Preparing to Meet God at Mass

"The whole journey of life is a journey of preparation... to see, to feel, to understand the beauty of what lies ahead, of the homeland towards which we walk." -Pope Francis

As we continue this year of Eucharistic Revival, I want to take a number of my bulletin articles to focus on different parts of the Mass; a sort of walk through the Mass from beginning to end, hopefully providing some practical and spiritual advice that will help make our experience of celebrating the Mass more meaningful. Today, we start at the beginning.

The Mass is a moment of communion with heaven. When we come here, we're called out of the ordinary things of life, and enter something that's bigger than ourselves, beyond our world, space and time with all its chaos and drama. Mass—and indeed anytime we enter our parish church—is a special moment where we come before God himself. And as we all know from experience, we have to prepare for special moments: weddings take months of planning; the decision on where we'll go to college or what career we'll take isn't made in an instant. So, too, we must prepare ourselves to meet God—here and in the hereafter.

I must tell you that I think we often presume too much of God. How often I hear: "God doesn't care (*fill in the blank*)." "God doesn't care if I come late to Mass or leave early, as long as I'm here;" "He doesn't' care how I dress; if I sing; whether or not I'm prepared to meet him." *He cares more than you can imagine!* How we present ourselves before God, how well we prepare to meet him and what we do when we're in his presence says *everything* about how important he is to us and how much we value our relationship with him. If we were meeting the Pope or going to an exclusive dinner at a three-star Michelin restaurant, we'd likely be uber-prepared—we'd dress our best; know how to greet the guest of honor; and be well-versed in which fork to use!

So how can we be well-prepared to meet God? First and foremost, ask your guardian angel to help! This angel God created just for you was given to help open your mind, ears, tongue, and heart to receive and worship God as he deserves to be worshiped and adored.

Next, create some specific intentions, individually and as a family, that you'll take to Mass. "Today, we're really going to pray for 'this." "Lord, I know 'X' is going through a really tough time, so I'll offer my reception of Holy Communion for her today." We can carry this over into the devotion of lighting a candle before a shrine to our Blessed Mother or pray to our patron saints. If it's a particularly challenging intention, maybe before Mass we go to Saint Jude (patron saint of lost causes) and ask his intercession. You'd be surprised what adding an intention to your Mass can do!

When we get to the church, DON'T EVER FORGET THE HOLY WATER. This too often goes unused. This blessed water reminds us of our call to holiness and our baptismal promises. When we make the Sign of the Cross with it we remember in whose name we have salvation; and most of all, the devil *hates it*, so it causes him to run away. It's a powerful sacramental that is frequently underused! (Another note here: If you want goodness in your home and evil to flee; take some holy water home with you and use it regularly and liberally. When you run out, we'll make more!)

Two more things in preparation for Mass: First, think for a moment about how you'll approach God in heaven. If you thought: "I'd bow down before him," then doesn't it make sense to do the same here on earth? When we enter his true presence in the church, we should acknowledge him by genuflecting (on the right knee). If you can't genuflect; no problem: make a bow—show some reverence when you come into his presence. Second, spend some time in prayer before Mass begins. Quiet your heart and mind; put yourself into his hands; tell him that you adore him, offer him everything you're thankful for, that you need, and ask him to make this special moment of communion (with heaven and earth) fruitful.

Early Voting – Issue 1 & 2 Threaten Families

Our Catholic faith teaches that parents have a duty to protect and care for their children. These duties are the reason that parents have special rights regarding the education and welfare of children. WHERE DOES IT SAY THAT?



THIS CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT...

THREATENS PARENTAL RIGHTS

By using "individual" instead of adult or woman, anyone under the age of 18 could have an abortion or make any other reproductive decision without their parents' consent or notification.

PUTS WOMEN AT RISK

Current Ohio laws* require abortion providers to explain procedure risks and ensure access to hospital transfer if needed. These health and safety standards could be seen as a "burden" and be eliminated, making it even less safe for women seeking an abortion.

ALLOWS ABORTIONS THROUGH 9 MONTHS OF PREGNANCY

In U.S. law,** "health" includes age or physical, emotional, or psychological well-being. This means a woman's age or emotional health could be cited to justify aborting a full-term baby. An abortion-providing physician would decide when a baby could survive outside the womb, leaving no clear protections for preborn children.

IS MISLEADING

Referring to "miscarriage care" promotes a myth that a "right to abortion" is necessary to preserve care for miscarriages and ectopic pregnancies. This is false. Catholic hospitals have always provided comprehensive miscarriage care and will continue to do so regardless of the outcome of this vote.

ARTICLE I, SECTION 22

The Right to Reproductive Freedom with Protections for Health and Safety

- Every individual has a right to make and carry out one's own reproductive decisions, including but not limited to decisions on contraception, fertility treatment, continuing one's own pregnancy, miscarriage care, and abortion.
- 2. The State shall not, directly or indirectly, burden, penalize, prohibit, interfere with, or discriminate against either an individual's voluntary exercise of this right or a person or entity that assists an individual exercising this right, unless the State demonstrates that it is using the least restrictive means to advance the individual's health in accordance with widely accepted and evidence-based standards of care.
- 3. However, abortion may be prohibited after fetal viability. But in no case may such an abortion be prohibited if in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's treating physician it is necessary to protect the pregnant patient's life or health.
- 4. As used in this Section, "Fetal viability" means "the point in a pregnancy when, in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's treating physician, the fetus has a significant likelihood of survival outside the uterus with reasonable measures. This is determined on a case-by-case basis"; and "State" includes any governmental entity and political subdivision.
- 5. This Section is self-executing.

Did You Know? AllHallowtide

Each November, the Church celebrates two feast days. All Saints' Day is a Holy Day of Obligation and a solemnity celebrated on November 1st. On this day, we celebrate the great Communion of Saints, which includes those holy men and women who have passed before us but have not been canonized. We are especially mindful of our patron saints: the saints whose names we share, those that our families honor, or that our schools or parishes are named.

All Souls' Day is celebrated on November 2nd and is a day to remember and pray for all those who in purgatory - a state in which souls are being purified before entering Heaven. We may also remember those who have died by visiting the cemetery where they are buried, lighting a candle, attending Mass, giving alms, and doing good works.

Though Halloween is a now a mostly secular annual holiday, it is historically connected to All Saints' and All Souls' Days.


Halloween originated with a festival called Samhain, which was celebrated by the ancient Celts. Samhain was a day to celebrate the year's harvest and to honor the dead. As Christianity took hold in the ancient world, the autumnal observance of Samhain took on sacred meaning from the Church's celebration of All Saints' Day, which was originally celebrated in May.


Pope Gregory III designated November 1st to honor the saints. The night before was known as Eve of All Hallows. By the 7th century, these two ancient holidays were merged, making the Eve of All Hallows, later called "Halloween," a time to both acknowledge the passage into death and to celebrate those who have passed into Eternal Life.

While Christians have always prayed for the dead, All Souls' Day began in the 7th century when Odilo of Cluny established a day to pray and give alms for those in purgatory. Though it began as a local feast, by the 10th century it was celebration spread throughout the Church.

The above Brother Knights total 324 years of membership to Sandusky Council 546. We have been blessed by their service to our council.



Grave, Niche and Crypt Adornment Policy

General Adornment Policy

The Catholic Cemeteries of Sandusky are consecrated Catholic grounds, which serve as a sacred space for the burial of the faithful departed. For the beauty of these grounds and the protection of all who visit them, the following rules and regulations have been adopted. This policy replaces all previous policies and agreements.

For the adornment of graves, niches and crypts, simple, noble, and dignified adornments will always take precedence over personal preferences. Because the cemetery is subject to all natural elements, all adornments are placed at the owner's risk. Catholic Cemeteries of Sandusky is not responsible for any items lost, stolen or damaged on the premises. For this reason, items which are highly sentimental or valuable should not be placed on graves, niches or crypts.

For safety purposes, no items may be placed on or around memorials and graves, niches and crypts. This includes benches and statuary that are not originally part of that memorial. Curbing, edging, stones, rock, in-ground plantings are not permitted on graves due to the risk of injury and damage to equipment. Spraying or grass and weed chemicals will be administered by cemetery personnel only.

Items not considered safe or appropriate include all glass, wood, stone, terra cotta and ceramic items, statuary not originally fixed to memorials, pictures, toys, balloons, shepherd hooks, tin cans, trellises or fences. Such items, along with adornments that become unsightly or are not in keeping with these guidelines, will be removed without notice.

Any item(s) placed directly on a memorial marker is at the risk of the owner. Placement directly on bronze memorials may cause discoloration, for which the cemetery is not responsible.

Ground Adornment Policy - April 1st to October 31st


One (1) bouquet of flowers, live or artificial, is permitted per grave space in an approved bronze vase. If a bronze vase is not part of the memorial, one (1) flower arrangement in a heavy or weighted plastic or cement pot is allowed on a previously approved base (approval for new bases will not be granted).—After November 1, 2023, all new memorials must have a bronze vase attached to the memorial or as part of the foundation. Separate vases will be sold with a concrete foundation.

Ground Adornment Policy - November 25th to March 15th

One (1) winter wreath or grave blanket per grave space may be placed after November 15th. We recommend that all bronze vases be inverted to prevent damage during the winter months. Failure to do so is at the owner's risk.

Mausoleum and Columbarium Adornment Policy- All Year

One (1) bouquet of artificial flowers is permitted per crypt or niche in an approved vase. Only cemetery-approved adornments are permitted. All other items attached to the crypt or niche, left on the ground, or on the floor are not permitted and will be removed without notice.

Flag Policy

One American flag may be placed on U.S. Service veteran's graves year-round. One flag, per year, is provided at no cost. Bronze veteran flag holders are highly recommended. Flag guidelines for the United States of America are followed. Flag holders are placed on graves at the owner's risk.

Cemetery Clean Up Dates

Complete removal of all items, including those Mausoleum and Columbarium adornments, is performed on or near March 15th and November 1st, weather permitting. Items to be retained must be removed before these dates. Items remaining on graves, niches or crypts on those dates will be considered disposable and will be disposed of regardless of perceived value.

Visitor Rules

Catholic Cemeteries of Sandusky is open to the public from dawn to dusk.
Visitors shall abide by all signs posted
Only pets on a leash are permitted on the cemetery grounds. Owners are responsible for cleaning-up after their pets.
Anyone younger than 16 years of age must be accompanied by a responsible adult while on cemetery grounds.
Parking is available along the cemetery roadways an at the main office building.
The speed limit on any cemetery road is 10 miles per hour.
Littering is not permitted.
Individuals who vandalize any part of the cemetery will be prosecuted.
Alcoholic beverages are not permitted on cemetery property.

Cemetery Clean Up

Wednesday, November 1

A cemetery clean-up will take place on Wednesday, November 1. Please remove all items of value before this date. Every item left in any bronze vase or container, or on the ground, on those dates will be considered disposable and will be disposed of regardless of its perceived value.

We invite everyone to come to the cemeteries and help with our cemetery clean-up after the Holy Angels 8 A.M. Mass. We will have coffee and donuts at 9 A.M. and clean-up begins at 9:15 A.M.




