## Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading:

Wisdom 18:6-9

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 33

— Blessed the people the Lord has chosen to be His own.

Second Reading: Hebrews 11:1-2.8-12

Luke 12:32-48

For all of us who believe in God, life is a journey of searching in the valley of shadows and darkness, full of fear and doubts. Every person remains a mystery and an unsolved problem. We see ourselves as strangers and exiles, pilgrims in search of a better place beyond our present world. The only beacon of light we have is our faith. It is our attempt at solving the profound mystery of where we came from, why we are here, and where we are going.

The first reading from the Book of Wisdom shows the people of Israel looking back at their history and discovering how God has always been faithful in spite of their unfaithfulness to God. And the faithfulness of God towards them gives them courage and hope for the future.

The second reading speaks of Abraham and Sarah, models of faith in God. They obeyed God's voice and had always been faithful to God. They believed His salvation even when things seemed to be the opposite. They were ever ready to answer God's call. The Jews could not think about trust in God and without recalling the story of Abraham who left his family, friends and country and became a pilgrim.

The parable in today's gospel focuses on the unpredictable return of Jesus and our need to be prepared for his return. He's saying to us, "Ready or not, here I come." When we think of being ready, we usually think of preparing for the worst: locks on doors in case of thieves, life jackets in the event of a boat accident.

It is certain that Jesus will return. However, we can never know precisely when he will return. We just have to be alert and watchful, that is, being faithful and ready so that we may be found worthy of sharing in the eternal life he has prepared for us whether it be now or later.

Isn't it interesting that most of us believe in preparing for many uncertainties, but not for the most important event of our lives? We carry a spare tire in our car as preparation for

a flat. We have insurance to prepare for a theft, fire trucks are on standby in preparation for a fire. Airline stewards provide pre-flight instruction to prepare for turbulent weather, and we seek education to prepare for a good job. In our society, preparation is a sign of wisdom. But think about this. Of all the preparations that we make for the things I just mentioned, not a single one of these events is a certainty — yet we feel compelled to prepare ourselves for them.

The call from God to go forward into the unknown is made to all of us. We, no less than Abraham, are called to leave behind something and to put our trust in God. Each day, we have countless opportunities of showing our faithfulness.

Our life on earth must be a life of vigilance, a watchful waiting in faith and hope. The Lord comes in different ways. He has come and he keeps on coming. He comes when 2 or 3 are gathered in his name; He comes in Word and Sacrament; He comes in the person knocking for help at the door. And at the end of our lives, we will be meeting him. Yet hope remains that this meeting with Jesus at life's end will be a joyful one.

Just as the apostles were afraid of Jesus leaving them, we too experience fear amidst our faith and hope. Thus, his advice: "Do not live in fear, little flock. It has pleased your Father to give you the kingdom." The apostles of Jesus were afraid, not just because they were few; they were afraid of the world which was full of evil; ultimately, they were afraid of death.

Jesus tells us to invest in heavenly things rather than accumulating our treasures on earth. People who hoard their treasures will leave them spoiled or squandered by their children without even a thought for the one who worked hard for them.

Being prepared at all times is the way we live our lives in faith and love. Faith and love are not external attitudes that have no substance but are internal values that guide us to live our lives every day the way Jesus taught us♦

## Cast into the Deep That All May be One Nelle Orsburn

When a person nears the end of his life, he makes sure that he has imparted to his loved ones the important messages, e.g., Take care of your little sister; don't forget to pray; Always keep the family together; etc. Before Jesus went through His Passion and Death, he also had some last wishes, "...That they may all be one. As you, Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us ..." (John 17:20 -21). We may say that this is his last testament. This is then the dearest wish of the God who loves us immensely, enough to die for us so that we may share in His life for eternity.

"That they may all be one." It is interesting to note that Jesus did not say that they may all be one Church, or one nation or that all Catholics may be one. Thus, everyone is a candidate for unity: Jesus wants universal brotherhood among us.

Just as we want to fulfill our loved one's dying wish, all the more do we want to work for unity for this is our Savior's dying wish. But how? First and foremost, we must have unity with God. We must therefore "... pray without ceasing... (1Thess 5:17)." We must live our day in close communion with Him; by doing His will in every present moment; by loving one another; and when we sometimes fail, to be ready to start again in doing His will.

And what is His will? Scripture tells us, "Love God; love your neighbor;" not the lip-service kind of love but love in action. We must put ourselves as much as possible at the service of our neighbor. Chiara Lubich, foundress of the Focolare Movement whose charism is Unity, wrote "If we want to achieve unity, we have only one right, only one right: to serve everyone."

Loving our neighbor also means making ourselves one with them, helping them in their need, taking on what is burdening them, meeting them where they are, taking on their pain.

Again, Chiara Lubich: "Our unity with God, who dwells within us, requires total emptiness, the most heroic humility... our unity with others is achieved through humility."

In his book of prayers and reflections, In God's Reconciling Grace, Bernard de Margerie, referring to John 17:20-21, writes, "Lord Jesus, help me to make my own your prayer for the unity of your followers —and let this prayer be costly to me." Yes, it is not always easy to love, to make ourselves one with the other. But we have the best example of selflessness and humility -- Our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

What should we do when unity with our neighbor becomes difficult? We must never break but bend, until love works the miracle of giving us one heart and one mind.


There have been many times when I have had to put this into practice. Once, on the last night of our retreat, we were putting together a variety show, and I was in charge of managing the stage, coordinating stage sets and microphone needs. There wasn't much time to prepare and the overall coordinator struck me as being very laid back while I have a tendency to be a perfectionist. At first, I felt a little agitated that I did not have a good understanding of each act and their stage needs. But I remembered that it is better to be "... less perfect, but in unity rather than perfect but in disunity...". I was able to love again and do the set changes in peace and out of love for the actors and the audience. In the end, it all came together, and the audience and players loved the experience. Indeed, "perfection does not lie in ideas or in wisdom but in charity." (Chiara Lubich)

At his inaugural Mass, Pope Leo XIV emphasized "*Love and unity [as] the two dimensions of the mission entrusted to Peter by Jesus.*" He went on to express his wish that "... our first great desire be for a *united Church, a sign of unity and communion, which becomes a leaven for a reconciled world ...* We want to say to the world, with humility and joy: Look to Christ! ... to his offer of love and become his one family: *in the one Christ, we are one.*


And because action always speaks louder than words, "We are called to offer God's love to everyone, in order to achieve that unity which does not cancel out differences but values the personal history of each person and the social and religious culture of every people."

Pope Leo XIV concluded his homily with an exhortation "Together, as one people, as brothers and sisters, let us walk towards God and love one another."

How beautiful to live in harmony, with genuine love for one another! How beautiful to live for "*That all may be One.*"

Over 6 million adults have been trained through our Protecting God's Children Program, and millions of youth have been trained in the Empowering God's Children Program.

We work with dioceses, eparchies and religious communities, along with other organizations and schools.

## Far-reaching effects of child abuse



Children who suffer from sexual abuse run a greater risk of negative associated outcomes, not only with their mental health, but also suicidal tendencies, potential future abuse, more cognitive deficits, or lower educational interests and efforts. Abused children also are at higher risk for eating disorders, obesity, early onset of puberty, or chronic health issues.

Ultimately, abuse has far-reaching consequences beyond childhood for many victims, and it is critical to act quickly to protect potential victims. It's important to remember that any intervention or supportive response from a safe adult can reduce the risk of many or all negative outcomes. ### Archbishop Gomez comments on the protests around Los Angeles

"I am troubled by today's immigration enforcement raids in Los Angeles, and I am praying for our community," Archbishop Gomez said in a statement. "I pray tonight that everyone involved will exercise restraint and calm.

"We all agree that we don't want undocumented immigrants who are known terrorists or violent criminals in our communities. But there is no need for the government to carry out enforcement actions in a way that provokes fear and anxiety among ordinary, hard-working immigrants and their families."

**XIX Domingo Del Tiempo Ordinario****Primera Lectura – Sabiduría 18, 6-9****Salmo Responsorial - Salmo 33***– Dichoso el pueblo a quien Dios escogió.***Segunda Lectura – Hebreos 11, 1-2. 8-12****Evangelio – Lucas 12, 32-48**

**P**ara todos los que creemos en Dios, la vida es un viaje de búsqueda en el valle de las sombras y la oscuridad, llenos de miedos y dudas. Cada persona sigue siendo un misterio y un problema sin resolver. Nos vemos como forasteros y exiliados, peregrinos en busca de un lugar mejor más allá de nuestro mundo actual. El único faro de luz que tenemos es nuestra fe. Es nuestro intento de resolver el profundo misterio de dónde venimos, por qué estamos aquí y hacia dónde vamos.

La primera lectura del Libro de la Sabiduría muestra al pueblo de Israel repasando su historia y descubriendo cómo Dios siempre ha sido fiel a pesar de la infidelidad de ellos. Y la fidelidad de Dios hacia ellos les da valor y esperanza para el futuro.



La segunda lectura habla de Abraham y Sara, modelos de fe en Dios. Obedecieron la voz de Dios y siempre le fueron fieles. Creyeron en su salvación incluso cuando las cosas parecían ser lo contrario. Siempre estuvieron dispuestos a responder a la llamada de Dios. Los judíos no podían reflexionar en la confianza en Dios sin recordar la historia de Abraham, que dejó su familia, sus amigos y su país y se convirtió en peregrino.

La parábola del evangelio de hoy se centra en el impredecible regreso de Jesús y en nuestra necesidad de estar preparados para este evento. Nos dice: “Listos o no, aquí voy”. Cuando pensamos en estar preparados, solemos pensar en prepararnos para lo peor: cerraduras en las puertas por si hay ladrones, chalecos salvavidas en caso de un accidente de barco.

Es cierto que Jesús regresará. Nunca podemos saber con exactitud cuándo regresará. Solo debemos estar alerta y vigilantes, es decir, ser fieles y estar preparados para ser considerados dignos de compartir la vida eterna que él nos ha preparado, ya sea ahora o más tarde.

¿No es curioso que la mayoría de nosotros creemos en estar listos para muchas incertidumbres, pero no para el evento más importante de nuestras vidas? Llevamos una llanta de repuesto en el coche para estar listos por si se poncha una llanta. Tenemos seguro para estar listos para un robo, los camiones de bomberos están listos para un incendio. Las azafatas imparten instrucción previa al vuelo para prepararnos para condiciones meteorológicas turbulentas, y buscamos formación para prepararnos para un buen trabajo. En nuestra sociedad, la preparación es señal de sabiduría. Pero piensen en esto: de todos los preparativos que hacemos para las cosas que acabo de mencionar, ninguno de estos eventos es seguro – sin embargo, nos sentimos obligados a prepararnos para ellos.

El llamado de Dios a avanzar hacia lo desconocido es dirigido a todos. Nosotros, al igual que Abraham, estamos llamados a dejar atrás algo y a depositar nuestra confianza en Dios. Cada día, tenemos innumerables oportunidades de demostrar nuestra fidelidad.

Nuestra vida en la tierra debe ser una vida de vigilancia, una espera en guardia con fe y esperanza. El Señor viene de diferentes maneras. Ha venido y sigue viniendo. Viene cuando dos o tres se reúnen en su nombre; viene en la Palabra y el Sacramento; viene en la persona que llama a la puerta pidiendo ayuda. Y al final de nuestras vidas, lo encontraremos. Sin embargo, permanece la esperanza de que este encuentro con Jesús al final de la vida sea gozoso.

Así como los apóstoles temían que Jesús los abandonara, nosotros también experimentamos miedo en medio de nuestra fe y esperanza. De ahí su consejo: “No temas, rebaño mío, porque tu Padre ha tenido a bien darte el Reino”. Los apóstoles de Jesús tenían miedo, no solo por ser pocos; temían al mundo lleno de maldad; al final, tenían miedo de la muerte.

Jesús nos dice que debemos invertir en las cosas celestiales en lugar de acumular tesoros terrenales. Quienes acumulan sus tesoros serán despilfarrados o mal empleados por sus hijos, sin siquiera acordarse de quien trabajó duro por ellos.

Estar preparados en todo momento es la manera en que vivimos nuestras vidas con fe y amor. La fe y el amor no son actitudes externas sin fundamento, sino valores internos que nos guían a vivir cada día como Jesús nos enseñó. ♦

## Pescando en lo Profundo

Cuando una persona se acerca al final de su vida, se asegura de compartir con sus seres queridos los mensajes importantes, por ejemplo: Cuida de tu hermanita; no olvides orar; mantén siempre unida a la familia; etc. Antes de su Pasión y Muerte, Jesús también expresó su último deseo: "... Que todos sean uno. Como tú, Padre, en mí y yo en ti, que ellos también sean uno en nosotros ..." (Juan 17,20-21). Podríamos decir que este es su último testamento. Este es, pues, el deseo más preciado de Dios, que nos ama inmensamente, hasta el punto de morir por nosotros para que compartamos su vida eternamente.

"Que todos sean uno". Es interesante notar que Jesús no dijo que todos fueran una sola Iglesia, ni una sola nación, ni que todos los católicos fueran uno. Por lo tanto, todos somos candidatos a la unidad: Jesús desea la fraternidad universal entre nosotros.

Así como deseamos cumplir el último deseo de nuestro ser querido, con mayor razón deseamos trabajar por la unidad, pues este es el último deseo de nuestro Salvador. Pero ¿cómo? Ante todo, debemos tener unidad con Dios. Por lo tanto, debemos "...orar sin cesar..." (1 Tes 5,17). Debemos vivir nuestro día en estrecha comunión con Él; haciendo su voluntad en cada momento presente; amándonos unos a otros; y cuando a veces fallamos, estar listos para comenzar de nuevo haciendo su voluntad.

¿Y cuál es su voluntad? La Escritura nos dice: "Ama a Dios; ama a tu prójimo": no un amor de labios para afuera, sino un amor en acción. Debemos ponernos al servicio del prójimo tanto como sea posible. Chiara Lubich, fundadora del Movimiento de los Focolares, cuyo carisma es la Unidad, escribió: "Si queremos alcanzar la unidad, solo tenemos un derecho, un solo derecho: servir a todos".

Amar al prójimo también significa hacernos uno con él, ayudarlo en sus necesidades, asumir sus cargas, encontrarlo donde está, asumir su dolor.

De nuevo, Chiara Lubich: "Nuestra unidad con Dios, que habita en nosotros, exige un vacío total, la humildad más heroica... nuestra unidad con los demás se logra mediante la humildad".

En su libro de oraciones y reflexiones, En la gracia reconciliadora de Dios, Bernard de Margerie, refiriéndose a Juan 17,20-21, escribe: "Señor Jesús, ayúdame a hacer mía tu oración por la unidad de tus seguidores – y que esta oración me sea valiosa". Vaya que no siempre es fácil amar, hacernos uno con el otro. Pero tenemos el mejor ejemplo de altruismo y humildad – nuestro Señor y Salvador, Jesucristo.

¿Qué debemos hacer cuando la unidad con el prójimo se dificulta? Nunca debemos rompernos, sino doblegarnos, hasta que el amor obre el milagro de darnos un solo corazón y una sola mente.

He tenido que poner esto en práctica muchas veces. Una vez, la última noche de nuestro retiro, estábamos preparando un espectáculo de variedades y yo estaba a cargo de la gestión del escenario, coordinando la escenografía y los micrófonos. No había mucho tiempo para prepararlo, y el coordinador general me pareció muy tranquilo, mientras que yo tiendo a ser perfeccionista. Al principio, me sentí un poco inquieta por no comprender bien cada acto y sus necesidades escénicas. Pero recordé que es mejor ser "...menos perfecto, pero unido, que perfecto, pero desunido...". Pude volver a amar y hacer los cambios de escenografía en paz y por amor a los actores y al público. Al final, todo cuajó, y tanto el público como los actores disfrutaron de la experiencia. De hecho, "*La perfección no reside en las ideas ni en la sabiduría, sino en la caridad*". (Chiara Lubich)

En su Misa inaugural, el Papa León XIV enfatizó "El amor y la unidad" como las dos dimensiones de la misión confiada a Pedro por Jesús". Continuó expresando su deseo de que "...nuestro primer gran anhelo sea una Iglesia unida, signo de unidad y comunión, que se convierta en fermento para un mundo reconciliado... Queremos decir al mundo, con humildad y alegría: ¡Miren a Cristo!... a su ofrecimiento de amor y conviértanse en su única familia: *en el único Cristo, somos uno*".

Y porque las acciones siempre hablan más que las palabras, "Estamos llamados a ofrecer el amor de Dios a todos, para lograr esa unidad que no anula las diferencias, sino que valora la historia personal de cada persona y la cultura social y religiosa de cada pueblo".

El Papa León XIV concluyó su homilía con una exhortación: "Juntos, como un solo pueblo, como hermanos y hermanas, caminemos hacia Dios y amémonos unos a otros".

¡Qué hermoso es vivir en armonía, con un amor genuino los unos por los otros! ¡Qué hermoso es vivir para "Que todos sean Uno"! ♦



### What is a Pilgrimage In the Words of Pope Francis

"Making a Pilgrimage to shrines is one of the most eloquent expressions of the faith of God's people... It would be a mistake to think that those who go on a pilgrimage live a spirituality that is not personal but rather of the masses. The reality is that the pilgrim carries within him his own history and faith and the lights and shadows of his own life. Each person carries within his or her heart a special wish and a particular prayer. Those who enter the shrine immediately feel they are at home, welcomed, understood, and supported. Gazing upon the Crucifix or a image of Our Lady, a prayer is offered with tears in their eyes, brimming with faith. A shrine is truly a privileged space to meet the Lord and physically touch his mercy. To confess in a shrine is to have the experience of physically touching the mercy of God " ~ To those engaged in Pilgrimage Work, January 21, 2016

The Christian Pilgrimage is characterized by three signs:

1. "silence [which] allows one to listen, to listen with the heart, and in this way to find, while one walks, through the effort, the answers that the heart is looking for, because the heart asks questions. Indeed, God speaks in silence, like a gentle breeze..."
2. "the Gospel – always have the Gospel in your pocket ...The pilgrimage is made by re-reading the journey that Jesus took, up to the extreme gift of Self. ... when one reads the Gospel, there is someone beside us. It is the Holy Spirit. It is He who makes us understand well what the Gospel does."
3. "Matthew 25 Protocol": "Whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me" (Mt 25:40)...doing good, to people who also smaller, the most disadvantaged people. Always do good. Along the way, be attentive to others, especially those who struggle the most, who have fallen, who are in need..." ### In the Archdiocese of Los Angeles

#### Local Pilgrimage Sites

Throughout this Holy Year, a plenary Indulgence in the usual form of the Church will be granted to all the faithful who are truly repentant and detached from any sin and confess their sins sacramentally, receive Holy Communion, pray for the intentions of the Holy Father, and go on a pilgrimage visit to the [Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels](#) or [Mission Basilica San Buenaventura](#), or perform corporal or spiritual works of mercy.

### What is a plenary indulgence?

God never ceases to offer us his mercy. When we sin, an unhealthy attachment to earthly things remains even after the guilt of sin is forgiven. Such attachments can be purified here on earth through an indulgence or in purgatory; this purification is known as the remission of temporal punishment due to sin (Catechism of the Catholic Church 1472).

During the Jubilee, a plenary indulgence - the complete remission of temporal punishment due to sin (CCC,1471) - in the usual form of the Church will be granted to all the faithful who are truly repentant and confess their sins, receive Holy Communion, pray for the intentions of the Holy Father, and perform one of the following:

1. a pilgrimage visit to the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels or Mission Basilica San Buenaventura to pray;
2. participation in a parish mission or study of the documents of the Second Vatican Council or the Catechism of the Catholic Church;
3. corporal or spiritual works of mercy;
4. penitential practices.

### ¿Qué es una peregrinación? En palabras del Papa Francisco

Peregrinar a los santuarios es una de las expresiones más elocuentes de la fe del pueblo de Dios... Sería un error pensar que quienes peregrinan viven una espiritualidad no personal, sino de masas. La realidad es que el peregrino lleva en sí su propia historia y fe, así como las luces y sombras de su vida. Cada persona lleva en su corazón un deseo especial y una oración particular. Quienes entran al santuario se sienten inmediatamente como en casa, acogidos, comprendidos y apoyados. Al contemplar el Crucifijo o una imagen de Nuestra Señora, se ofrece una oración con lágrimas en los ojos. Un santuario es verdaderamente un espacio privilegiado para encontrar al Señor y tocar físicamente su misericordia. Confesarse en un santuario es tener la experiencia de tocar físicamente la misericordia de Dios, 21 de enero de 2016.

La peregrinación cristiana se caracteriza por tres signos:

1. "El silencio [que] permite escuchar, escuchar con el corazón, y así encontrar, mientras se camina, mediante el esfuerzo, las respuestas que el corazón busca, porque el corazón se pregunta. En efecto, Dios habla en silencio, como una suave brisa..."

2. "El Evangelio: ten siempre el Evangelio en el bolsillo... La peregrinación se realiza releyendo el camino de Jesús, hasta la entrega extrema de sí mismo... Cuando leemos el Evangelio, hay alguien a nuestro lado. Es el Espíritu Santo. Es Él quien nos hace comprender bien lo que hace el Evangelio."

3. "Protocolo Mateo 25": "Todo lo que hicieron con uno de estos hermanos míos más pequeños, conmigo lo hicieron" (Mt 25,40)...haciendo el bien, también a las personas más pequeñas, a las más desfavorecidas. Haz siempre el bien. En el camino, estad atentos a los demás, especialmente a los que más luchan, a los que han caído, a los que están necesitados... 

## The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary Friday, August 15

Today we celebrate the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, when she was taken into Heaven, body and soul. This feast affirms Mary's unique role in salvation history and her freedom from bodily corruption, a grace flowing from her Immaculate Conception. Defined as dogma in 1950, the Assumption is not only about Mary's glory—it is about our hope.



Mary's Assumption is a sign of God's promise fulfilled: that death does not have the final word. In her, we see the destiny of the faithful—a life transformed, a body glorified, a soul at peace. As St. Paul writes, "If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you... he will give life to your mortal bodies also" (Romans 8:11). Large-scale cyberattacks make the news, but that's just the tip of the iceberg. Cybercrime is on the rise, and the majority of attacks go unreported.

## Consider the following facts:

A cyberattack every 36 seconds

The University of Maryland found that there is an average of 2,244 cyberattacks per day, which is one every 36 seconds.

43% of SMB lack a cybersecurity defense plan

The International Criminal Police Organization (Interpol) reported that small- and medium-sized businesses (SMB) are being targeted at an increased rate.

\$108 Million lost in only 6-months

The US Federal Trade Commission, in a recent 6-month period, had seen over 128,000 phone-based fraud scams that cost victims a whopping \$108 Million – that's only half a year!

## Staying Safe Starts with YOU!

We often assume cybercrime only happens to someone else but hackers know the easiest way to get to your organization's information is through **YOU!**

Here are some actions to stay safe.

- Be careful what you post and share online.
- Don't reuse passwords for multiple sites.
- Follow your organization's security policies and procedures.
- If something seems suspicious, always verify that it's legitimate.

Estas son algunas medidas para mantenerse seguro:

- Tenga cuidado con lo que publica y comparte en línea.
- No use las mismas contraseñas para diferentes sitios.
- Respete las políticas y los procedimientos de seguridad de su organización.
- Si algo parece sospechoso, siempre verifique que sea legítimo.

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
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
