First, I can reprogram my thoughts to view people differently. When I search for the image of God stamped on all God's children, a spirit of gratitude comes to me quite naturally. With a thankful heart, I can sharpen the positive image of everyone with whom I come in contact.

Second, I can confess my faults openly. At our church trio practice one Sunday, I snapped at a fellow member for being late. After church I apologized for my abruptness, and she revealed problems at home that made her ministry in music difficult. Together we worked out an alternative plan and ended up rescheduling our trio practices.

Third, I can give equal time in prayer. A man in our church was unfaithful to his wife. I spent time with his wife, in tears, anger and prayer. By week's end I realized I hadn't once prayed for her husband. He was hard to love, but perhaps prayer would have softened his heart. As I called his name in prayer, my compassion for him grew.

When a brother or sister stumbles or feels the pain of a fall, rather than reach for my judge's robe, I need to kneel down with them, sharing their hurt, and then gently seek to restore them to health and wholeness.

The Angelus Prayer

The Angelus is a devotion commemorating Mary's Fiat ("Yes.") to becoming the mother of Jesus, the Son of God made flesh. Her words: "Be it done unto me according to your word", changed the world forever. It is commonly prayed at 6:00am, noon and 6:00pm.

R/. And she conceived of the Holy Spirit.

V/. Behold the handmaid of the Lord,
R/. Be it done unto me according to your word.

V/. Pray for us , O holy Mother of God,
R/. That we may be made worthy of the prom-
ises of Christ.

Let us pray. Pour forth, we beseech you, O
Lord, your grace into our hearts: that we, to
whom the incarnation of Christ your Son was
made known by the message of an angel, may
by his passion and cross be brought to the glory
of his resurrection. Through the same Christ,
our Lord.

What is The Angelus Prayer



The Angelus

(/ˈændʒələs/; [Latin](#) for "angel") is
a [Catholic](#) devotion designed to
commemorate the mystery of the
Incarnation and pay homage to
Mary's role in salvation history.

This devotion reminds us of the Angel Gabriel's annunciation to Mary, Mary's fiat, the Incarnation and Our Lord's passion and resurrection. It is repeated as a holy invitation, calling us to prayer and meditation.

The theme throughout this prayer's history and usage is the number three. There are three antiphons, three Hail Marys, and the prayer has been traditionally said three times a day: in the morning (usually 6 AM), at noon, and in the evening (usually 6 PM).

We, too, should turn to God throughout our day.
Consider setting an alarm on your phone, or taking the first five minutes of your lunch break to make time for this simple prayer. It takes less than three minutes to say and infuses a moment of recollection into our daily routine.

The Angelus is a pearl of our faith: it reminds us that the Word was made Flesh, that divinity humbled itself to embrace humanity, that the humble yes of Our Lady to God's invitation resounds throughout history.

It Takes a Lot of Faith!

“Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude and insult you, and denounce your name as evil on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice and leap for joy on that day! Behold, your reward will be great in heaven.” [Luke 6:22-23](#)

It takes a lot of faith to “rejoice and leap for joy” after experiencing hatred and persecution from another. Even when one is persecuted on account of his/her faith in Christ, it takes a lot of faith and a lot of love to sincerely rejoice.

But with that said, this level of faith and love is possible! If it were not, our Lord would not have given this teaching. It is a teaching to live the highest ideal. It’s a calling to live in Beatitudes.

Though it would be worth it to spend time on each and every one of the Beatitudes and to try to apply them to our lives, it’s also helpful to look at the more general fact that Jesus does not call us to mediocrity; rather, He calls us to the heights of perfection. It is within those heights that our souls find the greatest reward.

Reflect, today, upon this Beatitude. Perhaps you have never experienced persecution and hatred as a result of following Jesus. But even if you haven’t, try to put yourself into this situation and try to honestly discover how you would react. Would you be able to allow persecution to “roll off your back” so to speak? Would you be able to accept injustice in your life without allowing it to disturb your interior peace? Or would you turn bitter and angry as a result of the hurt you would feel?

Try to put your eyes upon the ideals of the Christian life. If you aim for anything less, you run the risk of actually attaining that lower goal. But if you put your eyes upon the high calling of the Beatitudes, then you will find that our Lord will continually draw you closer to His heart, cleansing you, strengthening you, filling you with more faith, hope and love, and bringing you to an increasingly blessed level of holiness. It’s worth it to aim for the ideal!

Lord of perfection, please make me holy. Help me to keep my eyes upon You and upon the virtues and Beatitudes that You call me to live. May I never settle for a mediocre life. Instead, may I strive only for a life of perfection and holiness making You the center of all I long for. Jesus, I trust in You.

"Life, especially human life, belongs only to God: for this reason whoever attacks human life, in some way attacks God himself." – John Paul II, The Gospel of Life, n.9.

Reflection: No human being can own another, not even one's own child. God entrusts us to the care of one another, but He alone remains the owner of human life. That's why we cannot throw it away, no matter how small, frail, or inconvenient it may sometimes be.

Prayer: Lord, may all people acknowledge you as the only master of human life. May those who defend life understand that they are not only defending their brothers and sisters, but are also defending You!

Q. Biblical Foundation of Devotion to Mary & Divine Mercy Chaplet



Q. Do devotions to Mary and praying the Divine Mercy Chaplet have any biblical foundation?

A. That depends upon what you mean by a biblical foundation. Strictly speaking, the Bible does not explicitly say, “Pray the rosary and other devotions to Mary.” Nor does it explicitly say, “Pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet.” But, of course, that’s a somewhat obvious answer. The real answer to your question has to do with the biblical foundation to those practices. So let’s take a look at that.

Regarding devotion to Mary, there are numerous ways that devotion to her is found in the Bible. Here are some of those ways.

First, the Rosary, which is the most common devotion to our Blessed Mother, is primarily Scriptural. On each bead of the rosary we pray the words of the Angel Gabriel to Mary, as well as the words of St. Elizabeth to Mary. “Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with you.” And, “Blessed are you among women and blessed is the fruit of your womb” ([Luke 1:26-46](#)). Additionally, we pray the “Our Father” prayer which is directly from Jesus and pray the “Glory Be” prayer which is echoed in Scripture numerous ways. So, yes, the Rosary is very Biblical in that sense. We are primarily repeating certain Scriptures. Additionally, in praying the Rosary we are to meditate upon one of twenty different Scriptural stories during each of the twenty decades. So the prayers are Scriptural and the meditations are Scriptural.

Second, devotion to Mary in general comes to us from the fact that Jesus lived the Fourth Commandment perfectly. That Commandment says, “Honor your father and mother.” Jesus honored His mother perfectly and we are to imitate Jesus in all He does. Therefore, we are to honor His mother, too.

Third, at the Cross Jesus said to the Apostle John, “Behold, your mother.” And in giving Mary to John, the Church has always seen that Mary is given to all of us. We are all to behold our mother in the person of Mary.

Fourth, Jesus gave Peter the Keys to the Kingdom of Heaven and said that whatever he binds on earth is bound in Heaven ([Matthew 16:19](#)). He gave Peter the gift of infallibility leading the Church into all truth. We believe that this gift of infallible teaching did not stop with Peter but was passed on through the ages to all his successors whom we call the popes. And these popes have definitively taught, in countless ages, the value of honoring our Blessed Mother. So though this last point is not a direct biblical call to honor our Blessed Mother, it is an indirect Biblical command through the teaching of the Church founded by Christ in the Scriptures.

There are also numerous ways in which Mary is spoken of in the Old and New Testaments which would require a book to detail it all. But hopefully the few thoughts above help.

Regarding the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, the same basic principles apply. Though this Chaplet is not mentioned in Scripture, the message and meditations are deeply Scriptural in every way. "For the sake of His sorrowful passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world." This is the heart of the Chaplet and it is at the heart of the Gospel message. In truth, there could not be a more Scripturally based prayer than this. The Scriptures reveal God's mercy, His gift of salvation and our need for it. The Scriptures point to Jesus' saving sacrifice as the source of salvation and this Chaplet acknowledges that truth and calls upon that grace. So, yes, it is very Scriptural.

The last point to make is this. Be sure to use the Bible in the way it was written. It was not written as a strict and complete roadmap which answers every question directly. Yes, it does answer every question and gives us the necessary message of salvation. It is the fullness of revelation from God. But Jesus never said to us, "Here is my Bible. Follow it and only it. Do not do anything that is not explicitly spoken of in these pages." No, what Jesus did is to start His Church through the foundation of the Apostles. And from that Church the Bible was also given. But the Bible must always be read in union with the Church and Her teachings through the ages. <https://mycatholic.life/catholic-question-and-answer>
