jesus who has defeated the ultimate enemy – death.

Where then is the analogy? How is our "time of great distress" characterized? The opposition we experience will not be in the form of a wicked Emperor who forces his whimsical and capricious will on us. The opposition that we experience will be much more subtle. We and our values will be ignored. Not rejected but not even given consideration. I believe there is a sort of malaise that has affected our contemporary society. The malaise is chiefly seen in a level of self absorption, if not bordering on then running over into Narcissism. For a disciple, this cannot be accepted.

John writes of a great number of people in his vision. The numbers of people in our day, unlike in John the Seer's vision, are not on our side. Despite a reported record number of people who came into the Church at Easter, our numbers are down. Whether it is Mass attendance, marriage or baptisms, which means that there is a greater demand on us to live in a manner consistent with the call we have received from the Shepherd whose voice we still hear. You have heard His voice; otherwise you would not be in a church on a Sunday morning. You have heard His voice and responded. As the days of this upcoming week unfold when we find ourselves immersed in the demands of our daily work and life, may we not only hear His voice but speak in His voice to others. Through us, through our self-giving not taking, through our patience, kindness and constancy may others come to know the Risen Lord and our unity with God.

This Sunday is generally known as Good Shepherd Sunday because the Gospel excerpt proclaimed addresses the image of Jesus as our Shepherd. As I write this the Cardinal Electors are preparing to enter the Sistine Chapel for the election of a new universal Shepherd and successor to Saint Peter for the needs of our times. On Sabbatical in Ireland ten years ago I found myself in a unique position. I was celebrating Mass in a very rural area of County Donegal and the congregation in attendance was composed mainly of families who raise sheep for a living.

There I was preaching about shepherds and sheep to shepherds who raise sheep for a living. For a kid from 28th and Tasker to preach to such a gathering on such a topic was more than a stretch. Incredibly, or perhaps due to the congregations' charity, I was not laughed off the altar. I was welcomed back Sunday after Sunday and as the time of my sabbatical was ending, I would be lying if I said I was not all that sad to be leaving that place. I miss it still and hope someday to return. The ancient Greek Philosopher Heraclitus was entirely correct when he said: *No man ever steps into the same river twice. For it is not the same river and he is not the same man. That being true, I would at least like to put my feet in it again.*

Sunday, May 11, 2025 **Heed Christ's Voice**

Today's Readings: Acts 13:14, 43–52; Psalm 100:1–2, 3, 5; Revelation 7:9, 14b–17; John 10:27–30.

Having been raised in the country near many farms, I know the demanding work that a farmer/shepherd must put in to keep the flock or herd healthy and safe. Like our story, the Jack knew each of his cattle and could tell if one was missing. Similarly, we have come to know Christ in Baptism, and he intimately knows us. In Baptism, Jesus calls us to be Lent our reflection led us to listen more carefully and heed Jesus' invitation.

The Paschal Candle

A question arose about the Easter Candle (often called the Paschal candle as well) and what it is that Msgr. Diamond puts in the candle at the Easter vigil.

This is a great question since our new candle was blessed at the Easter Vigil and it will be used throughout the year as a source of light at Baptisms and at funerals as a sign of the Christians own Passover. From this candle, you may recall, your own candles were lite that evening illuminating the darken church as we celebrated our Lord's resurrection. The new candle is a symbol of our renewed life in Christ, our hearts burn with the Joy of the resurrection.

If you take a moment after Mass some time, take a close look at what you see. A cross, symbolizing the Paschal mystery, Jesus death and Resurrection. You also see two Greek letters; alpha, the first letter in the Greek alphabet, and the omega, the last letter in the alphabet (see yellow square). These letters represent that God is everlasting,



encompasses all things, from first to last, the beginning to the end - all of life. From the time you are born, to the time you die. You also will notice five objects that look like pins (blue circles). These are inserted into the candle while prayers are recited. They are grains of incense that represent the five wounds of Jesus; two for his hands, one for his feet, one for the spear that pierced his side and one for the crown of thorns. The last item to mention are the numerals for the new year (red square).

Like all symbols the candle reflects elements of our faith. God is the first and the last, from the time of our baptism, to the time of our death. Always burning, ever present at the font of our salvation.





The reception of Holy Communion at Sunday Mass is such an expected feature of the Mass these days that it is surprising to realize that for many centuries, receiving Communion was a relatively rare event in the life of a faithful Christian. "Easter duty" means that Catholics must celebrate reconciliation if aware of serious sin. and receive Holy Communion during the Easter season.

For a while, this was a requirement of Easter week, and Each year this Fourth Sunday of Easter celebrates later extended to the whole season of fifty days, and

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
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
