SEEKING WISDOM

If God were to speak to us and tell us to ask for anything we want, what would we say? A financially secure life? Health for ourselves and our families? Safety from all the dangers of the world? To how many of us would it occur to ask for wisdom? We just don't think about it much. We think we know how to run our families, our work, our politics, but how many mistaken ideas do we really have, and how do those work out? Do we treat others, even those we dislike, with kindness and understanding? Solomon asked God for the wisdom to know right from wrong and how to govern God's vast people. God was pleased with this request, and granted it to Solomon in abundance. Can we ask for the same in our lives? Would our lives be happier if we were wiser? "We know that all things work for good for those who love God" (Romans 8:28).

THE KINGDOM OF GOD IS LIKE . . .

Parables and more parables. What have we to learn about the reign of God from so many parables? The kingdom of heaven is like a treasure buried in a field. The kingdom of heaven is like a merchant searching for fine pearls. The kingdom of heaven is like a net thrown into the sea. These parables are not hard to understand, for they all point to something valuable being searched for: a treasure, a pearl, good fish. Those who search for these things give up what they have to acquire these precious things. Those who search are praised for their wisdom in valuing what they find more than what they already have. Even the fishermen can distinguish what is good from what is useless and to be discarded.

The kingdom of heaven is something precious to be sought, even above the good things we have in this world. It is more important than anything we already have and treasure. Jesus says that at the end of the age when the good shall be separated from the bad, the good will enjoy the happiness of the kingdom of heaven.

THE NEW AND THE OLD

It is holy wisdom that allows us to realize how valuable the kingdom is. One more parable ends this reading: "Then every scribe who has been instructed in the kingdom of heaven is like the head of a household who brings from his storeroom both the new and the old" (Matthew 13:52). It is like the Church, which knows what to keep from the traditions of the past and what to cherish in the present time. Tradition is something passed down from generation to generation, but not necessarily unchanged. For example, we always have cake to celebrate birthdays. And yet, perhaps in the past that always meant a white or yellow cake with vanilla frosting. Today, it can mean a chocolate cake, an ice cream cake, or even a fruit pie! It can have the number of candles of the birthday person's age, or a candle for each decade and one for each subsequent year, or one big candle. It can even have, as once seen in a catalogue, Roman numeral candles to spell out the years! Traditions can change and still convey the truths they represent. So it is with the Tradition of the Church. The wise leaders bring forth both the new and the old, and seek in the kingdom what is good.

Mass Ad Orientem ("Facing the East")

"For as lightning comes from the east and shines as far as the west, so will be the coming of the Son of Man."

Matthew 24:27

The foundation of the celebration of the Sacred Liturgy of the Roman Catholic Church is rooted in facing east. It is one of the most ancient and consistent Catholic practices throughout Church history.

Mass celebrated *Ad Orientem* can be expressed as the basic Christological form of our prayer. "Praying toward the east means going to meet the coming Christ, in a procession led by the Priest-Celebrant (Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI, *The Spirit of Liturgy*, pg. 69-70)." As we celebrate this Mass, we are much like the ten virgins on a journey together to go and meet their bridegroom (Matthew 25:1-13).

Analogous to that of a captain leading the ship to its ultimate destination, the priest, facing the same direction as the people, guides the people as their shepherd to their destination, Heaven. That is exemplified with sacred architecture, like in this parish. The seating area, or *nave* (Latin for "Ship"), faces towards the sanctuary, which represents Heaven.

By the priest turning towards God with the faithful, he does literally what St. Augustine refers to as "turning toward the Lord." It is through this humbling act of the celebrant that the focus is moved from the priest to the "Sun of Righteousness," Who shall rise (Malachi 4:2).

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

During the Second Vatican Council, a call to restore the "permanent diaconate" emanated from bishops in Latin America and Africa who suffered clergy shortages and required native vocations to tend to the needs of their growing flocks. God has a sense of humor. The diaconate became reconstituted with the first ordination class in Chicago in 1978. The United States soon occupied the vanguard of the revived Order of Deacon. The American Church has retained that position ever since as 80% of the deacons throughout the world minister in the United States.

The first seven deacons in the ancient Church of Jerusalem (among them St. Stephen) enabled the Apostles to preach the Word abroad. The Church bestowed upon them a title that meant, "to wait on table." They devoted themselves to serve the needs of the poor, widows and orphans, the hungry and oppressed. Prior to his martyrdom, a deacon in Rome, St. Lawrence, described the poor as "the treasure of the Church."

Deacons serve as ministers of Word, Worship and Service. Perhaps a deacon preaches in regular rotation in your parish? Perhaps a deacon baptized your child or grandchild, witnessed a family wedding or presided at a friend's or relative's vigil service? Perhaps he rolled up his sleeves and worked in your outreach program or served needy families and seniors at Thanksgiving or Christmas? These deacons and their spouses, who also minister and sacrifice along with their families while their loved one is away, are "some pieces of bread."

You are always so generous. I seldom need to ask. I often just say "thank you." I would be honored if you will assist me to enable many of our long-serving deacons and their generous wives to share in a special event over five days in mid-July, sponsored by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops: Christ the Servant: Yesterday, Today, Forever. The title derives from the Letter to the Hebrews, which reminds us that Jesus Christ is the same, yesterday, today and forever. But He relies upon others to be his hands on earth, to go about doing good. This gathering is too commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Restoration of the Diaconate in the Church.

At the request of my Director of the Office of the Permanent Diaconate, I authorized a one-time second collection to take place on the weekend of April 14-15 to offer scholarship assistance to our deacons and their wives to help underwrite their attendance. A portion of the overall expense will be covered by the deacon's annual educational allotment. We aim to be good stewards. I promise a return on your investment. I know that our deacons who attend this national convocation in New Orleans will derive a benefit for their lifetimes. It won't be a vacation in "the Big Easy." Each day is packed with prayer and workshops and keynote speakers. The presenters are "top drawer": speakers with national and international reputations. I am confident that the personal enrichment our deacons and their wives will derive from this gathering will filter down and renew every one of our parishes and institutions where they serve.

I am proud of our deacons. I rely on your support for them, both in and out of season. Please be as generous as your means allow, both by your material gifts in the one-time, special collection and by your prayers and affirmation for your deacons, priests, and me, your bishop, that we may continue to act justly, love tenderly and walk humbly with our God.



The Catholics popes and bishops have told us that racism is a sin. Jesus has taught us that we must love one another. There is no mention of skin color, no second class. We are all created equal in the love of the Holy Trinity. But do we harbor racism deep within our souls? Now is a moment to reflect on this question.

...I have sinned in my thoughts and words, What I have done, and what I have failed to do...

At every turn, we are faced with questions of what needs to change and what we can do. Two black men are arrested while walking down a country road with no sidewalk. They are charged with jaywalking... Clearly society needs systemic change, and our behavior, the laws and courts must support racial justice and equality. But revamping laws and systems does not alone erase racism. What the US Constitution calls the general welfare and Catholic moral law calls the common good, should be part of our moral compass. Individually, we who benefit from white privilege (wittingly or unwittingly) can befriend persons of color, and step out to defend their rights to equal access, equal education and equal privilege. When we have the opportunity to promote, sponsor and encourage the charisms and gifts of non-white persons, we can and should do so. When we contribute to the Bishop's Annual Appeal, Catholic Charities, We Care, Clean of Heart and the poor box, we are helping many people that don't look like us.

Ask ourselves, 'Where have I failed to do good?' 'Can I do more?' 'What can I do better next time?' Ask God for help and guidance to turn around the tide of racism. Father John Judie, a retired priest of the Archdiocese of Louisville noted the racial justice wasn't only the dream of Martin Luther King, it is also God's dream. Martin Luther King was a vessel for God's work. We all are.

Do you know what your charisms are? If not, plan to attend one of the charism workshops here at Our Lady of the Lake when they resume. Watch the bulletin for dates and details. Specific workshops are held in SAH for handicapped accessibility.






