Thoughts from the Second Floor Front XXI Sunday in Ordinary Time August 24, 2025

J. F. Powers was a 20th Century Catholic writer more so than he was a writer who happened to be Catholic. Some authors shun the appellation “Catholic writer.” I am not so sure Powers would have been among them. His works have never achieved the sort of recognition that he deserves much beyond the academy but I think he was true to his craft as well as his faith. Perhaps one of the reasons that his writings never took hold in popular literature was that he mainly used priests as the subject of his work and his work was mainly short stories.

One of my favorites is a story entitled The Prince of Darkness. In it Powers tell the tale of Fr. Ernest Burner a priest of less than mediocre abilities, who spends most of his time identifying flaws in others while simultaneously puffing up his own feeble abilities and accomplishments in a dream like world of fabrications and excess. Sort of like a clerical version of Walter Mitty, only with an edge. Burner’s nickname is the Prince of Darkness because of his hobby which is photography; requiring him to be in a darkroom. Don’t miss the irony: a priest’s nickname being the same one as a title for the evil one and the fact that a priest, called to proclaim Christ the Light, spends a lot of time in the dark.

The reason Burner comes to mind this weekend is that at the end of the story Burner meets with his bishop, whom Burner expects is about to reward him with a plum of a parish. Instead the Bishop assigns him to a lower place. It is a great reversal. And Burner, given an opportunity for personal redemption, in all probability more than resents the placement.

The great reversal. “For behold, some are last who will be first, and some are first who will be last.” (Luke 13:30). The expectation a disciple should consider with some regularity is the virtue of humility – recognizing your own talents and abilities for what they are and a willingness to place the other ahead of self. We live in an age in which there is frequent expectations of entitlement. Everybody gets a medal, no matter how much mediocrity is the mark of our performance. Burner expected to be promoted rather than demoted. Some in Jesus’ day thought that they would be the first to enter the Kingdom. A kingdom created in their own minds rather than the Kingdom intended by God.

Notice that when Jesus gives this teaching on Salvation and Rejection he is on his way to Jerusalem where he will experience rejection for the sake of our salvation. Jesus should be first because he is the best among us but is treated in the worst way – placing all of us ahead of himself.

Jesus has a reversal in mind for us all. His reversal ultimately involves freedom. Not licentiousness, as our contemporary culture would likely define freedom. Freedom to be the person, the best person, we are capable of being. In the great irony of Christianity, we can only become the best self when we live for the other. Our life only makes sense if it is lived for another. That other can take on a host of images but for most of us that other involves family, spouses, colleagues, classmates. We are to be part of that great cloud of witnesses mentioned last week in the reading from the letter to the Hebrews. Not just the faithful who now rejoice in God’s presence but the members of the church, the members of our faith community, our sisters and brothers in Christ.



THE PARISH CHURCH AND ITS FURNISHINGS ALTAR CLOTHS

The altar used for Mass is covered with a cloth. At home and in restaurants, we often cover our tables, especially for a banquet or meal of some importance. Similarly, the altar is covered because of “the banquet in which the Body and Blood of the Lord are offered” (General Instruction of the Roman Missal, 304).

But the altar is covered for another reason: “Out of reverence for the celebration of the memorial of the Lord” (ibid.). We dignify the altar where we will solemnly remember the mystery of Jesus’ Death and Resurrection.



When a new altar is dedicated for a church, it is sprinkled with holy water, smeared with Chrism, incensed, and then covered with a cloth. Many of these symbols also appear in the baptismal liturgy, suggesting that the altar is covered in a garment just as the faithful are, as a sign of eternal life.

There are no rules governing the material to be used. The size, shape, and decoration of the cloth are to be “in keeping with the altar’s structure” (ibid.).

At least one white cloth must be used. In the United States, cloths of other colors may also adorn the altar, but the topmost must be white. It may cover the top only; it need not dangle over the other cloths.

After the Mass of the Lord’s Supper on Holy Thursday, the altar cloths are completely removed. The Good Friday liturgy begins with a bare altar. A cloth is placed on the altar just before The Communion Rite, but it is removed again immediately after the Good Friday service, and the altar stands bare until the beginning of the Easter Vigil.

WELCOME THE STRANGER

We have become accustomed to seeing pictures in the media and stories on the news about immigrants from Latin America and refugees from Syria fleeing violence and destruction in their own countries, trying to make their way to a safe place. We have also seen the reactions of people who want to keep them away from their countries, who fail to welcome the stranger and the helpless children. Have we forgotten Jesus' call to comfort the homeless and the stranger? "They shall bring all your brothers and sisters from all the nations . . . to Jerusalem, my holy mountain, says the LORD."

In the three readings for this day, we are told that we are to welcome these strangers, to welcome the discipline of the Lord, which leads to peace, and to "strive to enter through the narrow gate" into the glory of God's own homeland, the reign of God.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION


The wonderful diversity of life and worship among Roman Catholics of East and West is an example of God writing straight with crooked lines. The steady hand of the villainous Emperor Diocletian drew a line across Europe and Africa that split the empire in two,

and for the most part determined how Christians would worship two thousand years later.

Italy's heel and the far northern city of Trieste fell on the Eastern side, and have had a form of Eastern liturgy ever since. Constantinople, which soon became the seat of the Roman Empire, became a base for Christianizing the East up to Russia and Poland. Poland was on the Eastern side, but a series of wars and medieval mayhem pushed the religious boundary back to the Ukraine, and Poland remains an outpost of the Latin Church to this day.

An old rule of thumb declared that whatever religion was observed by the local prince, the people had to follow. This gave rise to persecution and migration as people sought toleration for their expressions of faith. In the United States, we are accustomed to peaceful collaboration among Christians of East and West, a situation that challenges churches that still feel the pinch of age-old division.
