



ABOUT OUR FAITH

Q. Why is the Bible so hard to understand?

A. The Bible is a unique piece of literature, perhaps the most unique in the world. In fact, it is not just one piece. The word Bible derives from a word meaning, "library". The Bible is a library of seventy-two books, to be exact, dating from ancient times, written and edited by any number of authors, some know, some unknown. It contains, as any library would, a vast array of literary forms and expressions. The Bible covers more than three thousand years of history. Reading and understanding the Bible, and living up to its demands, is indeed a formidable task, one that will probably take us all a lifetime to accomplish.

The first key to understanding the Bible is to note that this is not just the work of human authors; it is the Word of God. We acknowledge the human element of the Bible; the authors' lived experience, the historical circumstances that form the background of the revelation. But we hold unequivocally that the truth and meaning of the Bible is the inspiration of God. The Catholic view is that God was able to reveal truth through the work of sacred writers.

The Scriptures are layered accounts. They begin with historical facts, which are followed by years of oral tradition, and then end with the author's final version.

The best way to familiarize yourself with the Scriptures is to find a good Bible study program or group. This will acquaint you with the history of Israel, the times and culture in which the Bible was lived and written, the rich variety of literary forms in the Bible and much more. Enjoy your historical journey.

Why There Should Be Silence In Church


The Church says so. Paragraph 45 of the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) states:

"Even before the celebration itself, it is commendable that silence be observed in the church, in the sacristy, in the vesting room, and in adjacent areas, so that all may dispose themselves to carry out the sacred action in a devout and fitting manner."

Talking in church is disrespectful of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. We are in the House of god, in the Presence of God Himself in the Tabernacle, not in a coffee shop. All our thoughts should be directed to Him.

It teaches disrespect. When children see adults talking, giggling, and laughing in church, especially before, during and after the Holy Mass, instead of in prayer Or silent meditation it teaches them that its OK, thus further eroding respect for the Blessed Sacrament in the next generation. And its hypocritical for parents to "shush" their children while they themselves continue to talk

It is the Lord's House, which Jesus taught was "a house of prayer" (Mt 21:13) and thus should be used according to its purpose. It is unholy to turn the Holy House of God into a man-made place of socializing or gossiping. The House of God, where dwells the Real Presence of God, must be treated with ongoing reverence. Talking in Church is a violation of justice against God, for whom we should have reverence.

What is the extra ingredient in suffering—which when absent prompts a curse and when present becomes a joy?

You must unite your sufferings and sorrows with Christ and see your Calvary as coming from the Hand of God. Our Lord saw the Cup of His Passion as given to Him, not by Judas or Pilate or Caiphas or the people but by His Father: "Shall I not drink the Cup My Father Himself has appointed for Me?" Pain without Christ is suffering; pain with Christ is sacrifice.

It is hard for us to see in the accidents and trials of life, in sickness, in bereavement, in financial loss, in cancerous bodies and leprous limbs, any Divine Purpose. That is why Our Blessed Lord had to take suffering upon Himself, in order to show us that it is the Father's Cup.
