EASTER JOURNEY THOUGHT

Dear Easter People, my father died in May 2001 at the age of 81. My family received many, many kinds notes, prayers and Masses offered. However, I was struck by one sentence of a letter received from a friend. His last line stated: "I will keep you in my prayers knowing that prayers do not change God, but they do change the 'prayer-er.'" Prayer is God's grabbing my attention—and changing me. Prayer must be at the root of our lives.

The Gospels do not explain Easter — Easter explains the Gospels. Our lives do not explain Easter—Easter gives meaning to our lives. Faith is the story we tell with our lives.

Resurrection means Jesus lives. Our Lord discovered what to die for and what to live forever for. We are invited to do the same. For Easter speaks of new life and hope always in the name of the Lord Jesus. We have so many choices in life and demands are placed upon us. What are we choosing? What are we seeking? What are we finding in life? Easter is an opportunity to put life into perspective through eyes of "Easter faith."

I share with you again what was given to me. Enjoy..... and pass it on.

- 2. God won't ask the square footage of your house. He'll ask how many people you welcomed into your house.***

- 5. God won't ask what your job title was. He'll ask if you performed your job to the best of your ability.***

- 7. God won't ask in what neighborhood you lived. He'll ask how you treated your neighbors.***
- 8. God won't ask about the color of your skin. He'll ask about the content of your character.***

Easter Sunday April 20, 2025

First Reading: *Acts of the Apostles 10:34a,37-43*
Peter preaches about Jesus' life, death, and resurrection.

Responsorial Psalm: *Psalm 118:1-2,16-17,22-23*
Rejoice in this day of the Lord.

Second Reading: *1 Corinthians 5:6b-8*
1 Corinthians: Let us celebrate this feast with new yeast.

Gospel Reading: *John 20:1-9*
Mary of Magdala finds that the stone
has been removed from Jesus' tomb.

Background on the Gospel Reading

Today we begin the Easter Season, our 50-day meditation on the mystery of Christ's Resurrection. Our Gospel today tells us about the disciples' discovery of the empty tomb. It concludes by telling us that they did not yet understand that Jesus had risen from the dead. Thus, the details provided are not necessarily meant to offer proof of the Resurrection. The details invite us to reflect upon a most amazing gift, that is faith in Jesus and his Resurrection.

Each of the four Gospels tells us that Jesus' empty tomb was first discovered by women. This is notable because in first-century Jewish society women could not serve as legal witnesses. In the case of John's Gospel, the only woman attending the tomb is Mary of Magdala. Unlike the Synoptic accounts, John's Gospel does not describe an appearance of angels at the tomb. Instead, Mary is simply said to have observed that the stone that had sealed the tomb had been moved, and she runs to alert Simon Peter and the beloved disciple. Her statement to them is telling. She assumes that Jesus' body has been removed, perhaps stolen. She does not consider that Jesus has been raised from the dead.

Simon Peter and the beloved disciple race to the tomb, presumably to verify Mary's report. The beloved disciple arrives first but does not enter the tomb until after Simon Peter. This detail paints a vivid picture, as does the detail provided about the burial cloths. Some scholars believe that the presence of the burial cloths in the tomb offers evidence to the listener that Jesus' body had not been stolen (it is understood that grave robbers would have taken the burial cloths together with the body).

The Gospel passage concludes, however, that even having seen the empty tomb and the burial cloths, the disciples do not yet understand about the Resurrection. In the passage that follows, Mary of Magdala meets Jesus but mistakes him for the gardener. In the weeks ahead, the Gospel readings from our liturgy will show us how the disciples came to believe in Jesus' Resurrection through his appearances to them. Our Easter faith is based on their witness to both the empty tomb and their continuing relationship with Jesus—in his appearances and in his gift of the Holy Spirit.

Easter Duty

The Easter duty is the obligation to receive Holy Communion. It is required by canon 920: "§1. After being initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, each of the faithful is obliged to receive Holy Communion at least once a year. §2. This precept must be fulfilled during the Easter season unless it is fulfilled for a just cause at another time during the year." The obligated to go to confession is related in the sense that, in order to receive Holy Communion, one might need to go to confession first in order to be in a state of grace.

The Easter duty is a minimum requirement in order to motivate people to receive the sacraments. Ideally, a Catholic receives Holy Communion at every Mass that he or she attends.

A Parent's Prayer

Lord, as I live this day, please grant me the ability to laugh at my children's antics, the time to share their moments of pride, the need to praise their separate strengths, the faith to trust their growing judgment, the patience to understand their changing moods, the virtue to forgive their disrespect, the openness to learn their ways and styles, the ears to hear what they are saying, the tenderness to understand their broken dreams, and the wisdom to accept that their lives, as my own, are built just one day at a time. Amen.
