Dear People of God... A few years ago, I was speaking with a woman in the midst of a divorce. She made a profound comment I'll always remember. As I was listening, she was reflecting upon her life and stated: "In life, change is inevitable, but growth is optional." I have thought often of her statement over the years. Many times we fight change—we want things as they were—don't rock the boat! Yet, life around and within us is always changing. I share with you some statistics that were given to me. As we begin a new year together, enjoy the following...ponder...pass on..

The Year 1903

The year is 1903.... what a difference 122 years make! Here are some of the statistics for 1903:

- —The average life expectancy in the U.S. was 47 years.
- —Only 14 percent of the homes in the U.S. had a bathtub.
- —Only 8 percent of the homes had a telephone.
- —A three minute phone call from Denver to New York City cost eleven dollars.
- —There were only 8,000 cars in the U.S. and only 114 miles of paved roads.
- —The maximum speed limit in most cities was 10 mph.
- —Alabama, Mississippi, Iowa and Tennessee were each more heavily populated than California. With a mere 1.4 million residents, California was only the 21st most populous state in the Union.
- —The tallest structure in the world was the Eiffel Tower.
- —The average wage in the U.S. was 22 cents an hour.
- —The average worker made between \$200 and \$400 per year.
- —A competent accountant could expect to earn \$2,000 per year, a dentist \$2,500 per year, a veterinarian between \$1,500 and \$4,000 per year and a mechanical engineer about \$5,000 per year.
- —More than 95 percent of all births in the U.S. took place at home.
- —90 percent of all U.S. physicians had no college education. Instead, they attended medical schools, many of which were condemned in the press and by the government as "substandard."
- —Sugar cost four cents a pound. Eggs were 14 cents a dozen. Coffee cost 15 cents a pound.
- —Most women only washed their hair once a month and used borax or egg yolks for shampoo.
- —Canada passed a law prohibiting poor people from entering the country for any reason.
- —The five leading causes of death in the U.S. were: 1. Pneumonia and influenza. 2. Tuberculosis. 3. Diarrhea. 4. Heart disease. 5. Stroke.
- —The American flag had 45 stars. Arizona, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Hawaii and Alaska hadn't been admitted to the Union yet.
- —The population of Las Vegas, Nevada, was 30.
- —Crossword puzzles, canned beer and iced tea hadn't been invented.
- —There was no Mother's Day or Father's Day.
- -One in ten U.S. adults couldn't read or write.
- —Only six percent of all Americans had graduated from high school.

So as we live our life — live one day at a time centering life in God—and may our lives always reflect Gospel values rooted in Jesus Christ.

Baptism of the Lord January 12, 2025

First Reading: *Isaiah 40:1-5,9-11*Isaiah tells the people to prepare a way for the Lord.

Responsorial Psalm: *Psalm 104:1b-4,24-25,27-30*A prayer praising God's greatness

Second Reading: *Titus* 2:11-14; 3:4-7 Jesus Christ saved us and renewed us with his Holy Spirit.

Gospel Reading: *Luke 3:15-16,21-22* Jesus is baptized by John.

Background on the Gospel Reading

Today we celebrate the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. In today's Gospel, as in the other Gospel accounts of Jesus' baptism, we hear John the Baptist address the confusion of the people who thought that John might be the Messiah. In response, John contrasts the baptism that he performs with the Baptism that Jesus will inaugurate. John the Baptist says that he has baptized with water, but that someone will come and baptize with the Holy Spirit. The type of baptism that John performed was not yet a Christian Baptism; it was a preparation for Christian Baptism through which sins are forgiven and the gift of the Holy Spirit is received.

The baptism of Jesus is reported in each of the three Synoptic Gospels—Matthew, Mark, and Luke. Clearly, it was an event of great significance for Jesus and for the early Christian community. The Evangelists Mark and Luke report the story from Jesus' perspective; the voice from heaven is addressed to Jesus. Compare this to Matthew's Gospel in which the voice from heaven speaks to everyone. In Luke, however, the Holy Spirit descends upon Jesus during his time of prayer after his baptism. Through his Gospel, Luke will show Jesus to be a person of prayer who withdraws regularly from the crowds and his disciples to pray to his Father.

The baptism of Jesus is considered a manifestation of God in Jesus, another "epiphany." On this, the last day of the Christmas season, our Gospel reveals to us Jesus' relation to God: the son of Mary and Joseph is also God's own Son. In Luke's Gospel, all three members of the Trinity are manifested here: God the Father in the voice, the Holy Spirit descending, and Jesus the Son. At the beginning of his Gospel, Luke is communicating to us important information about the identity of Jesus. In the verses that follow, Luke lists the genealogy of Jesus, tracing Jesus' ancestry back to the first person, Adam, who is also identified as the son of God. We, the children of Adam and Eve, are again made children of God through Baptism.

The Baptism of Our Lord

The Christmas season closes this Sunday with the Baptism of the Lord. This feast is a sister to last week's feast of the Epiphany. Each of them celebrates an "epiphany," or a manifestation of the Spirit of God in Jesus--first in his birth, and now at his baptism. The divine Spirit is manifested in all of the scriptures for this feast. Psalm 104 highlights the Spirit of God creating and renewing the earth, while the reading from Isaiah describes God restoring Israel. In Luke's account of the baptism of the Lord the Holy Spirit descends upon Jesus. And the letter to Titus reminds us that the Holy Spirit was "richly poured out" on us also, through the "bath of rebirth" (Titus 3:5, 6). Copyright (c) J. S. Paluch Co.



TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Merry Christmas! Share that cheerful greeting with some folks today. They may wonder if you have had any Elvis sightings lately, attended Star Trek conventions, or were Cleopatra in a previous lifetime. Despite the skeptics, today is solidly within the Christmas season. In fact, in some strands of the Christian tradition it represents the clearest manifestation of the mystery of the Incarnation. On Christmas Day, for example, the Gospel reading is the Prologue of John's Gospel, which reveals the glory of Christ shining through our humanity precisely in his baptism.

At any rate, this is an ancient feast, celebrated first in Egypt sixteen centuries ago. More than most other ancient people, the Egyptians understood the life-giving properties of water. On this day, they drew water from the Nile, so central in the history of their people, and reserved it in honor. Many other places copied the custom, so that St. John Chrysostom wrote of people in Antioch gathering at midnight to collect flowing water into vessels they brought from home since "today there is a blessing on the water." At home for dinner tonight, decorate the table with beautiful bowls of water and white candles, toast one another with goblets of sparkling water, and light a Christmas candle in the window one last time. As practical moderns programmed to measure worth by productivity, we instinctively appreciate the Jubilee's call to embrace the practical challenges of our baptism with great hope.

But today Luke focuses not on Jesus being baptized, but on Jesus praying after baptism. So must we pray to become the disciples we are called to be, that the Spirit empower us to do what disciples are called to do. Imitating Jesus' openness to the Spirit will enable us to cooperate with the grace that transforms us into "beloved sons [and daughters] . . . in whom the Father is well pleased," living out, in this Jubilee Year as Pilgrims of Hope, the extraordinary potential of our baptism. 


