

A Letter from the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

As it was announced last weekend, Deacon Stanley Galazin will be retiring from active ministry at American Martyrs, following his short period of service at Holy Family. This transition is in keeping with diocesan policy for both priests and deacons.

This retirement does not remove Deacon Stan's diaconal identity or ordination. The diaconate is a lifelong vocation. What does change is his official assignment and level of responsibility in active ministry.

I want to share, retirement in the Church is not a sign of weakness. Rather, it is an act of fidelity to the promise Deacon Stan made to the diocesan bishop on the day of his ordination. It reflects honest discernment, a faithful response to the guidance of the Church and I would even say it is a heroic step, because it's not easy to do when you love something so much.

In the name of this partnership, we pray for Deacon Stan and we thank him for being the incredible example that he is and continues to be for all of us.

We also thank Mary, his wife. She has shared him with this parish over many years, allowing him to be so generous with his time and service. We thank Mary sincerely for your generous gift.

Here are some questions that I have been asked:

Is Deacon Stan leaving the parish? No. Retirement does not mean leaving the parish community. It simply means a change in the way he serves and the pace at which he does so.

Why does the Church ask deacons to retire? The Church recognizes that as people age, responsibilities, health, and family needs change. Retirement allows clergy to serve the Church faithfully while also honoring personal and family obligations. This follows diocesan policy for both priests and deacons.

How can we thank Deacon Stan and Mary? Please keep them in your prayers. The parish will also celebrate Deacon Stan's ministry with a retirement Mass and reception, with details to be announced.

Will we still see Deacon Stan on the Altar? Yes, he will continue to serve when he is able to. He will not be assigned Masses. He will have the freedom to come and go as he wishes and He will continue to assist Fr. Peter with his homilies and at the Altar. We will also at times, see him sitting and praying with his wife and family in the pews as well.

Retirement is not a punishment This is an act of faithful discernment, humility, and obedience to the promises made at ordination.

My Side of the Altar

Dear People of God,

In January 2014, Columbia magazine ran a marvelous article, "The Gospel of Life According to Pope Francis." This article traces Pope Francis' key pro-life statements, starting when he became Cardinal Bergoglio and including recent comments since his Papacy began in March 2013. During his 15 years as Archbishop of Buenos Aires to the present time, Pope Francis has always defended the dignity of human life from the moment of conception to natural death. Pope Francis has consistently had primary concern for the most vulnerable and defenseless human beings, including children (born and unborn), the disabled, and the elderly. We have seen this lived out on live television — inviting children into the sanctuary and kissing the elderly and sick.

Public Responsibility

'I want to focus in particular on two stages of life that I consider essential for the growth in peace of different generations: childhood and old age. They are the two extremes of life, and they are the most vulnerable and the most forgotten. A society that abandons its children and eliminates its elderly is mortgaging its future.' From "The Family in the Light of the Aparecida" Document (Familia et Vita, 2008)

On Abortion

"The moral problem with abortion is of a pre-religious nature because the genetic code of the person is present at the moment of conception. This means that a human being already exists. I separate the issue of abortion from any religious concept. It is a scientific problem. To not allow further progress in the development of a being that already has the entire genetic code of a human being is not ethical. The right to life is the first human right. Abortion means killing someone who cannot defend himself." *Book of conversations between Cardinal Bergoglio and Rabbi Abraham Skorka. "Sobre el Cielo y la Tierra" (On Heaven and Earth, 2010)*

Saying "Yes" to Life "

All too often, as we know from experience, people do not choose life, they do not accept the 'Gospel of Life' but let themselves be led by ideologies and ways of thinking that block life, that do not respect life, because they are dictated by selfishness, self-interest, profit, power and pleasure, and not by love, by concern for the good of others. It is the eternal dream of wanting to build the city of man without God, without God's life and love -- a new tower of Babel.... Dear brothers and sisters, let us look to God as the God of Life, let us look to his law, to the Gospel message as the way to freedom and life.... Let us say "Yes" to life and not death. Let us say "Yes" to freedom and not enslavement to the many idols of our time. In a word, let us say "Yes to the God who is love, life, and freedom, and who never disappoints... Let us ask Mary, Mother of Life, to help us receive and bear constant witness to the 'Gospel of Life.'" *Homily for "Evangelium Vitae" Day, June 16, 2013*

And finally...

"Be witness and diffusers of the "culture of life." Your being Catholic entails a greater responsibility: first of all to yourselves, through a commitment consistent with your Christian vocation; and then to contemporary culture, by contributing to recognizing the transcendent dimensions of human life, the imprint of God's creative work, from the first moment of its conception. This is a task of the new evangelization that often requires going against the tide and paying for it personally. The Lord is also counting on you to spread the 'Gospel of Life.'"

Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Martin Luther King, Jr. was a social activist and Baptist minister who played a key role in the American civil rights movement from the mid-1950s until his assassination in 1968. King sought equality and human rights for African Americans, the economically disadvantaged and all victims of injustice through peaceful protest. He was the driving force behind watershed events such as the Montgomery Bus Boycott and the 1963 March on Washington, which helped bring about such landmark legislation as the Civil Rights Act and the Voting Rights Act. King was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 and is remembered each year on Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, a U.S. federal holiday.

First Reading: *Isaiah 49:3,5-6*

God's servant, Israel, will be made a light to the nations.

Responsorial Psalm: *Psalm 40:2,4,7-10*

God desires obedience.

Second Reading: *1 Corinthians 1:1-3*

Paul greets the Church in Corinth.

Gospel Reading: *John 1:29-34*

John testifies that Jesus is the Lamb of God, God's own Son.

Background on the Gospel Reading

This Sunday we break from our reading of Matthew's Gospel (the primary Gospel for our current liturgical cycle, Cycle A) to read from John's Gospel. We heard Matthew's account of Jesus' baptism last Sunday, on the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. Today, we hear John the Baptist's testimony about Jesus as found in John's Gospel. John's Gospel differs from the other Gospels because John does not describe Jesus' baptism by John the Baptist. Instead, John the Baptist announces that he knows that Jesus is the Son of God.

In today's reading, John the Baptist sees Jesus approaching and cries out, giving witness about who Jesus is. In John's testimony he says that he saw the Spirit descend upon Jesus. By this sign, John the Baptist knew that Jesus was the one who is to come after him.

John the Baptist uses two titles for Jesus that are familiar to us. John calls Jesus the "Lamb of God" and the "Son of God." By using these titles, John the Baptist identifies Jesus' ultimate purpose: to redeem sinful humanity.

John the Baptist's testimony about Jesus clearly distinguishes John's baptism from the Baptism that Jesus will inaugurate. John baptizes with water; Jesus will baptize with the Holy Spirit. John also puts his practice of baptism in the context of Jesus' ministry. The purpose of John's baptism was to make Jesus known to Israel.

John the Baptist's sense of purpose is clearly identified in this reading: he baptized in order to prepare for and make known the ministry of the One who was to follow. John's witness is an excellent example of what it means to be a disciple. By our Baptism, we are called to make Jesus known to all the world by our words and by the witness of our lives.

Floater: I got a haircut, and the stylist complimented me on my thick hair. I told her I got it from my Grandfather - it's haireditary



