The Most Holy Trinity

First Reading: Exodus 34:4-6.8-9
Responsorial Psalm: Daniel 3:54-56

— Glory and praise forever

Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 13:11-13
Gospel: John 3: 16-18

Today, on the Feast of the Holy Trinity, we come face-to-face with the mystery of God as a family of persons, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, a family where there is complete harmony, love, and total peace. This feast was introduced into the Church calendar in the fourteenth century in order for us to reflect on the nature of the God we believe in.

In our society and in the world, we have believers (theists) and unbelievers (atheists). Believers have many gods or at least, many ways of understanding who God is. For example, the Moslems say that God created heaven and earth but never came down to earth and governs from high up. There are also Christians of other faith denominations who only believe that Jesus Christ became reincarnated in their founder who acts as a modern-day prophet and that God is a powerful and a terrible ruler, easily annoyed and quick to condemn. There are also many Christians who say that they believe in the Father revealed to us by Jesus but are in fact, still harboring in themselves an idea of God who is either pagan or a Moslem God or maybe, they worship God whom they have made up in their minds or imaginations.

The first reading from the book of Exodus tells us that the biblical God is very different from the gods of the pagans, or the god worshipped by people of other religions.

In the book of Exodus, (first reading) we see here that God revealed himself to Moses, not as a powerful and terrible ruler, not one who frightens and threatens people, not a Supreme Being who is full of whims that he makes us tremble in fear and anxiety but rather, God as a Father who looks at his children with tenderness, understands their mistakes and faults and loves them even when they sin. As such, He looks at a contrite heart with a forgiving spirit as we read, "Having come down in a cloud, the Lord stood with Moses there and proclaimed his name, 'Lord.' Thus, the Lord passed before him and cried out, 'The Lord, the Lord, a merciful and

gracious God, slow to anger and rich in kindness and fidelity."

Yet many Christians still link God with fear. For them, God is the one who knows us all, sees all of us, spies on us to discover our wrongdoings and waits for us at the end to punish us if he does not start punishing us even in this life. Could anyone love such a God?

Jesus says in the Gospel to Nicodemus, "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not die but may have eternal life." These words of Jesus about who God is can greatly help us understand the ways of God. He is not just the merciful Lord, rich in mercy and full of compassion, as we heard in the first reading; he is also somebody who loves us to such a degree that he sent his "only Son", to such a degree that he became one of us. This "only Son" reminds us of Abraham, who, to prove his faithfulness to God, was ready to sacrifice his only son, Isaac.

So when we think of God becoming man in Jesus, let us not just be satisfied with thinking that this event is only an episode, an incident in his life; that he just came among us, was with us for thirty odd years, taught and did all kinds of things and returned to heaven, far away from us and there, he is back to resume his usual routine of spying on our sins. Enough of this false God because Jesus Christ, the son of God, remains one of us forever; he is not pulling himself out of this world; he is not afraid of getting involved with what is going on in this sinful world.

The love God has for us has been manifested through the gift of his only Son. Hence, if God has manifested his love for us in this world, then we have to accept God's love. As long as people reject God's love, they will condemn themselves to unhappiness; they themselves will pronounce the judgment on themselves because God has already pronounced his judgment on Calvary, and it was a judgment of salvation for all.❖

Each liturgy is special. To be with Jesus in his Word and in his real presence together with the parish family makes it special. Last Sunday was another such celebration, also because we were celebrating the birthday of the Church as we remembered the descent of the Holy Spirit on the Apostles and Mary who were gathered together in the Upper Room. Here was the promised Advocate!

I could not help take note of certain moments in that hour and reflect on them, if not right away, then shortly thereafter and even through the entire week. Oh yes, those songs kept replaying in my mind... "Come O Holy Spirit Come...", "Console our restless lives...", "Bend our stubborn heart and will..."

The Rite of Sprinkling and Renewing our Baptismal Promises

All throughout the Easter Season, we renewed our baptismal promises and reasserted our beliefs right at the beginning of the Mass. Prompted by the presider, we gave our resounding "I do's" and concluding "Amen". Usually we affirm our faith by reciting the Creed to conclude the Liturgy of the Word. But with the question and response in three parts, it made ever clearer our faith in each person of the Trinity and our salvation story. The first question was "Do you believe in God the Father ... Creator..."; the second question, Do you believe in Jesus Christ, his only son who became man and died for us, rose from the dead and ascended into heaven; and the third question, do you believe in the Holy Spirit, (whose coming gave birth to) the Holy Catholic Church. In the third section as well is an enumeration of what we can enjoy by the action of the Trinity: the Communion of Saints, the forgiveness of Sins, the Resurrection of the Body, and life everlasting.



This was followed by the sprinkling of the Baptismal Waters on the Congregation while the Gloria was sung. This sprinkling with water reminds us of our Baptism "with water and the Holy Spirit", when we were wiped clean of our sin and born to new life in Christ. It was very moving to sing the Gloria as we were recalling our baptism, praising the Father in the first part, then recalling again the sacrifice of Christ, the "lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world" by whose saving power we could be baptized and washed clean and become an adopted child of God, partaker of the divine nature, co-heir with Christ, temple of the Holy Spirit. Father Rolly's Homily


There were many beautiful reflections in Fr. Rolly's homily but probably the one that went straight to my heart was when he said that we may be from different cultures, countries with many different native tongues, but we speak with only one accent—the accent of love. This is our Christian story — a life lived in love, because of love, and out of love. Because God loves us immensely, he became man, suffered, died and rose again for the forgiveness of our sins. And all we have to do is love him and love one another.

Recommissioning of the Lay Ministers.

Many moons ago, pre-pandemic for sure, as I sat on the pew and the lay ministers were invited to rise for their recommissioning, I had goose bumps for it seemed that the whole church had gotten up to their feet. I felt the push to truly discern what gifts I had received from the Holy Spirit, not only at Baptism but in my every day. And then to pray for the grace to know how God wanted me share those gifts.

At last Sunday's recommissioning, there weren't the same numbers of my recollection who stood up to renew their commitment to their respective ministries. It may be that people were out of town for the long weekend, or have not fully returned from the pandemic, or just need that same push I felt those many years ago. Regardless, I think that being in ministry is precisely what it means to speak with only one accent— that of love. Being in ministry is serving God and serving our parish family. Not because we are the most qualified for the job but because we are there to love.

Today is Trinity Sunday. At every Mass, and not just today, we are reminded many times and in many ways of each Person in the Trinity and their Oneness. We too are called to live in Trinitarian relationships. If we love one another, "we are no longer two but three for Jesus is in our midst; no longer two but one, for in Him we are one."❖

Is the Pandemic Over? (In case you missed it)

The World Health Organization (WHO) on Friday, May 5th, announced that **COVID-19** is now an established and ongoing health issue which **no longer constitutes a public health emergency of international concern (PHEIC)**. In their deliberations, they noted the decreasing trend in COVID-19 deaths, the decline in COVID-19 related hospitalizations and intensive care unit admissions, and the high levels of population immunity to SARS-CoV-2. Meanwhile, the CDC reported that **May 11, 2023, marks the end of the federal COVID-19 PHE declaration**.

Both the WHO and CDC are quick to point out that **we need to remain vigilant** against the virus and that we should not forget the community-level strategies we have developed for prevention.

- * We encourage our parish family to fill the pews at our Sunday Masses. All are welcome.


In the News:

Celebrating our Saint for the Week

June 6: Saint Norbert, Bishop (ca. 1080 – 1134): St. Norbert was born in the Holy Roman Empire, in the province of Germany to nobility. In his youth, St. Norbert was far from saintly as he enjoyed the easy life and preferred anything that was pleasurable. Until one violently stormy day, he had an experience, much like Saul's on the road to Damascus, when a thunderbolt hit him and he was knocked out. When he came to, he prayed, "Lord what do you want me to do." From his heart he heard the Lord's answer, "Turn from evil and do good.." Thus began his conversion. After three years of prayer and

penance, he sought priestly ordination. As an itinerant preacher, a priest and later as a bishop, he worked for the reform of the clergy, fought against heresies and founded a religious order called the Premonstratensians now called Norbertines. St. Norbert was elevated to Archbishop of Magdeburg, which he reluctantly accepted. He served for 8 years until his death on June 6, 1134. Miracles have been ascribed to him both when he was still alive and after his death.

La Organización Mundial de la Salud (OMS) anunció el viernes 5 de mayo que **COVID-19 es ahora un problema de salud establecido y en curso que ya no constituye una emergencia de salud pública de interés internacional (PHEIC)**. En sus deliberaciones, notaron la tendencia decreciente en las muertes por COVID-19, la disminución en las hospitalizaciones relacionadas con COVID-19 y las admisiones a la unidad de cuidados intensivos, y los altos niveles de inmunidad de la población al SARS-CoV-2. Mientras tanto, los CDC informaron que el 11 de mayo de 2023 marca el final de la declaración federal de PHE por COVID-19.

Tanto la OMS como los CDC se apresuran a señalar que **debemos permanecer alerta** contra el virus y que no debemos olvidar las estrategias a nivel comunitario que hemos desarrollado para la prevención.

Santo del Dia:

6 de junio: San Norberto, Obispo (AD 1080 - 1134): .San Norberto nació de padres nobles y comenzó a vivir una vida lejos de la santidad. En cierto momento, tuvo una experiencia que le cambió la vida y que lo llevó a su profunda conversión. Después de un período de oración y penitencia de 3 años, recibió la ordenación sacerdotal. Como predicador itinerante, sacerdote y luego obispo, trabajó por la reforma del clero, luchó contra las herejías y fundó una orden religiosa llamada Premonstratenses, ahora llamada Norbertinos. Se le atribuyen milagros tanto en vida como después de su muerte el 6 de junio de 1134. Fue canonizado en 1582

De las escrituras a la vida ...

¿Cuán importantes debemos ser tú y yo para que Dios envíe a su único Hijo a morir por nuestros pecados?

Santísima Trinidad**Primera Lectura:** Éxodo 34, 4-6. 8-9**Salmo Responsorial:** Daniel 3, 53. 54.– *Cantado y exaltado eternamente.***Segunda Lectura:** 2 Corintios 13, 11-13**Evangelio:** San Juan 3, 16-18

Hoy, en la fiesta de la Santísima Trinidad, nos encontramos cara a cara con el misterio de Dios como familia de personas, Padre, Hijo y Espíritu Santo, una familia donde hay plena armonía, amor y paz total. Esta fiesta se introdujo en el calendario de la Iglesia en el siglo catorce para que reflexionemos sobre la naturaleza del Dios en el que creemos.

En nuestra sociedad y en el mundo, tenemos creyentes (teístas) y no creyentes (ateos).

Los creyentes tienen muchos dioses o, al menos, muchas formas de entender quién es Dios. Por ejemplo, los musulmanes dicen que Dios creó el cielo y la tierra, pero nunca bajó a la tierra y gobierna desde lo alto. También hay cristianos de otras denominaciones de fe que solo creen que Jesucristo se reencarnó en su fundador, quien actúa como un profeta moderno y que Dios es un gobernante poderoso y terrible, que se enoja fácilmente y condena rápidamente. También hay muchos cristianos que dicen que creen en el Padre revelado a nosotros por Jesús, pero de hecho, todavía en sí mismos una idea pagana de Dios o una idea de un Dios musulmán o tal vez, adoran a un Dios que han inventado en sus mentes o imaginaciones.

La primera lectura del libro del Éxodo nos dice que el Dios bíblico es muy diferente de los dioses de los paganos, o del dios adorado por personas de otras religiones.

En el libro del Éxodo, (primera lectura) vemos aquí que Dios se le reveló a Moisés, no como un gobernante poderoso y terrible, no como uno que asusta y amenaza a la gente, no como un Ser Supremo que está lleno de caprichos que nos hace temblar en el miedo y la angustia, sino más bien, Dios como Padre que mira a sus hijos con ternura, comprende sus errores y faltas y los ama incluso cuando pecan. Como tal, Él mira a un corazón contrito con un espíritu de perdón cuando leemos, "El Señor descendió en una nube y se le hizo presente. Moisés pronunció entonces el nombre del Señor, y el Señor pasando delante de él, proclamó: "Yo soy el Señor, Señor Dios, compasivo y clemente, paciente, misericordioso y fiel".

Sin embargo, muchos cristianos todavía vinculan a Dios con el miedo. Para ellos, Dios es el que nos conoce a todos, nos ve a todos, nos espía para descubrir nuestras faltas y nos espera al final para castigarnos si no empieza a castigarnos incluso en esta vida. ¿Alguien podría amar a un Dios así?

Jesús dice en el Evangelio a Nicodemo: "Tanto amó Dios al mundo, que le entregó a su Hijo único, para que todo el que crea en él no perezca, sino que tenga la vida eterna". Estas palabras de Jesús acerca de quién es Dios pueden ayudarnos mucho a comprender los caminos de Dios. No es sólo el Señor misericordioso, rico en misericordia y lleno de compasión, como escuchamos en la primera lectura; es también alguien que nos ama hasta tal punto que envió a su "Hijo único", hasta tal punto que se hizo uno de nosotros. Este "Hijo único" nos recuerda a Abraham, quien, para probar su fidelidad a Dios, estuvo dispuesto a sacrificar a su único hijo, Isaac.


Por eso, cuando pensamos en Dios haciéndose hombre en Jesús, no nos contentemos con pensar que este acontecimiento es sólo un episodio, un incidente de su vida; que estuvo entre nosotros, convivió con nosotros durante treinta y tantos años, enseñó e hizo toda clase de cosas y volvió al cielo, lejos de nosotros y allí, está de vuelta para retomar su rutina habitual de espiar nuestros pecados. Basta de este falso Dios porque Jesucristo, el hijo de Dios, sigue siendo uno de nosotros para siempre; no está ausente de este mundo; él no tiene miedo de involucrarse con lo que está pasando en este mundo pecaminoso.

El amor que Dios nos tiene se ha manifestado a través del don de su Hijo único. Por lo tanto, si Dios ha manifestado su amor por nosotros en este mundo, entonces tenemos que aceptar el amor de Dios. Mientras la gente rechace el amor de Dios, se condenará a sí misma a la infelicidad; ellos mismos pronunciarán el juicio sobre sí mismos porque Dios ya pronunció su juicio en el Calvario, y fue un juicio de salvación para todos.
