EASTER JOURNEY THOUGHT

Dear Easter People, Christ is Risen! Alleluia! Alleluia! Happy Easter!

Our Holy Week and Easter celebrations were beautiful, powerful and prayerful! The Lenten journey leading to Holy Week gave all of us an opportunity to walk with the Lord Jesus to His Cross. And together we celebrated the victorious Cross of Easter — Resurrection and new life! Our Easter season continues, and this holy season reminds us we are an Easter people. We celebrated Easter Sunday last weekend, but our Easter season reminds us we are a Resurrection people year round. The Easter season helps put life into perspective despite the many stresses placed upon our shoulders daily. The spring season is also a wakeup call that nature shakes off its winter harshness and springs into life. How does this affect me?

We can spend all our time focusing on what we don't have in life. However, we rob ourselves of the vast wealth and riches we do possess as gifts from the Lord Jesus who promises us life so abundant that we call it eternal.

Do you see yourself as a wealthy person? How do you define being rich? Keep reading ...

One day I answered a knock at my door and found two children in ragged, outgrown coats, they huddled inside the storm door...

Am I rich? Mercy, no!" I looked at my shabby slipcovers, and rundown apartment, the girl carefully put her cup back in its saucer. "Your cups match your saucers."

Her voice was old, with a hunger that was not of the stomach. They left after that, holding their bundles of papers against the wind. They hadn't said thank you. They didn't need to. They had done more than that. Plain blue pottery cups and saucers. But they matched. I tasted the potatoes and stirred the gravy. "Well I thought, potatoes and brown gravy, a roof over our heads, my man with a good steady job, faith and love – these things matched, too."

I moved the chairs back from the fire and tidied the living room, the muddy prints of small sandals were still wet upon my rug. I let them be. I want them there in case I ever forget again how very rich I am.

Easter Duty

The Easter duty is the obligation to receive Holy Communion. It is required by canon 920: "§1. After being initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, each of the faithful is obliged to receive Holy Communion at least once a year. §2. This precept must be fulfilled during the Easter season unless it is fulfilled for a just cause at another time during the year." The obligated to go to confession is related in the sense that, in order to receive Holy Communion, one might need to go to confession first in order to be in a state of grace. The Easter duty is a minimum requirement in order to motivate people to receive the sacraments. Ideally, a Catholic receives Holy Communion at every Mass that he or she attends.

Divine Mercy Sunday April 27, 2025

First Reading: *Acts of the Apostles 5:12-16*Peter and the apostles perform many signs and wonders.

Responsorial Psalm: *Psalm 118:2-4,13-15,22-24*A song of praise to the Lord.

Second Reading: *Revelation 1:9-11a,12-13,17-19*John describes the instruction he received to write down his vision.

Gospel Reading: *John 20:19-31* Thomas believes because he sees Jesus.

Background on the Gospel Reading

Today's reading, from the Gospel of John, is proclaimed on the second Sunday of Easter in each of the three Sunday Lectionary cycles. This should alert us to the significance of the encounters with the resurrected Jesus described in this reading. This Gospel combines two scenes: Jesus' appearance to his disciples after his Resurrection and Jesus' dialogue with Thomas, the disciple who doubted.

Part of the mystery of Jesus? Resurrection is that he appeared to his disciples not as a spirit but in bodily form. We do not know exactly what this form was like. Earlier in John?s Gospel, when Mary of Magdala first encountered the risen Jesus, she did not recognize the figure standing before her until Jesus spoke her. In Luke?s Gospel, the disciples walking on the road to Emmaus did not recognize Jesus until he broke bread with them. We know from readings such as today's that in his resurrected body, Jesus was no longer bound by space; he appeared to the disciples in spite of the locked door. And yet, on this resurrected body, the disciples could still observe the marks of his Crucifixion.

In today's Gospel, Jesus greets his disciples with the gift of peace and the gift of the Holy Spirit. Jesus also commissions his disciples to continue the work that he has begun. As Jesus was sent by God, so too does Jesus send his disciples. This continuity with Jesus' own mission is an essential element of the Church. Jesus grants the means to accomplish this mission when he gives his disciples the gift of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit binds us together as a community of faith and strengthens us to bear witness to Jesus' Resurrection.

Jesus' words to his disciples also highlight the integral connection between the forgiveness of sins and the gift of the Holy Spirit. Forgiveness and reconciliation are gifts to us from Jesus. With the grace of the Holy Spirit, we can share these with others. This is another essential aspect of what it means to be Christ's Church. The Church continues Jesus? ministry of forgiveness and reconciliation.

Thomas, the disciple who doubts, represents the reality of the Church that comes after this first community of disciples. All but the first disciples of Jesus must believe without seeing. Like Thomas, we may doubt the news that Jesus, who was crucified and buried, appeared to his disciples. It is part of our human nature to seek hard evidence that the Jesus who appeared to the disciples after his death is, indeed, the same Jesus who was crucified. Thomas is given the opportunity to be our representative who obtains this evidence. He gives witness to us that the Jesus who was raised is the same Jesus who had died. Through the gift of the Holy Spirit, we are among those who are blessed for we have not seen and yet have believed.



The First Feast of Mercy



PILGRIMS OF HOPE TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

An ancient title for this Sunday is Dominica in Albis, or Sunday in White. During the Easter Vigil, the newly baptized are invested with a white garment, a sign that they have put on Christ. At one time, the garments were worn for a full week of celebration and reflection, and on this Sunday the newly baptized would appear in their robes again in their new place among the faithful for Eucharist.

In later centuries, the energy of new life at Easter was largely forgotten, and this Sunday was renamed Quasimodo Sunday, or Low Sunday. In recent years, with the recovery of the insight that Easter is the privileged time for celebrating and renewing baptism, there is nothing Low about this Sunday. At a weeks distance, the beauty and grace of our Easter celebration is sustained by joyful alleluias, the blessing and sprinkling of holy water, and the comfort of the Lords presence to us. 2nd SUNDAY OF EASTER DIVINE Mercy

In Revelation, John the Evangelist tells us what we can expect as followers of the risen Jesus: distress, endurance, and a kingdom. Although we are only eight days into our fifty-day Easter feasting, we cannot ignore the distress weighing down our daily lives. Jesus resurrection does not erase individual suffering, but his glorious triumph over death cultivates endurance in our hearts. We remember that Jesus did not spare himself, and we ask for the strength to endure as he did. Imitating Christ helps us grow as members of Gods royal family. As beloved citizens of the Kingdom of God, we recognize our kinship with all people. Peter demonstrates his care for others as he heals multitudes of broken, suffering people. In the Gospel, Thomas accepts his own spiritual healing when Jesus helps him to believe. In times of difficulty, survival, and glory, we borrow Thomas declaration of faith: My Lord and my God!

PEACE BE WITH YOU

Our Gospel reading today depicts the disciples in a terrifying moment. They have locked their doors, huddling together in safety at a time when the Lord has transformed the entire course of human events. Jesus has risen from the dead. He has destroyed death and unlocked eternal life. But who can fully grasp all of this? Not even Thomas, one of the twelve devoted companions of Jesus, understands what has happened. Those of us who have never faced maltreatment for our faith can only imagine the disciples panic. Unimpeded by their bolted doors, Jesus visits his frightened friends.

His appearance must have been shocking, since he says to them Peace be with you not once, but twice. If the disciples hoped Jesus would come back to them, they might have wished he would appear as a victorious leader or glorious king. Instead, he comes as they have known him and most need him: as a companion, and he brings with him the eternal peace of God. They might have wanted a bodyguard; instead he gives them peace.

AT LEAST A SHADOW

God knows what we need far better than we ourselves know. Jesus offers peace to the disciples--twice. He knows they must soon leave the security of locked doors. Shortly he will fill them with the gift of the Holy Spirit and rely on them to lead the community--and the world--into a new baptism, a new communion. At that moment in the locked room, the disciples see only threats to their lives. Jesus sees their fearful hearts and gives them what they need: peace. We see how Peter is transformed. Instead of hiding in shadows, he becomes a source of healing and light; his very shadow draws people into the mystery of Gods power. Jesus gift of peace makes a real difference in our lives. 


