

#### The Fullness of Righteousness

Jesus said to his disciples: "I tell you, unless your righteousness surpasses that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will not enter the kingdom of heaven." <u>Matthew</u> 5:20–22

The scribes and Pharisees were masters of the Old Law. Now that the Messiah had arrived, they were unwilling to go deeper and move beyond the Old Testament teachings that they often misrepresented. They preferred a black-and-white approach to morality that had been with them for centuries and did not want to change when presented with Jesus' new and higher calling.

Today's Gospel continues Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, which began with the Beatitudes. In today's portion of Jesus' sermon, we are taught about anger, adultery and oaths. In every case, Jesus refers to the Law as it was taught in the Old Testament but then elevates it to an entirely new level. The line quoted above makes it clear that the only way to accept these new teachings of Jesus was to surpass the "righteousness" of the scribes and Pharisees. And the dire result of not surpassing their righteousness was the loss of the Kingdom of Heaven.

Jesus begins by recalling the Old Testament commandment, "You shall not kill." But then He takes that commandment further by saying that "whoever is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment." Of course, killing remains a grave sin. But now Jesus explains that the interior attitude of anger, even if not acted upon, is a sin. He goes on to teach a similar lesson about adultery and swearing oaths.

It is helpful to understand these new teachings in the context of the approach that the scribes and Pharisees took in regard to the Old Testament. About that, Jesus says, "Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets. I have come not to abolish but to fulfill." Thus, the primary problem with the scribes and Pharisees is not that they failed to teach the Old Testament Law properly. The primary problem is that now that the Messiah has arrived and has ushered in a new time of fulfillment and righteousness, they would not go deeper and would not embrace the fulfillment of the Law of God. They are not willing to grow in holiness and embrace the fulfillment of all that had been taught before.

The month of February is traditionally dedicated to the Passion of Our Lord in anticipation of the liturgical season of Lent. In this month, we begin to meditate on the mystery of Jesus' sufferings which culminated in his death on the Cross for the redemption of mankind.

Reflect, today, upon the calling given to you by our Lord's new and glorious teachings. If you are to truly embrace the Gospel of our Lord and live in His New Law of grace, then you must be willing to go deep, become truly radical in your faith, and allow God to transform every part of your life. The New Law is one of the fullness of love, mercy, surrender, zeal, conversion and transformation. Commit yourself to surpassing the old and limited righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees, and God will do glorious things in your life.

Lord of all grace, You came and not only taught us about the heights of holiness, but You also lived it and have bestowed upon us all we need to imitate Your every virtue. Please fill me with Your mercy and strength so that I may live a new righteousness of the fullness of love. Jesus, I trust in You. https://mycatholic.life

# Ash Wednesday: Preparing to Prepare

The season of Lent is a forty-day time of preparation for Easter, when Christians celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. How do we prepare for that celebration? Church traditions and persons' choices of practices vary. Whatever the pattern our Lenten journey takes, a primary focus is to consider and reflect upon the earthly ministry of Jesus, to follow his example in ministry to others and in the practice of prayer. We place ourselves in the footsteps of his journey, vicariously walking with him to Jerusalem, standing at the foot of the cross, and experiencing amazement at the empty tomb.

So, how do we prepare to enter the Lenten journey?

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday is a pivotal day at the entrance to Lent. It is the day we prepare ourselves to enter into the Lenten season. This day is to be a day of repentance of our sin, individually and collectively. God tells his people through the prophet Joel to repent. (See Joel 2:12ff.) We often hear that to repent means to turn around, to go in a different direction. Jesus invited many persons during his ministry – for example, the Samaritan woman (see John 4) – to turn from their sin and live a different and better way. We are both free and compelled in Christ to reverse our course from sinful actions and attitudes and live a life that honors Christ at any and every moment. We don't have to, and should not, wait for such a day as Ash Wednesday, given that the Holy Spirit empowers us to make such changes as we are made aware of our need to repent.

Ash Wednesday, however, is an opportunity for us intentionally to focus on our need to repent of any sin that keeps us from living into our fullness in Christ. We are invited to "live a holy Lent" with the idea and the hope that this careful preparation for Easter will give us practice in an ongoing empowerment to live into and out from the life that is our best response to Christ's sacrifice for and victory over death on our behalf. Our thankfulness is best expressed as a life lived worthy of this gift of love that we cannot earn.

Ash Wednesday gets its name from the practice of receiving a cross of ashes on the forehead as a sign of the repentance. People of ancient times would mourn their sins and sorrows by wearing rough clothing, sitting in piles of ashes, and putting dust or ashes on their heads. The symbolic practice of the cross of ashes reminds us that as humans we were made from dust (Adam), and that we will one day again be dust upon the death of our earthly bodies.

We must be careful, however, not to think that receiving the ashes somehow makes us sinless or holy. God speaks through Joel that the people are to return to God with all their hearts, not with a conditional surrendering of themselves, holding anything back. They are told to "rend your hearts, not your garments." Mourning and repenting with a show of tearing garments (or the receiving of ashes) without a corresponding response of the heart does not please God.

When we come together for **Ash Wednesday Mass** on February 22, 2023; we will hear God's word inviting us to repent and to turn our hearts once again, quickly and decisively, to the Lord, to the fullness of life in Christ. We will sing about our intention to love God with all that is in us. We will be invited to come just as we are to be in prayer and to receive the ashes, resetting our intention to be willing to follow the example of Christ in our actions, attitudes, and living out of the gospel. Finally, we will sing a testimony to the amazing grace and love of God who always calls us to turn from our sinful ways, who has redeemed us through Christ, and who empowers us to "go and sin no more" (see John 8:11) by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Let us prepare to prepare!
