Third Sunday of Easter

First Reading: Acts 2:14.22-28 Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 16 - Lord, you will show us the path of life. Second Reading: 1 Peter 1:17-21 Gospel: Luke 24:13-35

The experiences of the early Church after the resurrection of Jesus may probably have been very different from our own but their experiences could also be ours. The apostles themselves were in a quandary after Jesus was seized in the Garden of Olives. They scrambled about to save themselves in fear of those who were beating Jesus to death. Peter denied him three times, Thomas doubted. Yet afterwards, we hear of the apostles going around, preaching about Jesus, who rose from the dead, defying persecution and imprisonment believing that Jesus' death for us is humiliation and infamy while for God, his death was victory as we heard from the first reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Peter, in the second reading, goes on further to remind the newly baptized of his time and to us in our times that "... you were delivered . . . by the blood of a spotless, unblemished lamb chosen before the world's foundation and revealed for your sake in these last days." This is a wonderful reality, but it also entails weighty responsibilities as it has to match the new life we received. But did the apostles grasp the real meaning of Jesus' death right after he rose from the dead? Not really!

The gospel reading tells us of two of Jesus' disciples travelling, walking toward a town called Emmaus, a place seven miles from Jerusalem. Not so long ago, the hopes of the apostles and followers of Jesus had been burning brightly. But the darkness of Good Friday and the burial in the tomb caused them to lose their joy and gladness. They retreated into isolation and talked about what happened to Jesus.

On the way to Emmaus, "Jesus himself drew near and walked along with them." And the sad thing is: "They saw him, but something prevented them from recognizing him."

The two disciples felt betrayed. They were carrying fresh memories of Jesus, whom they expected to defy death, their anguish prevented them from recognizing the one who was walking with them. They were hurting.

The gospel story says that Jesus "drew near" the two disciples. They no longer felt alone as Jesus joins them, listening to their anguish and explaining all that had happened to him.

In moments of anguish, in those times when we feel betrayed by a friend or a loved one, Jesus, at the right time, comes to us, journeys with us, listens to our stories and leads us in our own journey to experience Emmaus.

Jesus asked them, "What matters are you discussing?" He gets them to pause, to think, to reflect, to take stock of themselves and to start letting go of their anguish. Yes, Jesus is indeed a Good shepherd, gently leading them to confront their anguish. Jesus does not get them to change the topic but instead focuses on their concerns and not on his own interests and concerns.

When we allow Jesus to walk with us, he does not get us to change the topic or avoid our problems but to focus on them. "Take up your cross," he tells us. Do not escape from your cross through drunkenness and drugs but be ready to carry your

When the two reached Emmaus, Jesus acted as if he were going farther but they pressed him to stay as their guest and said, "It is nearly evening, and the day is almost over." The two disciples did not yet recognize who they were inviting, they did not yet recognize him who walked all the way with them, listening to their stories and explaining things about Jesus. But the two felt some responsibility for a stranger who has now become a brother and a friend. And what happened?

When Jesus accepted the invitation to be their guest, he immediately became their host: "He took break, pronounced the blessing, then broke the bread and began to distribute it to them." This is what happens when we invite Jesus. He becomes, not our guest, but the host. Jesus accepts the best that the two could offer him, and doing so, he transformed what they gave him into his gift of grace and gave it back to them as his own gift: bread transfigured and transformed into his own sacrifice. As the apostles let go of their own bread, so is being transformed made possible by our letting go of our bread and putting it entirely into the hands of Jesus.

"Whereupon he vanished from their sight." At the end of it all, the two were left with the most precious gift - the gift of Faith.

The story of Jesus and the two disciples on the road to Emmaus points a finger at us and sheds light on our own situation especially in times of trials and grace, of betrayal and reconciliation. Their distress is ours in many ways and their sadness sounds familiar to us. How many times have we walked the road to Emmaus with downcast faces? All the time, we forget that Jesus is walking with us, ready and anxious to help us, if only we could turn to him in those moments of quiet desperation. *

Cast into the Deep (April 23) The Sunday Experience Nelle Orsburn

Once upon a time, after the 10:30 Mass, I was going over the hill on the 405 to visit a friend. I marveled how the 405 was always a sea of cars no matter the day or the time of day. As I looked ahead, I wondered about the person traveling solo in the Rav4 before me. Was she coming or going? Was she eager to get to where she was going? Or was she dreading a confrontation? Was she coming from Sunday Mass or service? What about the family in the Highlander behind me. Were they playing a game to entertain the kids? Or telling them stories about their own time at being kids themselves? Were they going to see Grandma to enjoy her cooking or will Grandma even recognize them when they get there. There was also the Honda, next to me with a guy obviously singing to himself as he was keeping beat with his head nods and an occasional tap on



the stirring wheel. At least that's what my momentary glances his way seemed to convey. I wondered if he was reliving his Sunday Mass and singing the hymns the choir sang or if he was rocking with Taylor Swift or Bruno Mars.

Last week's gospel reading was the very familiar story about "Doubting Thomas" and Fr. Rolly reflected on the Sunday experience that Thomas missed because he was not present with the disciples when the Risen Lord appeared; and how we too gathered as community in Church on Sundays experience the Risen Lord. This reminded me of my musings on that long ago Sunday.

The Mass is indeed an encounter with the Risen Lord in His Word and in his real presence in the Eucharist that we receive. Nourished, then, by his Word and his Body and Blood, the Sunday experience is not just the hour that we are together in Church but continues through the day and, by the grace of God, sustains us through the week until we come together again to celebrate the Eucharist. For having received Jesus in the Eucharist, we are transformed into Jesus and with St Paul we too can say, "It is no longer I who live but you who live in me (Gal 2:20)." How should we live our day? We must be Jesus. We must be ready to love each person that we meet, in every situation, when it is easy to love and when it is difficult. What would Jesus do?

Our whole day is a long series of what-would-Jesus-do moments. Think about it. There are a million and one decision points as we live our day. Some are no-brainers, we do not even have to stop and think. Someone smiles at you, you smile back. Someone hands you drink, you say thank you. But some other situations require a little bit more time to discern what Jesus would do.


Hence my musings on that long ago Sunday drive. Each person in the vehicles around me, and beyond, were facing decisions most likely while even still on their way to their destination, but most certainly when they get there, me included. What sorts of beautiful experiences awaited us at the end of the journey? How many challenging situations may there have been instead? How many of us were just coming from Mass and had been imbued with the real presence of Jesus? Would we remember to let Jesus reign in our hearts and our lives?

My imagination started running movies about my fellow journeyers. The Highlander mom did not relish taking her kids to see grandma. Her dementia was getting worse. But she had good days and she wanted to capture those moments for her kids and for herself. She prayed that she would always be patient whatever situation arose. It was a chance for all of them to live the love they had received growing up but certainly the love that Jesus showered on them.

The Rav4 lady was delighted to celebrate her best friend's birthday at the trendy Santa Monica restaurant she picked. But she knit her brow momentarily, remembering that there would be others there as well whom she had not yet met. She was decidedly on the shy side and anxious about meeting new people. She put her brave face on again and, out of love for her best friend, she would smile her way through it.

And, finally, Mr. Honda. It wasn't really church music he was listening to but the sixteenth repeat of a Bruno Mars song. He was on his way to an audition. Will he remember the lyrics? Would he sing the right notes? Will he emote well? Will he get the part? What if he doesn't?

Every single action merits a response. Sometimes a smile is all that is needed. Sometimes more than that. By the grace of God and the Eucharist we have received, may our Sunday experience fill our hearts with love, a love that overflows to the other. What would Jesus do? •

Claudia Yesenia Navarro or, as some of us know her, "Yesenia," is the coordinator of the ministry of the Ushers and Altar Servers. What pleases Yesenia the most is serving the Lord and she sees herself not so much as the coordinator but instead as someone at the service of the ministry and its members; as a servant of the Lord. She likes to be of service to others and believes that God puts us where he needs us.

Yesenia is also part of the Prayer Group. It all started when she volunteered to pick up the key to the chapel for the ministry's meeting. But God had other plans and before long, she became a member. She puts herself at God's disposal, and as she says, "Lord here is your servant and put me at your service wherever you need me."

Yesenia feels very happy and content serving the Lord, whether it's moving a chair or washing dishes or whatever else is needed. She also helps with Family Fun Days and the Bereavement Ministry by assisting Antonia Garcia with the various aspects of the Mass during a funeral. She is always very willing to help wherever she can. "When you serve God, you feel a lot of joy and a lot of satisfaction," says Yesenia. It comforts her, and strengthens her and she does not get tired of serving. In fact, the more she serves the more she falls in love with God.

Yesenia feels great joy in having the Church as a family; she is comforted to have the community as brothers and sisters in Christ. She feels that God has done wonders in her home and with her children. She also feels that no matter how much one does we can never repay God for all the blessings he gives us; we always fall short.

April 24: St Fidelis of Sigmaringen, Martyr (1578–1622): St. Fidelis was born in Sigmaringen, Germany and was named Mark Rey. He studied Law and started a career as a lawyer defending the poor. He quickly got disenchanted with the evils he encountered in the practice

"Woe to me if I should prove myself but a halfhearted soldier in the service of my thorn-crowned Captain."



Primera Lectura: Hechos 2, 14. 22-28

Salmo Responsorial: Salmo 16

Señor, me enseñarás el sendero de la vida.

Segunda Lectura: 1 Pedro 1, 17-21 Evangelio: San Lucas 24, 13-35

Las experiencias de la Iglesia primitiva después de la resurrección de Jesús probablemente hayan sido muy diferentes a las nuestras, pero sus experiencias también podrían ser las nuestras. Los apóstoles mismos estaban en un dilema después de que Jesús fue apresado en el Huerto de los Olivos. Corrieron para estar a salvo por temor a los que golpearon a Jesús hasta matarlo. Pedro lo negó tres veces, Tomás dudó. Sin embargo, después, escuchamos que los apóstoles andaban predicando acerca de Jesús, que resucitó de entre los muertos, desafiando la persecución y el encarcelamiento, creyendo que la muerte de Jesús por nosotros es humillación e infamia, mientras que para Dios, su muerte fue una victoria, como escuchamos en la primera lectura de los Hechos de los Apóstoles.

Pedro, en la segunda lectura, va más allá para recordar a los recién bautizados de su tiempo y a nosotros en nuestro tiempo que "...los ha rescatado Dios, ... con la sangre preciosa de Cristo, el cordero sin defecto ni mancha, al cual Dios había elegido desde antes de la creación del mundo y, por amor a ustedes, lo ha manifestado en estos tiempos, que son los últimos..." Esta es una realidad maravillosa, pero también implica grandes responsabilidades ya que tiene que estar a la altura de la nueva vida que recibimos. Pero, ¿captaron los apóstoles el verdadero significado de la muerte de Jesús justo después de que resucitó de entre los muertos? ¡No precisamente!

La lectura del evangelio nos habla de dos de los discípulos de Jesús que viajaban, ellos caminaban hacia un pueblo llamado Emaús, un lugar a siete millas de Jerusalén. Poco tiempo antes, las esperanzas de los apóstoles y seguidores de Jesús ardían con fuerza. Pero la oscuridad del Viernes Santo y el entierro en el sepulcro les hizo perder el gozo y la alegría. Se aislaron y hablaron sobre lo que le sucedió a Jesús.

En el camino a Emaús, "Jesús se les acercó y comenzó a caminar con ellos". Y lo triste es: "los ojos de los dos discípulos estaban velados y no lo reconocieron".

Los dos discípulos se sentían traicionados. Sus recuerdos de Jesús aún frescos en la mente, ellos esperaban que él desafiara la muerte, su angustia les impedía reconocer a quien caminaba con ellos. Estaban tristes.

La historia del evangelio dice que Jesús "se acercó" a los dos discípulos. Ya no se sienten solos cuando Jesús se une a ellos, escucha su angustia y les explica todo lo que le había sucedido.

En los momentos de angustia, en esos momentos en que nos sentimos traicionados por un amigo o un ser querido, Jesús, en el momento oportuno, viene a nosotros, camina con nosotros, escucha nuestras historias y nos conduce en nuestro propio camino hacia la experiencia de Emaús. Jesús les preguntó: "¿De qué cosas vienen hablando?" Hace que hagan una pausa, que piensen, que reflexionen, los hace discernir y comenzar a sentirse mejor. Sí,

Jesús es en efecto un Buen Pastor, que los conduce con delicadeza a afrontar sus angustias. Jesús no hace que cambien de tema, sino que se enfoca en sus preocupaciones y no en sus propios intereses y preocupaciones.



Cuando permitimos que Jesús camine con nosotros, él no hace que cambiemos de tema o evitemos nuestros problemas, sino que nos concentremos en ellos. "Toma tu cruz", nos dice. No escapes de tu cruz a través de la embriaguez y las drogas, sino prepárate para llevar tu cruz.

Cuando los dos llegaron a Emaús, Jesús actuó como si fuera más lejos, pero lo presionaron para que se quedara como su invitado y le dijeron: "Ya es tarde y pronto va a oscurecer". Los dos discípulos aún no reconocían a quién invitaban, aún no reconocían a aquel que caminó todo el camino con ellos, escuchando sus historias y explicando cosas de Jesús. Pero los dos sintieron cierta responsabilidad por un extraño que ahora se ha convertido en un hermano y un amigo. ¿Y qué pasó?

Cuando Jesús aceptó la invitación de ser su huésped, inmediatamente se convirtió en su anfitrión: "tomó un pan, pronunció la bendición, lo partió y se los dio". Esto es lo que sucede cuando invitamos a Jesús. Se convierte, no en nuestro invitado, sino en el anfitrión. Jesús acepta lo mejor que los dos podían ofrecerle y, al hacerlo, transformó lo que le dieron en su don de la gracia y se los devolvió como su propio don: pan transfigurado y transformado en su propio sacrificio. Así como los apóstoles ofrecieron de su propio pan, la transformación se hace posible cuando ofrecemos nuestro pan y lo ponemos completamente en las manos de Jesús.

"Entonces él desapareció". Al final de todo, los dos se quedaron con el regalo más preciado: el regalo de la fe.

La historia de Jesús y los dos discípulos en el camino a Emaús nos apunta con el dedo y arroja luz sobre nuestra propia situación, especialmente en tiempos de prueba y gracia, de traición y reconciliación. Su angustia es la nuestra en muchos sentidos y su tristeza nos suena familiar. ¿Cuántas veces hemos recorrido el camino de Emaús con el rostro abatido? Todo el tiempo, nos olvidamos de que Jesús camina con nosotros, listo y ansioso por ayudarnos, si tan solo pudiéramos acudir a él en esos momentos de desesperación silenciosa.
