



#### **Eucharistic Reverence**

#### Dear Parishioners.

As we continue our reflection on the great mystery of the Eucharist, I would like to share with you two important elements of our Catholic practice: the ringing of the bells during the Eucharistic Prayer and the way the Church envisions us to receive Holy Communion. Both of these, though sometimes overlooked, are powerful reminders of the sacredness of what takes place at every Mass.

#### The Ringing of the Bells

During the Eucharistic Prayer, you may notice the altar server ringing the bells at certain moments: usually at the <u>epiclesis</u> (when the priest extends his hands, invoking the Holy Spirit), <u>at the elevation of the Host, and at the elevation of the Chalice.</u>

Why do we do this? The bells serve as a kind of "sacred alarm clock": they draw our attention to the most important moment of the Mass, when the bread and wine are changed into the Body and Blood of Christ. The sound cuts through distraction, stirring our hearts to reverence and adoration. As St. John Vianney once said, "If we really understood the Mass, we would die of joy." The bells remind us that something heavenly is happening before our eyes.

#### How the Church Envisions Us to Receive Communion

Because Christ Himself is truly present in the Eucharist, the way we receive Him matters. The Church invites us to prepare our hearts through prayer, confession (if needed), and fasting for at least one hour before Holy Communion. We should approach the altar with reverence, bowing or genuflecting as a sign of adoration.

Communion may be received either on the tongue or in the hand, according to the norms of the Church. If received in the hand, the Church asks that we place one hand over the other to form a throne, responding "Amen" with faith, and consuming the Host immediately in the presence of the minister. If received on the tongue, we open our mouth and allow the minister to place the Sacred Host with care. In either case, what matters most is that our external actions reflect our interior belief: this is truly Jesus, my Lord and my God.


Both the bells and the reverent reception of Communion point us to the same truth: the Eucharist is not ordinary bread and wine, but the very presence of Christ. These signs and gestures help us to worship with our whole selves mind, body, and spirit.

I encourage you this week to pay close attention to the bells when you hear them. Let them be a moment to renew your adoration of Jesus present on the altar. And as you come forward for Communion, let your "Amen" be a conscious act of faith and love.

May our reverence and devotion always reflect the greatness of the gift we receive.

#### **Pennies from Heaven**



Several years ago, a friend of mine and her husband were invited to spend the weekend at the husband's employer's home. My friend, Arlene, was nervous about the weekend. The boss was very wealthy, with a fine home on the waterway, and cars costing more than her house. The first day and evening went well, and Arlene was delighted to have this rare glimpse into how the very wealthy live.

The husband's employer was quite generous as a host and took them to the finest restaurants. Arlene knew she would never have the opportunity to indulge in this kind of extravagance again so was enjoying herself immensely. As the three of them were about to enter an exclusive restaurant that evening, the boss was walking slightly ahead of Arlene and her husband. He stopped suddenly, looking down at the pavement for a long, silent moment.

Arlene wondered if she was supposed to pass him. There was nothing on the ground except a single darkened penny that someone had dropped and a few cigarette butts. Still silent, the man reached down and picked up the penny.

He held it up and smiled, then put it into his pocket as if he had found a great treasure. How absurd! What need this man have for a single penny? Why would he even take the time to stop and pick it up?


Throughout the dinner, the entire scene nagged at her. Finally, she could stand it no longer. She casually mentioned that her daughter once had a coin collection and asked if the penny he had found had been of some value. A smile crept across the man's face as he reached into his pocket for the penny and held it out for her to see. She had seen many pennies before! What was the point of this? "Look at it," he said. "Read what it says." She read the words "United States of America." "No, not that; read further." "One cent?" "No, keep reading." "In God We Trust?" "Yes." "

And if I trust God, the name of God is holy even on a coin. Whenever I find a coin, I see that inscription. It is written on every single U.S. coin, but we never seem to notice it! God drops a message right in front of me telling me to trust Him. Who am I to pass it by? When I see a coin, I pray. I stop to see if my trust is in God at that moment. I pick the coin up as a response to God; that I do trust in Him. For a short time, at least, I cherish it as if it were gold. I think it is God's way of starting a conversation with me. Lucky for me, God is patient and pennies are plentiful."

When I was out shopping today, I found a penny on the sidewalk. I stopped and picked it up and realized that I had been worrying and fretting in my mind about things I cannot change. I read the words "In God We Trust" and had to laugh.

Yes, God, I get the message. It seems that I have been finding an inordinate number of pennies in the last few months, but then, pennies are plentiful! And God is patient...

#### Twenty-Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time Sunday, October 12, 2025

First Reading: 2 Kings 5:14-17
Naaman is cleansed of his leprosy and chooses to serve the God of Israel.

Gospel Reading: Luke 17:11-19

Jesus heals 10 lepers, and one, the Samaritan, returns to give thanks.

Background on the Gospel Reading

Today we hear about how Jesus, continuing on his journey to Jerusalem, heals 10 lepers. This story is a lesson about faith and reminds us that faith is sometimes found in unlikely places. Ten people afflicted with leprosy cry out to Jesus. Struck with pity, Jesus heals all 10. However, only one is described as glorifying God and returning to thank Jesus. The one who returns is a Samaritan, a foreigner. In the Jewish circles in which Jesus lived, Samaritans were looked down upon because of the differences between the two communities in their observance of Judaism. It is significant, therefore, that Jesus commends the Samaritan for his faith, which has been his salvation. Throughout Luke's Gospel, faith is found in surprising places.

Another lesson for us in this Gospel has to do with salvation. All 10 of the lepers were given the gift of healing, but in his gratitude to God for this gift, the Samaritan found salvation. Our salvation is found in recognizing the gifts we have been given and knowing to whom we must offer our thanks.





#### Miracles of Faith

Besides being cured, what do Nathan (first reading) and the leper who thanked Jesus (Gospel) have in common? Both of them began to believe. Nathan proclaims Israel's God to be the only God; he even wants to worship the LORD in his own country. The only leper who returned to thank Jesus was "glorifying God in a loud voice" (Luke 17:15). It makes me wonder, what miracles do we see that help us grow in faith?

For an answer, we can look at a second thing they had in common: they both asked for help. Sometimes we get caught up in self-sufficiency mode, thinking we have to handle all our problems by ourselves. We may miss out on good solutions by not asking for help. Help often comes from someone who shows us a way through our problems, without solving them for us. Perhaps if we talk about the problem with another person, the solution will become obvious to us.

If you think asking for help is a sign of weakness, you may be missing a chance for God to act through one of your friends and give you support.

And, of course, you can ask God for help in prayer, giving God the chance to speak to your heart with the answer or the encouragement you need.

Miracles don't just happen to other people. We may have friends who help us in times of need or inspire us with their faith, but we have to decide to make a leap of faith ourselves. The third thing that Nathan and the leper did in common was express their faith. You can spend your whole life thinking that you are a Christian, but if you never express that faith, it will be no more than a theory. Scientists work with theories all the time, but until they write out the math or do the experiments, the theory is never proven. St. Paul in the second reading, for example, was suffering in prison, but he didn't mind because his suffering demonstrated the importance of Jesus' message to him. So he wrote from prison in the hope that other Christians would be encouraged in their faith. Perhaps you know of someone who inspired you with their faithfulness and dedication. Having a friend who helps us grow in faith can be a very nice miracle indeed. Copyright (c) J. S. Paluch Co.

#### **HEALING AND SALVATION**

The readings today speak of healing and salvation. In Second Kings, Naaman, a commander of the army of the king of Syria, develops leprosy. He goes to a stranger, a prophet from Israel, when no one else can cure his disease. Much to his surprise, after a simple bath in the river, he is cured. In Lukes Gospel, Jesus cures ten lepers and sends them to the priest. Only one, a Samaritan, returns to thank Jesus for his cure and only he hears the words, Your faith has saved you. The psalm and Timothy remind us that salvation involves justice, kindness, and faithfulness and forever links us with Jesus. In a world as broken as ours, both healing and salvation are necessary. #### Twenty-Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Naaman and the leper who returned to Jesus saw Gods hand in their healing. Only through Gods intervention could they have been cured. Through this recognition of Gods presence and action in their lives, they grew in faith. For what are you grateful? Pause for a moment to reflect on all of the blessings in your life. God is the source of these many blessings--life, love, gifts, and so much more. Of all the gifts for which we must be grateful, none is as great, or as astounding, as the gift of salvation offered to us through Jesus Christ. Let this sink in, not only in your mind but in your heart. Like Naaman and the leper who returned, allow yourself to be touched by the immense love of God for you.

#### **ALL GOOD GIFTS**

In the past few years, many have adopted the practice of keeping a gratitude journal. Sometimes, the journal-keeper uses a book that includes prompts that guide the users reflection. Others simply keep a list or write brief reflections at the end of their day or week, recognizing the many things for which they are grateful. The action of seeking out the blessings of life creates a habit of attentiveness. We see what we seek. When we look for things for which to be grateful, we realize that we are surrounded by blessings. This is not only a good practice for our emotional health and well-being. Recognizing our blessings and growing in gratitude for them is a deeply spiritual practice, through which we become attentive to Gods presence and action in our lives. Gratitude can truly be a life-changer for us. As we grow in gratitude, we view the world through the perspective of abundance rather than scarcity. Without the habit of gratitude, we take things for granted. We get caught in an endless cycle of wanting more, rather than seeing all that we have.

#### ONE OR ONE OF THE NINE

Naaman and the leper also grasped that their grateful faith should lead them to respond in praise and to make a change in their life. Naaman vowed to put his faith in the Lord; the leper returned, glorifying God and thanking Jesus. Not all responded in thankful praise, however. The leper who returned was one of ten. The other nine went about their merry way, happy to be healed, but failing to acknowledge or express their gratitude to the Healer. Are you one, like Naaman and the leper who returned to Jesus, whose thankfulness leads you to faith and to faith-filled living? Or are you one of the nine, who takes for granted the gifts and blessings that surround you? For what are you grateful? What is your faithful and faith-filled response? Copyright (c) J. S. #### PILGRIMS OF HOPE: TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Christian liturgy has always contained an opportunity to make a choice for sharing. From the beginning, Christians pooled their resources, especially for the care of widows and orphans, at the weekly Eucharist. Over the years, the collection became detached from the liturgy and baskets or plates would be passed through the

community while the Mass was going on at the altar, or contributions would be collected at the doors. In Milans Ambrosian Rite, these gifts have always been brought to the altar by lay people in procession. In German countries, the ancient custom was for the entire assembly to process with their gifts--first the men, then the women, then the priests and deacons--to offer their gifts at the altar. The old ceremony of canonization included a curious vestige of this procession: people would present the pope with two loaves of bread, two barrels of wine and water, five candles, and three cages containing pigeons or turtledoves! --Copyright (c) J. 




