

My Side of the Altar

Dear People of God,

This weekend, we celebrate the Second Sunday of Advent. What does this mean in relation to our journey of faith as individuals and members of a Faith Community? The entire thrust of Jesus' story is one of Servant— Jesus who came to serve and invites us to do the same for all our sisters and brothers.

Serving the Lord Jesus happens in many ways that we never expected.

The Servant's Reward

One day, when you are in heaven,
someone will come up to you and thank you for
the way you touched their life with hope and encouragement.
The person's words will take you by surprise.
Soon, another person will seek you out, and then another,
and another. As you listen to each one's story,
you will begin to discover all the ways that God
used your life when you were completely unaware of it.
You will find that it was not only through the big things you did,
but also, through the small things – through a spoken word that was not planned,
a spontaneous act of kindness, a loving attitude, or a simple prayer of concern.
To your joy, you will discover that in all these ways and more,
God used you to deposit an eternal measure of His love into many needy hearts. — Roy Lessin

We tend to dismiss kind acts, and sometimes, we forget that our acts of kindness may have a profound effect on someone who needs a kind word or a smile. Jesus touched many lives on many different levels. And remember...

*Jesus had no servants, yet they called Him Master.
Had no degree, yet they called Him Teacher.
Had no medicines, yet they called Him Healer.
Had no army, yet kings feared Him.
He won no military battles, yet He conquered the world.
He committed no crime, yet they crucified Him.
He was buried in a tomb, yet He lives today.
Feel honored to serve such a Leader who loves us.*

Yet, life can hurt us, and many times, we feel like throwing in the towel and not serving or showing the face of Christ to another.

May the following story focus our living out Gospel lives rooted in Jesus the Servant.

Sand & Stone

This is a story about two friends walking through the desert. At some point in the journey, they argued, and one friend slapped the other in the face. The one who got slapped was hurt, but without saying anything, he wrote in the SAND: 'Today my best friend slapped me in the face.'

They kept walking until they found an oasis, where they decided to take a bath. The one who had been slapped got stuck in the mire and started drowning, but his friend saved him. After he recovered from the near drowning, he wrote on a STONE: 'Today my best friend saved my life.'

The friend, who had slapped and saved his best friend, asked him, "After I hurt you, you wrote in the sand, and now, you write on a stone. Why?" The other friend replied, "When someone hurts us, we should write it down in sand, where the winds of forgiveness can erase it, but when someone does something good for us, we must engrave it in stone where no wind can ever erase it."

May we learn to write our hurts in the sand and to carve our blessings in stone.

THE FOUR WEEKS OF ADVENT

During the first two weeks of Advent we light the first two purple candles.

The Third Sunday of Advent is called Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday. On this day we celebrate we that our waiting for the birth of Jesus on Christmas day is almost over. Rose is a liturgical color that is used to signify joy, so we light the single pink candle on the third Sunday of Advent.


Then on the fourth Sunday of Advent, the final purple candle is lit to mark the final week of prayer and penance as we wait expectantly for the soon-coming birth of the King of Kings. Traditionally, each of the four Advent candles have a deeper meaning which you can read more about in many Advent prayer books that are available.

The 1st Sunday of Advent symbolizes Hope with the “Prophet’s Candle” reminding us that Jesus is coming.

The 2nd Sunday of Advent symbolizes Faith with the “Bethlehem Candle” reminding us of Mary and Joseph’s journey to Bethlehem.

The 3rd Sunday of Advent symbolizes Joy with the “Shepherd’s Candle” reminding us of the Joy the world experienced at the coming birth of Jesus.

The 4th Sunday of Advent symbolizes Peace with the “Angel’s Candle” reminding us of the message of the angels: “Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men.”



Second Sunday of Advent Sunday, December 7, 2025

First Reading *Isaiah 11:1-10*

A descendent of Jesse will usher in a time of peace.

Responsorial Psalm *Psalm 72:1-2,7-8,12-13,17*

The Messiah will bring justice and peace to the nations.

Second Reading: *Romans 15:4-9*

Both Jews and Gentiles glorify God for the salvation found in Christ Jesus.

Gospel Reading: *Matthew 3:1-12*

John the Baptist appears in Judea preaching a message of repentance.

Background on the Gospel Reading

In this week's Gospel Reading and next week's, our Advent preparation for Christmas invites us to consider John the Baptist and his relationship to Jesus. In this week's Gospel, Matthew describes the work and preaching of John the Baptist.

John the Baptist appears in the tradition of the great prophets of Israel, preaching repentance and reform to the people of Israel. In fact, the description of John found in this reading is reminiscent of the description of the prophet Elijah (2 Kings 1:8). In this reading, John directs a particularly pointed call to repentance to the Pharisees and Sadducees, parties within the Jewish community of the first century.

John marks the conversion of those who seek him out with a baptism of repentance. Other groups in this period are thought to have practiced ritual washings for similar purposes, and John's baptism may have been related to the practices of the Essenes, a Jewish sect of the first century. John's baptism can be understood as an anticipation of Christian baptism. In this passage, John himself alludes to the difference between his baptism and the one yet to come: “I am baptizing you with water, for repentance . . . He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire.” (Matt.3:11).

In this reading, John makes very clear that his relationship to the Messiah yet to come (Jesus) is one of service and subservience: “. . . the one who is coming after me is mightier than I. I am not worthy to carry his sandals” (Matthew 3:11). In the context of Matthew's Gospel, today's passage is followed by Jesus' baptism by John, an event that is attested to in all four of the Gospels and appears to have been the start of Jesus' public ministry.

John's preaching of the coming of the Lord is a key theme of the Advent season. As John's message prepared the way for Jesus in the first century, we, too, are called to prepare ourselves for Jesus' coming. We respond to John's message by our repentance and reform of our lives. We are also called to be prophets of Christ, who announce by our lives, as John did, the coming of the Lord.





Smitty: IF YOU DECIDE TO KICK away the fallen ice cube as opposed to picking it up, don't worry. It's water under the fridge.


Floater: My bank account looks like everybody is getting a text message for Christmas. And that's only if my phone is still on.

Smitty: I bought a dog named "Bob Barker" because, well, to be perfectly honest... ..the Price was Right.




