

This is true...for marriage...and old cars...and children with bad report cards...and dogs and cats with bad hips...and aging parents....and grandparents. We keep them because they are worth it, because we are worth it. Some things we keep. Like a best friend that moved away or a classmate we grew up with.

There are just some things that make life important, like people we know who are special...And so, we keep them close!

Good family members and friends are like stars...You don't always see them, but you know they are always there.

Keep them close!

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION: Re- REGISTRATION for the 2022-2023 school year for September is now taking place. Please visit amparish.org to print an application. Please send the completed form back to the rectory with payment. All classes are onsite Grades 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 8 are on Sunday morning and attending the 10:30 Mass as a class each Sunday, *this is a requirement for all Religious Education classes*. Classes this year will be in the school building, classes start at 8:45 A.M... Doors will open 10 minutes before classes start. Grade 7 will be on Wednesday afternoon at 4:30P.M. in the Murray Center. Seventh grade is required to attend 10:30 Mass on Sunday as a class each Sunday.

To register your child for the first timed you must: (1.) Fill out registration form, (2.) Attach a copy of your child's Baptismal certificate and (3.) Return registration form with appropriate fee

If your child is not baptized, or if you are registering a new student for any grade above First Grade, you should call Theresa Asche at 718 -46406411.

Registration Fee 2022-2023 school year will be: \$50.00 for one child and \$100.00 up to three children.

All registrations are due by September 7. There will be no registration on the first day of classes.

First day of Sunday class is September 11 and the first day of Wednesdays class is September 14



Smitty: Advice to self: "Do not sit on the floor without a plan on how to get back up."


Floater: Life is like a helicopter. I don't know how to operate a helicopter!


