A NEW NAME!

Presented with the submitted names, ACS President Clara Chung chose "St. Peter's Rambler"—with *'Anglicanorum Newsibus'* a close (and fantastic) second. This references the Ordinariate's patron, St. Peter first Enthroned at Antioch. That Feast was held in the Middle Ages to be the anniversary of his coronation Pope. After St. Paul, motivated by friendship, rescued him from prison, Peter converted the crowds in Antioch and convinced the local magistrate to build the first Church edifice. He was enthroned and crowned in that building, before rambling East to Rome, taking his throne with him. There he was

martyred after giving St. Paul the kiss of peace, a scene depicted in iconography. The throne, a precious relic and object of devotion for centuries, was restored to Rome by Emperor Charles the Bald, now decorated in reused ivory images of the Labors of Hercules—an image both of heroic virtue, and of antique mythology's great, rambling hero. Encased in Bernini's great reredos at Rome, it was last publicly exposed in 1867 (pictured). This name can serve as a small reminder of our patron, his journeys and fervent desire for Church unity, and the journeys of many Ordinariate members, sometimes circuitous (but never aimless), to Rome. And, of course, it's catchy.

SERVE THE LORD WITH FEAR

Parochial and Plain Sermons, Volume 1: Sermon 23

WHY did Christ show Himself to so few witnesses after He rose from the dead? Because He was a King, a King exalted upon God's "Holy hill of Zion;" as the Psalm says which contains the text. Kings do not court the multitude, or show themselves as a spectacle at the will of others. They are the rulers of their people, and have their state as such, and are reverently waited on by their great men: and when they show themselves, they do so out of their condescension. They act by means of their servants, and must be sought by those who would gain favours from them.

Christ, in like manner, when exalted as the Only-begotten Son of God, did not mix with the Jewish people, as in the days of His humiliation. He rose from the grave in secret, and taught in secret for forty days, because "the government was upon His shoulder." He was no longer a servant washing His disciples' feet, and dependent on the wayward will of the multitude. He was the acknowledged Heir of all things. His throne was established by a Divine decree; and those who desired His salvation, were bound to seek His face. Yet not even by those who sought was He at once found. He did not permit the world to approach Him rashly, or curiously to gaze on Him. Those only did He call beside Him who had been His friends, who loved Him. Those only He bade "ascend the hill of the Lord," who had "clean hands and a pure heart, who had not worshipped vanity nor sworn deceitfully." These drew near, and "saw the Lord God of Israel," and so were fitted to bear the news of Him to the people at large. He remained "in His holy temple;" they from Him proclaimed the tidings of His resurrection, and of His mercy, His free pardon offered to all men, and the promises of grace and glory which His death had procured for all who believe.

Thus are we taught to serve our risen Lord with fear, and rejoice with trembling.

As a reminder, to gain a plenary indulgence, one must be free of attachment to sin, pray for the Pope's intentions, and receive communion and confession within a week of the indulgence.


The Ordinariate Tartan

Fr. Len Black, the pastor of the Ordinariate in Scotland, under the Ordinariate of Our Lady of Walsingham, has designed and registered an Ordinariate Tartan with the Scottish Register of Tartans a year ago, July 2019, under the number 12554. He hopes to have it woven by Ingles Buchan in Selkirk, but this will require an initial payment of £2500.



Why now? He designed it to commemorate the 10th anniversary of the foundation of the three Ordinariates. With that in mind, he included in the tartan the colors of the three Ordinariates' arms, along with the colors of the liturgical year as a base. This will be especially well suited to clergy and Ordinariate members, though hardly reserved to them. He suggests a wide [variety of products](#), including a hat, scarf, tie, and even as backing to a stole!

A BRIEF REVIEW OF THE NEW OFFICE

These past few weeks, since the imminent arrival of *Divine Worship: Daily Office (North American Edition)* was announced, there has been a great deal of speculation as to what did or did not make the cut. Here, we'll briefly go over some of the content of the forthcoming Office Book—this is, of course, only the beginning of what can be said about this fantastic addition to the POCSP's liturgy. (The forthcoming CTS "Commonwealth Edition", which, despite the name, excludes Canada, is pictured below)

What are the sources of the text?

The Office draws from the American and Canadian BCP tradition (especially the 1928 BCP, Rite I of the 1979 BCP, and 1962 BCP), through an especially Anglo-Catholic lens. Antiphons are taken from either the Authorized Version (KJV) of the Bible, or the Coverdale Psalter, as with many of the antiphons in *Divine Worship: The Missal*. While the rubrics allow for the RSV-CE psalter, only the Coverdale is provided. The Office Hymns are drawn from different historic Anglican translations of the pre-Urbanite Breviary Hymns, possibly with an eye towards the *Ancient Office Hymn Book*. The Lectionary itself, the 1962 Lectionary, was arguably the most Catholic Lectionary produced in the Church of England, and remains licit in the Anglican Church of Canada. The 8-week psalter provided for optional use is based on that found in the 1979 BCP. The monthly psalter divisions are provided, as normal, in the psalter itself.



What does this add to the office available online right now?

Among many other things, this Office Book includes Mattins and Evensong for the Faithful Departed, antiphons for the *Benedictus* and *Magnificat* on Sundays and Feasts, and the full body of Office Hymns traditional at the Major and Minor hours. You'll also find the Alternate Canticles for the *Benedictus es, Domine*, and for the *Nunc Dimittis* (when Compline follows). Some of Daniel Mitsui's wonderful engravings are distributed throughout.

Does it include the necessary Canadian prayers for the Monarch?

In the first set of Suffrages, "O Lord, save the State" is replaced in Canada with "O Lord, save the King (Queen)". The Litany provides the petition for the Monarch. In addition, the Occasional Prayers include, in addition to prayers for general branches of government, two collects for the Monarch and Head of the Commonwealth, one for Accession Day, one for the Commonwealth, and three specifically for Canada and its government.



Any other notes?

The Breviary appears to grant the Officiant some freedom in the edition of Bible and length of the lesson. In addition, it makes some provision for the wider use of the Athanasian Creed. The officiant will also be allowed to replace one lesson with the second lesson of the Office of Readings from St. Paul VI's Breviary (as well as in the more flexible space after the 3rd Collect). Despite functioning similarly to the Book of Common Prayer, however, it is an office book separate from the Missal. Purchasers should also be aware that, unlike with the CTS edition, the lectionary will be included as a table of lessons, but the text itself will not be included.

The site of Newman House Books is currently down for maintenance. We can hope that, when it comes back up, pre-ordering might shortly follow. In the meantime, John Covert's website, <http://prayer.covert.org/>, is being gradually updated to match the Office book. He also has a paid app in development to incorporate some of the resources detailed here. If you have a suggestion for making this service more useable, please reach out to him.
