LONGING FOR SPIRITUAL WELL-BEING

The word of God serves up a tremendous feast for us today. Isaiah beckons all who hunger and thirst to come to the Lord for satisfaction. The psalmist cries out, "The hand of the Lord feeds us; he answers all our needs." Saint Paul tells us that nothing can separate us from the love of God. Finally, in the Gospel, we hear the story of the miraculous feeding of over five thousand people from a mere five loaves and two fish. Most of us have our material needs met on a day-to-day basis. These scriptures, nevertheless, have much to say to the contemporary believer. We must ask ourselves, "Where are my deepest hungers? Where are my thirsts?" After material needs are satisfied and, in some cases, over-satisfied, many people still experience a deep longing for spiritual balance and well-being. As the loaves and fish are multiplied in today's Gospel, perhaps our prayer can be a longing for the satisfaction of the deepest needs that only God can fill.

#### ADMITTING OUR HELPLESSNESS

Jesus' disciples, after a long day of preaching and healing, find themselves confronted with thousands of hungry people who need to be fed. They themselves were no doubt hungry and thirsty. In desperation, they turn to the Lord and ask him to tell the people to go to the towns and villages to buy food. Jesus tells them to give the people food themselves. They admit that they can come up with only five loaves and two fish, hardly enough to feed even themselves. It was only after the disciples admitted their total helplessness in the situation that the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fish occurred. Where is the lesson for us? It is in admitting our helplessness in life's most difficult moments that a miracle may perhaps be waiting for us.

### MIRACLES OF MULTIPLICATION

Many believers admit that when faced with life-threatening illness, all that can be done in many instances is to throw one's hands up in total helplessness and, in desperation, call upon God. The miracle that can occur is often not a cure of the illness. The miracle may be the strength and courage given by God to move through the pain and grief with hearts of faith. Remember what Saint Paul tells us today. "For I am convinced that neither death, nor life ... nor any other creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." When we know deep hunger for meaning and direction, when we are at our lowest, let us heed the words of the prophet Isaiah, and come to the Lord, that we may have life. If five loaves and

two fish can be multiplied miraculously to feed thousands, then surely the compassion and love of Christ Jesus can be multiplied again and again for those whose hearts hunger and thirst for healing and wholeness.

## THE SAINT MICHAEL PRAYER

Can a prayer be inspired by a battle? Pope Leo XIII (pictured at right) wrote the Saint Michael prayer, printed below, in 1884, after supposedly seeing a frightening vision: evil spirits, trying to fulfill Satan's boast to destroy our Lord's Church within a century, were engaging in fierce attacks against it.

Although the Pontiff also saw St. Michael casting Satan (also known as the devil) and his demons back into Hell in his vision, he was so horrified by what he had seen he felt compelled to help defend our faith in this struggle.

In the Saint Michael prayer he throws down the gauntlet to "the father of lies" as Jesus calls the devil in John's Gospel (8:44), by enlisting the help of a very special Archangel:





St. Michael makes a great general in this fight between Christ and Satan for our souls! After all, we read in Revelation (12:7-9) that "there was a great battle in heaven; Michael and his angels fought with the dragon...and that great dragon...who is called the devil and Satan, who seduces the whole world...was cast unto the earth, and his angels [the demons] were thrown down with him."

St. Michael's very name (in Hebrew, Micha'el meaning "Who is like God?") denotes the war cry uttered in that battle. Note that when we talk about Satan or the devil here we are also refer-

ring to his "army" of fallen angels, the evil spirits referred to in the Saint Michael prayer.

As a special patron and protector of the Church, St. Michael has been assigned to fight against Satan; to protect faithful souls from him, especially at their death; to champion God's people; and, further along this line, to escort them to their judgment.

Pope Leo XIII saw to it that the Saint Michael prayer was recited after every low Mass throughout the world. (The low Mass, discontinued in 1970 after Vatican II, was said by a priest alone, with no music.) This prayer is not said at Mass today, but in 1994 Pope John Paul II urged the faithful keep to reciting it.

Although we tend to downplay the notion of the devil as being too quaint or outmoded today, he does indeed exist and not just as a symbol of evil, or as character in a fairytale to frighten us.

We obviously can't excuse all our sins and failures by saying, as the comedian Flip Wilson did in a line he made famous, "The devil made me do it!" After all, God allows us to be tempted but gives us the grace and the free will to choose Him and not the devil.

Still, we shouldn't assume the devil is just some cartoon figure. Priests such as Father Malachi Martin and Father Gabriele Amorth have written extensively of their struggles with demons during exorcisms.

One of Satan's greatest assets is his camouflage, the belief that he doesn't exist, as Father Martin once noted in his acclaimed book *Hostage to the Devil*. Father Martin felt strongly that disbelief in Satan and the forces of evil leaves us unable to resist them.

On the subject of resistance, keep in mind that we can and should say the Saint Michael prayer at church or just on our own during the day for spiritual protection for ourselves and for others as well!

Satan was unable to destroy the Catholic Church in the 20th century, but certainly our faith withstood terrible onslaughts just from Hitler and Stalin *alone*. We are still engaged in that war that has gone for all of human history, in one form or another, between God and the devil.

Each of us has had our own battles against the dark side trying to turn us away from eternal life with our Creator. Satan's idea for our eternal life is one spent with him in hatred and misery and he's after as many souls as he can get!

As St. Peter once noted "be sober and watch, because your adversary the devil as a roaring lion, goes about seeking whom he may devour" (1 Peter 5:8). "The evil spirits who roam about the world seeking the ruin of souls" mentioned in the Saint Michael prayer have surely been busy, but in asking for help we can fight back against them *every day*.

Prayer and the sacraments are an essential part of what St. Paul called the "armor of God" in his letter to the Ephesians. The Saint Michael prayer can help us indeed "stand against the deceits of the devil" (Eph 6:11) by "taking the shield of faith" (Eph 6:16). Remember, God permits us to be tempted by the devil but gives us the grace to resist him through prayer in our daily lives.

Let us not be afraid to ask for St. Michael's help in this prayer and others like it. We need to remember that each time we pray we work to defeat our *real* enemies, not each other, but rather the devil and his evil spirits.

As St. Paul put it, we fight "not against flesh and blood but against principalities and power, against the rulers of the world of this darkness, against the spirits of wickedness" (Eph 6:12). With God's help in prayer they can all be overcome

## NEW GUIDELINES FOR GOING TO CONFESSION

# Returning to "Normal" Schedule of Confessions on Saturday Afternoons from 3:30pm until 4:30pm

We have permission from the diocese to return to the Sacrament of Confession. After reading all of the diocesan suggested protocols to ensure the safety of parishioners and priests the following protocols for Confession are implemented as of 25 July 2020:

- Confessions return to the original schedule prior to Covid-19:
  - o Saturday afternoon from 3:30PM to 4:30PM
  - Please DO NOT attempt to go to Confession after 4:45pm. Father needs time to prepare for the Vigil Mass.
  - o No Sign-up is required. The priest will hear as many Confessions as possible. If Confession ends before you are able to receive the sacrament please return next week or call Fr. Dennis to set up a time.
  - o Appointments outside of these times may be scheduled privately with Fr. Dennis by texting or calling him at 843.834.5447. You may also email him at pastor@ollchapin.org.
- Confessions will be heard in the Bride/Cry Room. You may go to Confession anonymously standing at the screen or walk past the screen to go face to face with Fr. Dennis—maintaining a six-foot distance.
- As Fr. Dennis is hearing impaired, he may ask penitents to speak up so that he can hear them. To maintain the Seal of the Confessional please be certain to close the door to the Bride/Cry Room when you enter and to leave it open when you depart.
- Confessions will be heard while standing. This will eliminate the need to sanitize surfaces repeatedly. If you need to be seated bring a folding chair with you from your home.
- · Masks are strongly recommended.

When you arrive at the church please observe the following while waiting for your appointed time:

- Please form lines in narthex, maintaining a six-foot separation. Tape on the narthex floor will help you maintain a safe distance from others. Please stand at the sign in the Narthex when you are next in line for Confession. This sign is placed a discreet distance from the door to the Bride/Cry Room to ensure the Seal of the Sacrament of Confession for anyone going to Confession.
- The Church will be open for you to complete your penance in the Sanctuary. Please observe safe distancing while seated or kneeling at prayer.
- Recorded music will be played in the narthex to ensure the Seal of the Sacrament of Confession.
- The left side glass side door of the church will be unlocked to enter and leave the church.

The Catholics popes and bishops have told us that racism is a sin. Jesus has taught us that we must love one another. There is no mention of skin color, no second class. ... I have sinned in my thoughts and words, What I have done, and what I have failed to do ...

At every turn, we are faced with questions of what needs to change and what we can do. Two black men are arrested while walking down a country road with no sidewalk. They are charged with jaywalking... Clearly society needs systemic change, and our behavior, the laws and courts must support racial justice and equality. But revamping laws and systems does not alone erase racism. What the US Constitution calls the general welfare and Catholic moral law calls the common good, should be part of our moral compass. Individually, we who benefit from white privilege (wittingly or unwittingly) can befriend persons of color, and step out to defend their rights to equal access, equal education and equal privilege. When we have the opportunity to promote, sponsor and encourage the charisms and gifts of non-white persons, we can and should do so. When we contribute to the Bishop's Annual Appeal, Catholic Charities, We Care, Clean of Heart and the poor box, we are helping many people that don't look like us.

Ask ourselves, 'Where have I failed to do good?' 'Can I do more?' 'What can I do better next time?' Ask God for help and guidance to turn around the tide of racism. Father John Judie, a retired priest of the Archdiocese of Louisville noted the racial justice wasn't only the dream of Martin Luther King, it is also God's dream. Martin Luther King was a vessel for God's work. We all are.

## **Lighthouse Catholic Ministry** Faithful Explorer



So often we hear stories of abuse perpetrated by European explorers on noble savages. Here is your chance to hear an extraordinary tale about an explorer who remained true to his faith. In 1527, Spanish explorer Cabeza de Vaca led an expedition to Florida. Craig Turner here tells this amazing story — a tale

of shipwrecks and slavery, of miracles, battles, apparitions, privations and hardship, of spies and bribery, of human sacrifice, and above all, an astonishing journey through a wilderness that took all but four lives out of three hundred. Those who sought to gain the most fared the worst, and those who accepted their terrible fate performed miracles.

# Respect Life Ministry




