My Side of the Altar

Dear faithful people of God, This week we are in the midst of our annual celebration of Independence. Happy July 4th!

The Greatness of a Nation

In June of 1776 Thomas Jefferson, seated in the second-floor parlor of a bricklayer's house in Philadelphia, brilliantly composed the first drafts of the Declaration of Independence. After some revision, the bulk of the document was approved by Congress on 4 July 1776. While the Declaration would soon become one of the world's most significant documents, its second sentence is perhaps most famous: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men [sic] are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

They speak not only of the 'American dream' particularly, but echo the goals of human experience generally. With those words we are reminded of the specific purpose for which we are created and the particular end toward which we are directed; on hearing them, we are moved to realize that to be human, bestowed as we are with the gift of life and dignity, created in God's image and likeness, is truly spectacular.

One of the things for me that is distinctive about the Fourth of July is that the day celebrates an idea as much as an event, an experiment that is unique in the history of nations. The United States of America represents a society built on the proposition that each individual, regardless of race, religion or national origin enjoys inviolable human dignity.

I tend to see the Fourth of July for Americans as less a time of looking back than a time of looking forward, less a time for congratulations on the exceptionalism of the United States, more a time for challenge on the state of the 'American dream'. The rhetoric of Fourth of July speeches invariably includes references to ideals still to be fulfilled. Underlying such rhetoric is the assumption that the United States of America continues to be a work in progress. The Declaration of Independence remains a promise still to be fulfilled.

In a historic address to a joint session of Congress on 24 September 2015, Pope Francis began by comparing the fundamental responsibilities of America's political leaders to the role of Moses in the Bible, emphasizing that the first call of public service is "to protect by means of the law the image and likeness fashioned by God on every human face." Recalling the martyrdom of Abraham Lincoln, Pope Francis pointed to the foundational role freedom plays in U.S. society and politics and said that "building a future of freedom requires love of the common good and cooperation in a spirit of solidarity." Citing the figure of Dorothy Day and her thirst for justice in the world, the Pope encouraged that the economic genius of the U.S. be complemented by an enduring recognition that all economies must serve justice comprehensively, with special care for the poor. Finally, invoking the legacy of Martin Luther King Jr., Pope Francis urged the nation's political leaders to deepen America's heritage as a land of dreams: "Dream~ which lead to action, to participation, to commitment. Dreams which awaken what is deepest and truest in the life of a people."

On this Independence Day we reflect on what it means to seek life, liberty and happiness. In desiring these blessings for ourselves and for those we love, we acknowledge where they are to be found most abundantly. In fact, it is not so much where they are found, but in Whom they are found: "I am the way and the truth and the life" (In. 14:6). May God continue to bless us with a true understanding of independence and of what it means to be truly free.

May God continue to call us to those noble virtues that make this great country what it is. May God bless our nation with peace. And may God bless America.

PILGRIMS OF HOPE: TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Processions are life's journey distilled. We move with companions, aware that Christ accompanies us, as we move to the altar for Communion or to the font for baptism, or carry a loved one to a place of rest. In Europe, the season of pilgrimage is beginning now, and tens of thousands of people are moving by foot on well-worn paths. Some take as long as six weeks to walk the last few hundred miles of the medieval pilgrimage route to the Shrine of St. James the Apostle in Compostella, in northern Spain.

Those who make the journey by foot, hiking, or by bicycle, have a kind of passport stamped at villages and monasteries on the road. When they present this document at the cathedral, they are given the emblem of a pilgrim, the scallop shell of St. James. High over their heads at Mass, a huge botafumero twirls clouds of sweet incense through the cathedral. Cynics say it is to mask the odor of smelly feet. The pilgrims know better. Seeing through the clouds the happy faces of those they met along the road, they recognize a foretaste of the welcome into heaven, and the joy of meeting loved ones in the Kingdom of God. 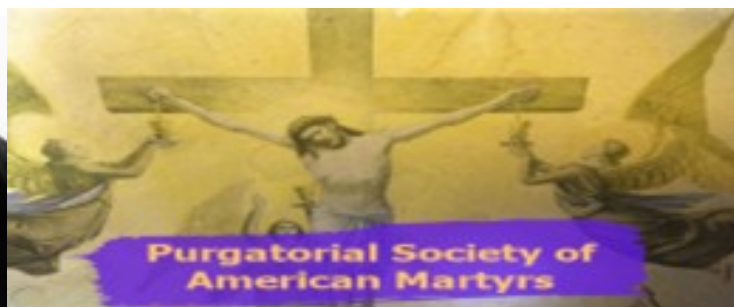
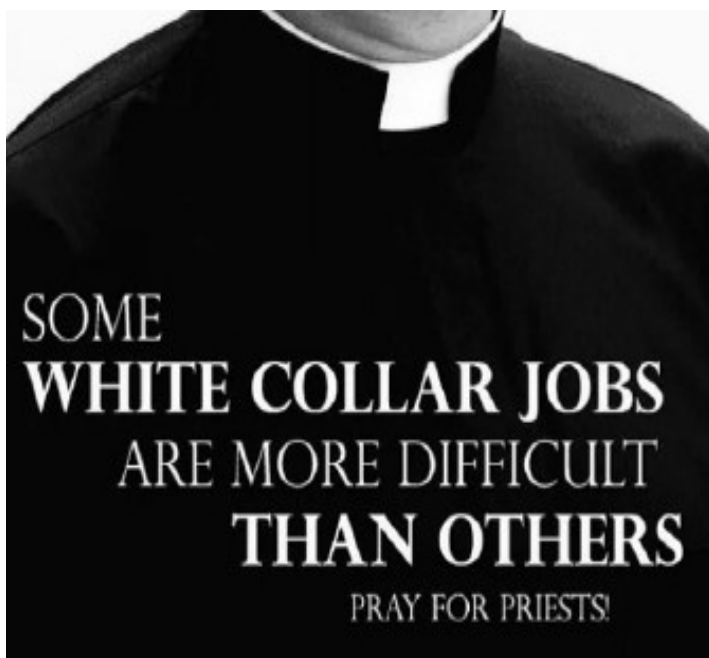

RADICAL TRANSFORMATION

On this Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, the readings describe anything but an ordinary time. They are disturbing and they leave us disturbed. The Old Testament reading recounts a young man's radical break with the past to follow a new path. The Gospel describes how life as we know it is abruptly changed if we follow the call of Christ.

The psalm and Paul assure us that such life-altering change is possible only because of the power of God's love. We are presented with a stark choice. To love as God loves, we must leave our old lives behind. We must leave behind not just the bad, the selfish, and the evil but the ordinary, our daily work, and the important, our families, our lives. Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

In today's first reading, God tells the prophet Elijah to prepare Elisha to succeed him. Succeeding Elijah will be no easy task; he has spent his life facing threats from the kings he has confronted about their infidelity to the God of Israel.

The psalm illustrates the emotional and spiritual distress that the prophets' steadfast faithfulness to God brought them. Paul's description of the Christians' freedom from the law as opposed to the desire of the flesh puts this struggle at the very heart of Christian identity. The reading from Luke's Gospel recounts Jesus' decision to journey toward Jerusalem, where he knows he will meet his earthly fate. Following Jesus--like succeeding Elijah as prophet--will now become more difficult. Unlike his calls to the first disciples, Jesus encounters those who are not ready or are not strong enough to journey with him.

WE ARE CALLED

How do we know when we are being called by God? Sometimes a call is very clear: this is what we need to do. Other times a call may be less obvious, and it may take more time to discern such a call. What is certain is that each of us will be called, at different times and in different ways, according to our personal strengths and weaknesses.

While the prophets Isaiah and Jeremiah were called in dramatic visions, Elisha's call came with a simple but singular event: the prophet Elijah approached him as he was plowing and threw his cloak over him (1 Kings 19:19). Elisha immediately understood--this was a sign he was to follow Elijah and inherit his mantle as prophet.

We are familiar with how, at the beginning of his ministry, Jesus called the fishermen to follow him and how they dropped everything to do so. The events in today's Gospel happen much later, after Jesus has determined he is to go to Jerusalem, and--Luke informs the reader--there are already forebodings about his fate. Jesus is well enough known that some people approach him and want to go with him, but they are met with warnings about the difficulties that lie ahead. Others summoned by Jesus want to say good-bye to their families first; Jesus shrugs them off and continues on without them. The urgency of the task ahead demands immediate and total dedication.

HOW CAN YOU TELL?

One of the ways the Spirit is constantly breathing new life into the Church is in the practice of spiritual direction. In addition to our personal prayer, spiritual directors can provide support for discerning the promptings of the Spirit in our lives. Benedictines, Dominicans, and Jesuits are known for their work in spiritual direction and in training others as directors. By now the Church is blessed with any number of priests, sisters, and lay people who help others discern and respond with the strength and dedication required to follow Jesus, wherever the journey may take us.
