

Corpus Christi June 22, 2025

First Reading: *Genesis 14:18-20* Melchizedek, king of Salem, blessed Abram.

Responsorial Psalm: *Psalm 110:1-4* You are a priest forever, in the line of Melchizedek.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 11:23-26

As often as you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the death of the Lord until he comes.

Gospel Reading: *Luke* 9:11b-17 They all ate and were satisfied.

Background on the Gospel Reading

Today, the second Sunday after Pentecost, we celebrate a second solemnity, which marks our return to Ordinary Time. Today is the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. At one time, this day was called *Corpus Christi*, Latin for "the Body of Christ." In the most recent revision of the liturgy, the name for this day is expanded to be a more complete reflection of our Eucharistic theology.

The feeding of the 5,000 is the only one of Jesus' miracles to appear in all four Gospels. Luke places it between Herod's question, "Who is this about whom I hear such things?" and Peter's response to Jesus' question about who he thought Jesus was: "You are the Messiah of God." In Luke the feeding is not the result of Jesus' compassion for the crowd but is instigated by the disciples. They wanted Jesus to send the crowd away to town. Instead Jesus tells the disciples to give them some food on their own.

The passage is meant to remind us of two feedings in the Old Testament: the feeding of the Israelites in the desert and Elisha's feeding of 100 people with 20 loaves in 2 Kings 4:42-44. It is also connected to the institution of the Eucharist. As in the Last Supper accounts in Matthew, Mark, and Luke and in Paul's account in 1 Corinthians 11:23-24, Jesus takes bread, looks up to heaven, blesses the bread, breaks it, and then gives it to the disciples. In using this exact language, Luke is reminding his readers that in this miracle Jesus is doing more than feeding hungry people as God did for the Israelites and the prophet Elisha did as well. The bread he gives is his body, which he will continue to give as often as the community breaks bread in remembrance of him in the Eucharist.

The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Today we hear how Abram encounters Melchizedek, king of Salem . . . and a priest of God Most High (Genesis 14:18). Melchizedek appears nowhere else in scripture, but is nonetheless significant. Psalm 110 declares of the great King David, You are a priest forever, in the line of Melchizedek, a description later given (in the letter to the Hebrews) to Christ as High Priest. Early Christians saw in Melchizedek's bread and wine the bread and wine of the Eucharist; Paul's account of the Last Supper (in today's second reading) is the oldest one in scripture. In the Gospel, Luke describes Jesus providing bread for a crowd in words similar to Paul's, words still used by the Church: Jesus takes bread, gives thanks, breaks it. Together, these three readings reveal how Christian priesthood, Christ's Real Presence, and the call to serve those in need are all found in the gift of the Eucharist.

DO THIS IN REMEMBRANCE OF ME

We are familiar with the instructions that Jesus gives his disciples at the Last Supper. But what exactly is it that we are to do in remembrance of Jesus? One answer focuses on the institution narrative found in the Eucharistic Prayers: we are to consecrate the bread and wine, changing them, by the power of the Holy Spirit, into the Body and Blood of Christ. This is true; but lets' think about what it takes to actually do this, as the Church has done for almost two thousand years: * We are to remember Jesus--to remember Jesus, the Word of God in human form. To do this, we need that other word of God, given in a different form: the words of the scriptures. * We need to assemble to do this. The Last Supper is a communal meal with Jesus. In his letter to the Corinthians, Paul describes actions done within a group, actions that began with that communal meal with Jesus. We gather as today's disciples and continue that group activity in our assemblies.* We need to find a way to assemble with some degree of order. We need leaders. We need preachers to preach the Word, we need presiders' to repeat the actions of Jesus, persons who are ordered--ordained-- for preaching and for the consecration of the bread and wine.

CHURCH, EUCHARIST, AND THOSE IN NEED

There is a saying: The Church makes the Eucharist, and the Eucharist makes the Church. In the Eucharistic celebration, we find Christ truly present in the consecrated bread and wine. We also find him in the assembly, the scriptures, and the preacher-preside--everything we do to do this, and in doing this, we become the Body of Christ. Our Eucharistic remembrance of Jesus is a living sacramental memory that transforms us, too. We receive Communion to live in communion with Christ and one another, to become the real presence of Christ in the world. We do what the disciples did: we feed those in need with the love and compassion with which Christ feeds us. copyright (c) J. s. Paluch Co.,

PILGRIMS OF HOPE: TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

We owe today's beautiful feast to a valiant woman who suffered a great deal to establish a feast out of her love for the Eucharist. Juliana was a nun in Belgium in the thirteenth century. She served in a hospital for lepers. She became convinced through her prayer that the liturgical year was incomplete because it had no feast for the Eucharist. Her efforts were not welcome, and a supervising priest sought to punish her for promoting a feast that nobody wanted. He even had her accused of financial mismanagement and banished her from her convent.

Shortly after she was exiled, the bishop approved the feast. It quickly spread through Europe. In those days, people very seldom received Holy Communion, and so the processions through the streets with the Eucharistic bread not only led to an awareness of Christ's hunger to be with us, but prepared the way for a deeper desire to receive Christ's Body and Blood in more frequent Communion. The feast grew rapidly, but Juliana disappeared into poverty and a hidden life. She ended her days as an anchoress, a woman living in seclusion in a room attached to a parish church. Imagine her delight at seeing us gathered at the table of the Lord on this day, aware of Christ's presence in our midst, sharing fully in Christ's Body and Blood. "Beware of the Latest Al Scams" Constance + Thomas Dowd


Dear Editor: As senior citizens with grandchildren, we are urging all grandparents to be aware of the latest scam criminals have cooked up to rob them of thousands or more dollars.

Through the use of a high-tech scam that uses artificial intelligence (AI) to find their grandchildren's voices on TikTok and then use voice-cloning software to make panicked calls pretending to be that grandchild, saying that they have been arrested or hurt and urgently need bail money or medical funds.

Suffolk County Police Commissioner Kevin Catatina confirmed that his department has been seeing a growing number of these cases and urges other counties to be alert in their areas.

He also advises families to establish a "safe word" or code in case of emergencies to use to confirm the identity of the person who is calling.

We urge all readers to pass this information on to all their friends and family members.





