Why do I have to fast one hour before Mass?

The discipline of fasting before Mass highlights our need to be hungry for the Eucharistic bread we eat.

Many Catholics from an older generation will remember the "midnight fast." It meant that one could not eat before Mass starting from the midnight before. For this reason Masses were generally celebrated at dawn and Masses in the evening were extremely rare. Few people wanted to fast all day long before attending Mass and receiving Holy Communion.

This practice of **fasting before Mass is an ancient discipline**, present as early as the 2nd century. It remained in place until Pope Pius XII reduced the fast to three hours in 1957. The fast was further shortened in 1964 when Pope Paul VI lowered it to one hour before reception of Communion.

The current *Code of Canon Law* reflects this change and states, "A person who is to receive the Most Holy Eucharist is to abstain for at least one hour before holy communion from any food and drink, except for only water and medicine" (Canon 919 §1).

However, in some cases those rules do not apply. "The elderly, the infirm, and those who care for them can receive the Most Holy Eucharist even if they have eaten something within the preceding hour" (Canon 919 §3).

But why? What does it matter if I ate a cheeseburger right before I walked into church on a day I intend to receive the Holy Eucharist?

Pope Paul VI wrote concerning the power of spiritual discipline in his apostolic constitution *Paenitemini*: "Mortification aims at the liberation of man, who often finds himself, because of concupiscence, almost chained by his own senses. Through 'corporal fasting' man regains strength, and the wound inflicted on the dignity of our nature by intemperance is cured by the medicine of a salutary abstinence."

Jesus knew the <u>power of fasting</u> and went into the desert without food for 40 days before setting out on his public ministry. Furthermore, he taught his disciples that, "This kind [of demon] cannot be driven out by anything but prayer and fasting" (Mark 9:29).

Fasting builds up our spiritual strength, and the Church asks us to complete this simple task every time we receive Holy Communion for our own benefit. Just like any athlete we need to exercise discipline and fasting is great for building those spiritual muscles. Without fasting we are weak and our passions drive us to wherever the wind blows.

Additionally, Pope John Paul II lamented in *Dominicae Cenae* how modern Catholics possess a "lack of Eucharistic 'hunger' and 'thirst,' which is also a sign of lack of adequate sensitivity towards the great sacrament of love and a lack of understanding of its nature." We need to "hunger" and yearn for the Eucharistic before we can properly receive it. Our reception of Holy Communion needs to correspond to an inner hunger that is indicative of a soul that thirsts for God's love. If we don't have this hunger (brought to mind by our physical hunger during fasting), we might think of Holy Communion as something ordinary, not needing any preparation beforehand.

Last of all, **fasting before Mass** is an image of the Eucharistic stories in the Gospels, specifically the Feeding of the Five Thousand. After a long day the disciples urged Jesus to send the crowd away so that they could buy food for themselves to eat.

Instead, Jesus multiples the bread and fish, leaving everyone "satisfied" at the end of the meal. Just like the crowd on that day, when we approach the table of the Lord we must be hungry, or as the Psalmist proclaims, "As a hart longs for flowing streams, so longs my soul for thee, O God" (Psalm 42:1).

Come out of your tomb, and get to Confession

The apostles unbinding Lazarus represent the Church's ministers ... and you need them before Easter.

Ezekiel and Lazarus both focus on the physical resurrection of the body, but then the psalm and Romans were all about sin.

Why do sin and Lazarus go together? Why does the Church want us to think about them on the same Sunday, the last Sunday before Holy Week? Because it's time to come forth from our tombs and get to Confession.

In the Greek New Testament, Jesus uses the same verb, *aphiemi*, to talk about freeing Lazarus from his bindings and to give the disciples the power to unbind people from their sins. The miracle of Lazarus is about the resurrection of the body, but like so many things God does, it doesn't just have one meaning. Yes, Lazarus was raised from the dead. Yes, we'll all rise again on the last day.

But we're also all Lazarus right now. We've been baptized, so we're alive in Christ. But our sins bind us. We can't move freely and live fully Christian lives, because we're so wrapped up in our habitual sins, even if we don't have mortal sins on our consciences.

At the tomb, Jesus tells the disciples to unwrap Lazarus so he can move freely again. Later, when he institutes the sacrament of Confession, he tells them to go and unbind us from our sins, so that we can live a life of freedom in Christ.

<u>Aelfric</u>, the Anglo-Saxon abbot who left us massive collections of his homilies, says,

"Christ raised from death the stinking Lazarus, and when he was quickened, he said to his disciples, "Loose his bands, that he may go." They loosed the bands of the requickened man, whom Christ had raised to life. Therefore should our teachers unbind from their sins those whom Christ quickens by stimulation. Every sinful man who conceals his sins, lies dead in the sepulchre; but if he confess his sins through stimulation, then he goes from the sepulchre, as Lazarus did, when Christ bade him arise: then shall the teacher unbind him from the eternal punishment, as the apostles bodily unbound Lazarus."

Lazarus points us to the end of time, but he also points us to the Church, right now. Jesus calls to Lazarus to come out of his tomb, so that the disciples can unbind him. Then, and only then, can Lazarus live freely, alive in Christ. Jesus is calling you to come out of your tomb and into the confessional, so that you can confess your sins, receive absolution, do penance, and celebrate Easter. This week, be like Lazarus. If you haven't made your Lenten Confession yet, make it now, so that you can be truly alive as you celebrate Holy Week and Easter.

What is the Chrism Mass and why is it important?

This Mass, celebrated at the cathedral, is an important liturgy in the life of the local church.

Among the many liturgies celebrated during Holy Week, the Chrism Mass is one that few Catholics ever participate in. This is because the liturgy is always celebrated at the cathedral church of the diocese, presided over by the local bishop. Traditionally this Mass was celebrated on Holy Thursday, though for pastoral reasons in the United States it is often moved to Monday or Tuesday of Holy Week, and in some cases is even celebrated on a different day during Lent. All of the priests of the diocese gather together for this Mass, and during it the bishop will consecrate the sacred oils used in the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, Anointing of the Sick, and Holy Orders. Each parish receives its annual supply of these oils at the Chrism Mass.

Most Reverend Gerald M. Barbarito, Bishop of Palm Beach, cordially invites the faithful of the Diocese to join in the celebration of the Chrism Mass.
