## 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time

**First Reading:** Isaiah 55:10-11

**Responsorial Psalm:** Psalm 65

— *The seed that falls on good ground will yield a fruitful harvest.*

**Second Reading:** Romans 8:18-23

**Gospel:** Matthew 13:1-23

There was a time when the people of Israel were exiled into Babylon for years and they wondered if they would ever return to their homeland. But one day, amidst this exiled people who were tired and disappointed, God raised up a prophet, who proclaimed that liberation was at hand. The people got ready, but years went by, and nothing happened. The Israelites thus fell into discouragement once again. When shall God's word be realized? Is God keeping His promises?

The prophet answered them saying, "Just as from the heavens the rain and the snow come down and do not return there till they have watered the earth making it fertile and fruitful ..., so shall my word ... not return to me void." (1st reading).

Has anything like this ever happened to us? Oftentimes, we are seized by a kind of distrust when we do not receive the immediate realization of God's love and mercy or the promised rewards of a virtuous life. For if we look around us, it seems that those who are successful in this world are the wicked, the shrewd, the dishonest, and the corrupt.

Jesus presents to us, in today's Gospel reading, some answers to the difficulties we go through each day in the parable of the farmer and the seed. In the time of Jesus, the farmer did not begin by hoeing or plowing, or weeding. He first sowed and then hoed or plowed. We can thus understand how the seed could fall among the stones, or among the weeds or thorns, or on the small paths formed in the field. The areas among the stones and among the weeds, the good soil, and the paths in the field become the seedbed which refers to the people who receive God's Word — the seeds. After the seeds had been sown, the farmer would pass with his hoe or plow.

Jesus was telling this story at a time when

even after working miracles, preaching good things, doing wonderful works for the people of Israel, he was, nevertheless, thrown out of his town of Nazareth. He was treated as mad and a drunkard as they accused him of mingling with sinners and outcasts. The Pharisees just wanted to get rid of him. In other words, the whole of his preaching seemed to have fallen on deaf ears. The conditions were totally unfavorable, and his words seemed destined to die out. But in this parable, Jesus says that in spite of all contradictions and obstacles, his word will yield abundant fruit because it holds in itself the irresistible force of life. There will be people who reject his word outright, others who receive it and reject it later; still others who receive it, treasure it and put it into practice. The problem, therefore, is not in receiving God's word. The problem is in treasuring it and putting it into practice.

The time of sowing God's word is always a difficult time. Our times make it more difficult. St. Paul, in the second reading, (the letter to the Romans) spoke of these times when he said that it is a time of groaning and crying in pain, but it is not the groaning and crying of death, rather, it is the beginning of new life.

There is no difficulty in receiving God's Word. However, it is not enough to just receive God's Word. It is not enough to hear and understand His Word. Instead, we need to take it to heart and do our part to make it real and alive.

If the seed is to grow and bear fruit, it needs good and fertile soil. Seeds do not grow by themselves. Seeds need the right type of soil to receive them in order to germinate. As Christ solemnly says, "Unless the grain of wheat falls to the earth and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit." (John 12:24).

## Cast into the Deep (July 16)

### Stop and Listen

The sound of the alarm going off in the morning; the drip, drip, dripping of the coffee through the filter into the cup; water in the shower running; the microwave's "ding"; the newscaster's report on a signal— all these in the first few minutes of our day. Our ears are assailed by a cacophony of sounds that all end up somewhere in our brain, our brain that is slowly coming out of the fog of sleep. And as the day progresses, there is likewise a progression of sounds, some directed to us and some that we create ourselves.



In contrast, against the backdrop of the evening stars, there settles a quiet as the world slumbers punctuated only by an occasional car driving by or a dog barking, awakened by something or someone. In this nighttime quiet, you can almost hear yourself think.

World Listening Day is coming up in two days, on Tuesday, July 18th. Since its inception in 2010, World Listening Day, invites us to be more aware of the sounds around us. It encourages us to unplug and listen to the sound of the earth, of nature. How soothing it is.



Sometimes I find myself awake early in the morning while it is still dark and silent. Then soon enough, the world gradually awakens. The birds start chirping, one here, another there and pretty soon there is a chorus of birds singing. If you listen closely, you can almost hear the conversation they are having. However, it is not limited to bird sounds. There's lots of rustling beneath my window. I could almost imagine the leaves of trees shaking themselves awake. But of course it may be the breeze, or a lizard scurrying after prey, or a possum or some other creature getting ready for the day or going home after a night's foraging.

On World Listening Day we are encouraged to learn how to listen and to practice listening. Not just to the sounds of the earth and of nature, but to our neighbor of the moment. This could be our spouse, our child, our coworker, a friend, a client, etc. But how do we listen? Attentively, mindfully, completely. Therefore, to listen means to have patience. Make sure you are hearing the words and listening to the words. If one is in a hurry or impatiently listening, it would be easy to miss the words or sentences being said and could easily lead to misunderstanding. Instead one has to be empty of one's own ideas. There can be no judgements. Listen to this imaginary conversation. Emily: "I spoke with Isabella and..." Laura: "You can't do that. That's not the right way to go about it." Emily: "But.. But..." Laura: "This is what you need to do...." We know what happens next—Emily clams up, she feels sad, upset and frustrated. She is no closer to a solution. Laura is not very happy either. She may even feel a little guilty for interrupting Emily's story.


In fact, keep in mind, that one shouldn't offer solutions unless specifically requested to provide one. Even then, instead of offering an outright solution, it would be better to accompany Emily in her discernment. More often than not, though, just by the action of attentive and active listening, the one listened to has a light bulb moment and understands what she needs to do. I would like to think that the Holy Spirit was the light bulb moment, the Holy Spirit who could be present because of attentive listening, i.e., listening in love and out of love.



Finally, we also learn to listen and to practice listening to our inner voice. In stillness, the inner voice speaks louder. And that inner voice, is the Holy Spirit. In the din of everyday life, if we do not stop and quiet down our environment and our words, we may not hear the promptings of the Holy Spirit, he who is the Grace that allows us to discern the will of the Father and to do it.

Jesus tells the apostles, "Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest awhile." (Mark 6:31) We can take this invitation for ourselves, to be quiet and listen to the earth, to nature, to listen to what the other is trying to say and to listen to our inner voice and the promptings of the Holy Spirit.

## Proclaiming the Word Lector Ministry



In our celebration of the Holy Mass, we meet Jesus in many ways. As we begin our celebration we encounter Jesus in each person and when we pause to greet one another, we remember that Jesus is in each one of us. Then, in the Liturgy of the Word, Jesus comes to us in his Word. At Holy Communion, we are nourished by his Body and Blood. And as we leave the Church at the end of the Mass, we pray that we can be Jesus to each one that we meet, "... no longer I who live but Christ who lives in me" (Galatians 2:20)



Today we shine a light on the lectors and their ministry. Those who proclaim God's word in the liturgy are known as Lectors. They may also be called Readers or Ministers of the Word.

"When the Sacred Scriptures are read in the Church, God himself speaks to his people, and Christ, present in his word, proclaims the Gospel. Therefore, the readings from the Word of God are to be listened to reverently by everyone, for they are an element of the greatest importance in the Liturgy." (General Instruction of the Roman Missal [GIRM], no. 29) Thus, we note that the Lector Ministry and being a lector is an integral part of the Liturgy. In essence, the lector takes the printed page and gives life to it, gives life to the life-giving Word. (cf Hebrews 4:12)



Just as we listen reverently to the Word of God being proclaimed in the Mass, the lector approaches the scripture and the proclaiming of it with the same reverence. Just as the Eucharistic Minister lovingly gives Jesus in the Eucharist to the communicant, the lector gives Jesus in His word to the people of God with the same care, love and awe. Being a lector is a privilege but also a responsibility.



As such, it is presumed that lectors are Catholics of good standing, with a deep love of scriptures, eager to share the Word of God with their fellow parishioners, and ready to avail themselves of all the means to deepen their faith and improve the effectiveness of their service.

One might think that going up to the ambo in front of so many people is a scary proposition. Add to that having to read the scripture in just the right way, not too dramatic but not too deadpan, either, enunciating well and not tripping over those Biblical names. Of course it is natural to feel nervousness, for some more than for others. Use the nervousness as a motivation to practice more and thus proclaim better. More importantly, offer it up to Jesus. Before every action, we say, "For you, Jesus." so even in the physical act of proclaiming the Word, we say, "For you Jesus. For you in the people listening to your Word."



Being a lector is a calling and we pray for the grace to hear the call and to answer the call. As St. Paul says, "But grace was given to each of us according to the measure of Christ's gift....And he gave some as apostles, others as prophets, others as evangelists, others as pastors and teachers to equip the holy ones for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ..." (Ephesians 4:7, 11-12)

Finally, a useful quote from St. Paul to keep in your back pocket on trying days in ministry (and they do come), "Let us not grow tired of doing good, for in due time we shall reap our harvest, if we do not give up. So then, while we have the opportunity, let us do good to all, but especially to those who belong to the family of the faith." (Galatians 6:9-10) ♦

### Santo del Día: 18 de julio: San Camilo de Lellis, sacerdote

(1550 - 1614): San Camilo era un santo improbable ya que solía meterse en problemas en su juventud debido a su juego y su naturaleza agresiva. Pero Dios tenía otros planes para él. Habiendo apostado todas sus posesiones, buscó trabajo en el Convento de los Capuchinos. Allí un fraile reconoció su mejor naturaleza, y Camilo experimentó una conversión después de escuchar la exhortación del fraile. Fue ordenado a la edad de 34 años. Dedicó su vida al cuidado de los enfermos y fundó una orden religiosa con un ministerio para el cuidado de los enfermos. Se dice que San Camilo poseía los dones de curación y profecía. El Papa Benedicto XIV lo canonizó en 1746.

## De las escrituras a la vida ...

**¿Cómo puedes enmendar tu “tierra” para aceptar la palabra de Dios y nutrirla para que crezca y produzca buenos frutos?**

**Decimoquinto Domingo Del Tiempo Ordinario****Primera Lectura:** Isaías 55, 10-11**Salmo Responsorial:** Salmo 65— *La semilla cayó en tierra buena y dio fruto.***Segunda Lectura:** Romanos 8, 18-23**Evangelio:** San Mateo 13, 1-23

Hubo un periodo de tiempo en que el pueblo de Israel estuvo exiliado en Babilonia durante años y se preguntaban si alguna vez volverían a su tierra natal. Pero un día, en medio de este pueblo exiliado que estaba cansado y desilusionado, Dios elevó un profeta, quien proclamó que la liberación estaba cerca. La gente se preparó, pero pasaron los años y no pasó nada. Así, los israelitas volvieron a caer en el desánimo. ¿Cuándo se cumplirá la palabra de Dios? ¿Está Dios cumpliendo sus promesas?

El profeta les respondió diciendo: "Como bajan del cielo la lluvia y la nieve y no vuelven allá, sino después de empapar la tierra, de fecundarla y hacerla germinar ..., así será mi palabra... no volverá a mí sin resultado". (1ra lectura).

¿Nos ha pasado algo así alguna vez? A menudo, nos invade una especie de desconfianza cuando no recibimos la realización inmediata del amor y la misericordia de Dios o las recompensas prometidas de una vida virtuosa. Porque si miramos a nuestro alrededor, parece que los que tienen éxito en este mundo son los malvados, los astutos, los deshonestos y los corruptos.

Jesús nos presenta, en la lectura del Evangelio de hoy, algunas respuestas a las dificultades que atravesamos cada día en la parábola del sembrador. En tiempos de Jesús, el agricultor no empezaba por cavar, ni por arar, ni por desherbar. Primero sembró y luego cavó o aró. Así podemos entender cómo la semilla pudo caer entre las piedras, o entre la maleza o los espinos, o en los caminitos formados en el campo. Las áreas entre los terrenos pedregosos y entre la maleza, la buena tierra y los caminos en el campo se convierten en el semillero que se refiere a las personas que reciben la Palabra de Dios: las semillas. Después de sembradas las semillas, el agricultor pasaba con su azadón o arado.

Jesús contaba esta historia en un momento en que incluso después de hacer milagros, predicar cosas buenas, hacer obras maravillosas para el pueblo de Israel, había sido expulsado de su ciudad de Nazaret. Lo trataron como un loco y un borracho, ya que lo acusaron de mezclarse con pecadores y marginados. Los fariseos solo querían deshacerse de él. En otras palabras, toda su predicación parecía haber caído en saco roto. Las condiciones eran totalmente desfavorables y sus palabras parecían destinadas a extinguirse. Pero en esta parábola, Jesús dice que, a pesar de todas las contradicciones y obstáculos, su palabra dará frutos abundantes porque contiene en sí misma la fuerza irresistible de la vida. Habrá personas que rechacen su palabra de plano, otras que la reciban y luego la rechacen; aún otros que la reciben, la atesoran y la ponen en práctica. El problema, por lo tanto, no está en recibir la palabra de Dios. El problema está en atesorarlo y ponerlo en práctica.

El tiempo de sembrar la palabra de Dios es siempre un tiempo difícil. Nuestros tiempos lo hacen más difícil. San Pablo, en la segunda lectura, (la carta a los Romanos) habla de estos tiempos cuando dice que es un tiempo de gemidos y llantos de dolor, pero no es el gemido y llanto de la muerte, sino que es el comienzo de una nueva vida.

No hay dificultad en recibir la Palabra de Dios. Sin embargo, no es suficiente simplemente recibir la Palabra de Dios. No es suficiente escuchar y entender su Palabra. En cambio, debemos tomarlo en serio y hacer nuestra parte para que viva y sea real.

Para que la semilla crezca y dé fruto, necesita tierra buena y fértil. Las semillas no crecen solas. Las semillas necesitan el tipo de suelo adecuado para recibirlas para poder germinar. Como Cristo dice solemnemente: "Si el grano de trigo no cae en tierra y muere, queda como un grano de trigo; pero si muere, da mucho fruto." (Juan 12, 24).
