Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

What is the virtue of recollection?

Amid the noise and busy-ness of our culture, the virtue of recollection tethers us to the serenity of God.

On the way to work, traffic is backed up for miles, cars honk angrily as you merge, a podcast or playlist noisily plays from your car speakers, and messages flood your phone.

Does this scene sound familiar? For many of us, this is a staple of our morning routine. While we may try to carve out time for prayer and silence, there is little we can do about the noise we are immersed in daily: the lanes of traffic, loud advertisements on billboards, and hundreds of marketing emails flooding our inboxes.

Yet God does not abandon us to the stress and noise of the world. Rather, He has given us direct access to His infinite peace and comfort through prayer and the littleknown virtue of recollection.

Recollection, understood as a spiritual virtue, means attention to the presence of God in the soul. It includes the withdrawal of the mind from external and earthly affairs to attend to God and divine things. Recollection can be deployed anywhere, at any time, even amid great external noise, when we immerse ourselves in that profound interior solitude in which the soul is alone with God.

Active recollection is acquired by our own ordinary efforts aided by the grace of God. It is available to any devout soul and can be cultivated through the habit of thinking of God's presence and the discipline of directing our attention to Him.

Although God desires us to be joined to His perfect peace always, recollection can be difficult for a modern soul. Constantly surrounded by noise and stimulation, we have grown so accustomed to the presence of distractions that we struggle to desire the quiet solitude of recollection.

However, there are some simple ways we can grow in the virtue of recollection. By avoiding unnecessary distractions (such as excess media), cultivating a strong prayer life, and deliberately seeking solitude and silence throughout your day, you will become more comfortable with withdrawing from the noise of the outside world. You may even find that you begin to crave the profound silence of God's presence!

Like any virtue, recollection is a gift and grace from God. Although the practice of the virtues may not be flashy or rewarded by our culture, it is the necessary means by which we work out our salvation.

Abortion Survivors

Child psychiatrist Philip Ney relates, "A woman reported telling her nine year old son about her abortion, which had taken place years before he was born. He said, 'I knew, Mom, that there was something wrong. I always have nightmares about knives and my mother killing me. I have an imaginary brother who wants to kill me. If you had not aborted the other, would you have aborted me?" (Abortion Survivors, p.36).

This is a story repeated more times than most people realize, and representing a societal and pastoral problem whose proportions are greater today than at any previous time in history: the phenomenon of tens of millions of abortion survivors.

It is clear that abortion's primary victim is the child who is killed. It has also become increasingly clear that to kill the child is to harm the mother and father as well. What is not always so well known, however, is that abortion makes its impact felt on those who have had a sibling aborted, and that this impact is felt in surprising and astonishing ways, which also have wider implications for the whole of society.

Enthralled by Jesus

Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year B)

When it was evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were ill or possessed by demons. The whole town was gathered at the door. He cured many who were sick with various diseases, and he drove out many demons, not permitting them to speak because they knew him.

Mark 1:32–34

Jesus was in the home of Simon Peter whose mother-inlaw He had just cured. "The whole town gathered at the door" when evening came. This was Jesus' first time being in Capernaum after beginning His public ministry, and already people were flocking to Him in droves. The next morning, Jesus got up before dawn and went away alone to pray. Soon, some of the disciples found Him and told Him that, once again, the whole town was looking for Him.

The excitement was great. So many were amazed. And their amazement at Jesus was not simply a form of curiosity. It was an amazement fueled by faith, which is why Jesus was able to perform so many miracles there. The people quickly realized that Jesus was the One of Whom the prophets of old had spoken. He was the Messiah, and the people gave Him their full attention.

This is a good image for us to ponder. As you think of the crowds and their unwavering desire to be near our Lord, consider your own desires pertaining to God. Do you regularly find yourself consumed with a desire to find our Lord, to be with Him, to listen to Him and to receive His grace and mercy? Or are you tempted to see Jesus and the practice of your faith as boring and uninteresting? One of the unfortunate effects of modern technology is that we easily become fascinated by and intrigued with many superficial things. Perhaps it's the latest short video on a mobile app, or the latest episode of a favorite television series, or a new post by a friend on social media. There are many things today that compete for our attention, intrigue us and even amaze us. Is Jesus one of those things in your life?

In our modern world of constant stimulation and entertainment, we need to understand the difference between being amazed at the latest pop trend and being amazed by the grace and divine actions of our Lord. When we come face-to-face with the power of God in our lives, we will be amazed in a way that fulfills and satisfies us on the deepest level. It will be a spiritual amazement, which is a gift of the Holy Spirit. And the satisfaction we receive from this form of amazement is transforming, deep and sustaining. But when we turn to lesser and more sensory "amazements" common within our world today, we will find that they last only for a moment, and we are quickly left dry and wanting for more.

Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reflect, today, upon the people in today's Gospel who were so enthralled by Jesus that they continually sought Him out. Consider their excitement, their hope and their genuine joy at their discovery of the Messiah. As you think about them, consider whether you share in their excitement about Jesus. If that excitement is lacking, recommit yourself to seeking out our Lord. And where you see that excitement present, rejoice and give glory to God.

Most glorious Lord, Your love and mercy are truly amazing. Please help me to continually see this in my life and to continually become enthralled by Your presence in my life. May I run to You always, giving You my full attention and love.
