

Gospel Reflection

Glorification Through Suffering

When Judas had left them, Jesus said, “Now is the Son of Man glorified, and God is glorified in him.” [John 13:31](#)

It is essential to know the end of the story. Jesus knew the end when He spoke these words to the Apostles at the Last Supper right after Judas left to go and betray Him. It’s important to put this situation within the context that Jesus understood it. From a purely human point of view, one of Jesus’ closest friends was about to betray Him for money. For most of us this would have been devastating and the cause for anger and hurt. But because Jesus knew the end of the story, He was able to see Judas’ betrayal as the means to His glorification, not

His defeat. He turned His eyes toward Heaven and all that He would accomplish through His suffering rather than look at the immediate pain He would soon endure.

This is a powerful lesson for us all. First, it’s essential that we look at Jesus’ glorification through His betrayal, suffering and death. But we must also strive to see the potential that our own sufferings have when united to the Savior of the World.

How do you react when another sins against you? How would you have reacted to Judas betraying your love? This is a very difficult question to face in honesty and it is even harder to live the response that Jesus lived. The truth is that every time we are mistreated by another, we are given an opportunity to glorify God and further the Kingdom of Heaven by forgiving, uniting our suffering with Christ’s, and offering mercy. This is much easier to speak about than to live.

Reflect, today, upon this scene of the Gospel. Gaze upon Judas leaving the Last Supper and going out into the night to betray our Lord. But look at it in the way Jesus saw it. Look at it with the understanding that this was the means chosen by the Father to bring salvation to the world. Reflect, also, upon every opportunity that you are given to do as Jesus did. Try to be concrete and specific and see any and every suffering you endure as a glorious opportunity to dispense the mercy of God. Though this may be difficult at first, it is this act of love that will give great glory to the Father in Heaven!

Our work with mid-life couples confirms the fact that people stay together in marriage because their needs are being met. At first glance, that idea appears to be self-centered. But we've discovered that couples whose marriages are tenuous can experience a deepening sense of commitment, a desire to stay together, and an ability to express affection as they understand each other's needs and specifically focus on meeting those needs.

Sometimes at marriage conferences we give time for couples to go for a walk together and talk about their most important needs. We've first asked each of them to write down four of their own needs and then what they think are their mate's four most important needs.

We encourage them to compare their lists to see how well they understand each other. Beyond that, they are to explain the meaning of each of these needs by talking about the feelings associated with those needs. Then they are to talk about practical ways they could more adequately meet each other's major needs.

Understanding your mate's needs and trying to meet those needs is a powerful way to serve your mate and strengthen your marriage.



- ◆ Accept one another by **withholding judgment** (Rom. 14:1).
- ◆ Accept one another by showing deference (Rom. 14:1-5; 15:7).
- ◆ Be gentle with one another (Eph. 4:2).
- ◆ Speak truth to one another (Eph. 4:25; Col 3:9).
- ◆ Forgive one another (Col. 3:13).
- ◆ Comfort one another with the hope of Christ's return (1 Thes. 4:18).
- ◆ Encourage one another (1 Thes. 5:11).
- ◆ Seek good for one another (1 Thes. 5:15).
- ◆ Encourage one another to forsake unbelief and hardness of heart (Heb. 3:13).
- ◆ Encourage one another by faithful participation in your local church (Heb. 10:25).
- ◆ Be hospitable to one another without complaint (1 Peter 4:9).
- ◆ Serve one another (1 Peter 4:10; Gal. 5:13).
- ◆ Act in humility toward one another (1 Peter 5:5).
- ◆ Show holy affection to one another (1 Peter 5:14).
- ◆ Refuse to become **resentful** toward one another (1 John 3:11-12).
- ◆ Give sacrificially to meet one another's needs (1 John 3:16-17).
- ◆ Fight fear together by growing in love (1 John 4:18).
- ◆ Walk in truth together (1 John 3:18; 2 John 1:5).
