## THE EUCHARIST IS THE DIFFERENCE

In 2017, according to Lifeway research, 66% of Americans between 23-30 years olds stopped attending Church on a regular basis for at least a year after they turned 18... and that was just for Protestants. For Catholics, it was even worse ... more than 80%!

According to data released in July 2022, globally there are 2.3-2.6 billion Christians separated into more than 45,000 denominations!

The reality is that the youth throughout the world, and adults, for the past 50 years have had a difficult time distinguishing the differences among all Christian churches.

Prayer is prayer. God is God. Church is Church.

The growing churches — or those that have had some success in attracting larger congregations — have focused on personalities on the pulpit and/or music.

However, when understanding the "real" difference among the Christian denominations, as illustrated by the most recognized converts from other Christian faiths to Catholicism — such as Scott Hahn, Steve Ray, and now Iowan Keith Nester — will tell you the Eucharist is the most significant difference.

***The Eucharist is the treasure of our Catholic faith!*** By not teaching, understanding, or properly honoring and venerating the Body of Christ for decades, undermines the entire Catholic faith. Without the understanding and reverence of the Eucharist, Mass attendance, Confession, marriage, and the remaining sacraments are marginalized as well. †

## REVIVING THE EUCHARISTIC MIRACLE

*This is the second of a four-part series which coincides with the USCCB's strategic focus on a Eucharistic Revival and 2024 Eucharistic Conference.*

A few months ago I read an article by Anthony Esolen that noted that the decline in faith and devotion in the Eucharist may have come about as a result of the systematic and relentless removal of all the traditional devotional supports for the Eucharist after the Second Vatican Council.

By external supports, we mean the actual prayers of the Old Mass (which are ineffably beautiful), kneeling for Communion, Holy Communion on the tongue, fasting from food and drink, genuflections, single knee genuflections, and double knee genuflections, adoration, Benediction, Corpus Christi processions, Forty Hours.

These were traditions and customs and ceremonies that were in large part eliminated or abandoned or banished from Catholic life from about 1965 to 1985.

And yet, even as the bishops expunged all these supports from Catholic Eucharistic practice, they still expected the people to maintain the same level of devotion as they had before.

Many have also been commenting on the series of articles that we are presenting regarding the Eucharist.


Here is a portion of a letter from Lily that I am paraphrasing:

Of course, that did not happen. It served only to diminish our faith and devotion.

We could easily make the case that just about everything in the pre-Vatican II Church revolved around and reinforced what we believed about the Most Blessed Sacrament, the Holy Eucharist.

*All of it.*

From the architecture of our buildings to the art within them, it was Eucharistic. From our Catholic school system to the devotional system of novenas and missions all revolved around Jesus in the Holy Eucharist.

Every bit of it was to remind us from Whom and to Whom our lives were directed and how it is the Eucharist that would lead us.

But then came the 60s and 70s. The bishops and the liturgists and theologians and seminary professors who were appointed by the bishops took all that away.

They said that those customs were external and superficial and unnecessary. They taught us, "We don't do that anymore. That's that the old-fashioned Church. We are going to have bible vigils now and para liturgies!"

And rather than our Eucharistic devotion being enhanced or expanded, it was emptied. We did almost nothing Eucharistic (except the Mass) for almost twenty years. *Nothing.*

I remember at vespers one evening in the major seminary. It was about 1973 and I was in Third theology.

Father came in to lead us in the prayers. He walked over to the tabernacle, took the Ciborium out, put it on the altar, took off the top and we all knelt and said our prayers before the Blessed Sacrament.

That's when it hit me: this was first time in eight years that there was in our seminary — from the minor seminary to the college seminary to the major seminary — from about 1965 until 1973, the slightest hint of Eucharistic Devotion that I had seen.

**The Eucharist**

is a priceless treasure: by not only celebrating it but also by praying before it outside of Mass, we are enabled to make contact with the very wellspring of grace ... It is pleasant to spend time with [Jesus], to lie close to his breast like the Beloved Disciple (cf. Jn 13:25) and to feel the infinite love present in his heart.

For all those eight years in our seminary, the seminary system of the second largest Archdiocese in the nation, there was never celebrated either Benediction or Adoration or Forty Hours.

It all had been cancelled.

But, that was not just our seminary problem. There was almost no public Eucharistic Devotion of any kind in most of the American Church from about 1965 to 1985 (when Pope John Paul II came to the Chair of Peter).

And, it was like that all over the Catholic world.

The bishops, after having eliminated all the traditional Eucharistic devotions, still expected the people — without those helps — to muster the same love and devotion and faith in the Eucharist that they had before.

But that could never work. We needed all those traditions and customs and gestures and postures to remind us **Who** Jesus was — and **Who** Holy Communion was. Remove those struts and it all begins to collapse. And it did collapse.

Of course it would collapse. Every word and movement in the Mass and in our devotional life had developed organically over two thousand years in order to help us focus on Jesus and on His Real Presence in Holy Communion. It had disappeared.

Take for example the old Communion fast. I mean the very old one. The fast that told us that if we were going to receive Holy Communion the next day we had to

refrain from eating or drinking anything (including water) from midnight until the time we received Holy Communion.

Imagine the effort that that fast took — and the lesson which the person learned from fasting: that God Himself has become our Food; and our souls as well as our bodies must be prepared to receive Him. Nothing as common as natural food and drink should sully our mouths which were about to receive God himself.

And when your stomach was growling and you were getting a headache — even your body was in on the lesson: this is Our Lord Whom we are about to receive.

They changed the Communion fast when I was in 7<sup>th</sup> grade to 3 hours fasting from food and 1 hour for liquids. And, I remember raising my hand and asking sister "What if you have orange juice with little particles of pulp?" And dear Sister realized how complicated they were making it.

The newly revised fast proved so impractical that in a year or so the Communion fast was reduced to a one hour fast from any food or liquid before receiving.

Now I will admit that we all thought that this hour-long fast was great. More people could receive Holy Communion, and now we could have Mass in the afternoon and in the evening. I guess there could be something to be said for it.

But there was a trade-off.

**We traded more frequent Communion for less devotion.**

We hardly ever think of the fast these days. And it is the truth to tell anyone could do that one-hour fast before Communion just by leaving the house 15 minutes before Mass is to begin.

We don't have to make much of an effort at all to receive Holy Communion these days.

And since our bodies are no longer involved in reminding us how important this moment of Communion is, the fast just becomes just something we heard about on First Communion Day.

## Feed The Bellowing Ox for just one dollar a day!

(You may have never heard it before—but even Midnight Mass on Christmas was all about Holy Communion. Here is how: If the fast for Holy Communion was from Midnight on; and if everyone went to Midnight Mass after Christmas Eve dinner, then no one had an excuse to refrain from receiving Our Lord in Holy Communion.)

Think, too, of the various ceremonies at the old Latin Mass. All of them were particularly rich in meaning and lessons. The smallest ritual gesture pointed clearly to Jesus.

Maybe you remember how the priest after the Consecration, now that he had touched the Body of our Lord, would keep his forefinger and thumb together.

The unspoken and visual point was that if there were even a crumb of Communion left on his fingertips that It would not fall! Why that is Jesus! And we dare not be careless with the Body of our Lord!

Think of all the genuflections the priest would make as he would cross from one side of the altar to the other and pass by the Tabernacle where Our Lord reposed.

He never bowed or nodded or waved or even did the head Bop. He would get down on his right knee in tribute and homage and worship saying by that simple gesture: "This is God! My God! I am His creature. Come let us worship!"

And we in the pews would watch that knee go down and say with the priest in our hearts; "This is God our God! to Whom the priest is genuflecting. We are on sacred ground!"

Something as seemingly insignificant as the manner in which the priest would fold and unfold the altar linens—particularly the corporal on which the very Body of Christ was laid—was of considerable importance.

Because, God forbid, that even the smallest particle of the Host should get caught in the threads of the seams! Jesus, Himself, might be discarded unthinkingly.

If you are as old as I am, you might remember how in the old days when a Host was accidentally dropped during distribution everyone and everything stopped. The priest would kneel down, pick up the Host and cover the spot where the Host had lain with a small cloth. Then, after Mass, Father would return to the spot and purify the area with holy water—just in case a particle of the Host might have been left behind.

Someone watching this occur today might have asked: "What's the big deal?" However, even the altar boys from those days would have answered "That is the Body of Christ touching the floor! That's the big deal!!"

You might remember how the vessels, the chalice, the Paten, the Ciborium, and the Monstrance could only be touched by a priest whose hands were consecrated—because they had been in contact with the Body and Blood of Christ. And those hands were consecrated exactly so that he could hold the Body of Christ in his hands

Think of this: when a priest would follow all those external rubrics carefully and intentionally, he could not help, and neither could the people in the pews help, but to remember and be reinforced into their hearts and brains every time they witnessed even the least of these customs, that the whole Mass was about Christ, His Body sacrificed out of love for us, and now in its Eucharistic form, becomes Food for our souls.

How could a priest's soul and the souls of his people not be enlarged by such

thoughts? How could they not burst at the seams at the idea that God has given us the True Body of Christ His Son in our humble Holy Communion?

*My suspicion is that for the last 60 years, since the priest has no longer been expected to do any of those things, he and his people's devotion has diminished and maybe even grown a little cold.*

Each of these movements and customs and traditions were signs that pointed to Jesus. But think about it: When there is no sign, the unspoken message is that there is nothing to point to. †

## GUIDELINES: WORSHIP OF THE EUCHARIST OUTSIDE OF MASS

The Fathers of the Second Vatican Council reaffirmed the traditional teaching of the Church concerning the Real Presence of Christ in the Holy Eucharist. They taught:

*At the Last Supper, on the night when He was betrayed, our Savior instituted the Eucharistic Sacrifice of His Body and Blood. He did this in order to perpetuate the Sacrifice of the Cross throughout the centuries until He should come again, and so to entrust to His beloved Spouse, the Church, a memorial of His Death and Resurrection: a sacrament of love, a sign of unity, a bond of charity, a paschal banquet in which Christ is eaten, the mind is filled with grace, and a pledge of future glory is given to us.<sup>1</sup>*

During the Council, Pope Blessed Paul VI expressed his hope that the reform and restoration of the Mass called for by the Conciliar Fathers would “produce abundant fruits in the form of Eucharistic devotion, so that the Holy Church may, with this salvific sign of piety raised on high, make daily progress toward the full achievement of unity.”<sup>2</sup>

In 1967, the Sacred Congregation of Rites similarly emphasized the relationship between adoration of the Blessed Sacrament and the celebration of the Mass, indicating that “when the faithful adore Christ present in the sacrament, they should remember that this presence derives from the sacrifice and is directed toward both sacramental and spiritual Communion.”<sup>3</sup>

The intimate connection between Eucharistic adoration and the celebration of Mass was more fully articulated and developed in *Holy Communion and Worship of the Eucharist Outside Mass* (1973).

This document presents the worship of the Eucharist outside of Mass within the context of the official liturgical rites of the Church, noting that the Eucharist is “reserved after Mass to extend the grace of the sacrifice” of the Eucharistic celebration.<sup>4</sup>

This ritual book continues to guide the Church in her liturgical celebrations of offering worship to the Eucharist outside of Mass.

### Purposes of Eucharistic Worship Outside of Mass

The popes of our time have consistently encouraged the practice of worshipping the Eucharist outside of Mass. For example, in his annual Holy Thursday letter to priests in 1980, Pope Saint John Paul II wrote that “the Church and the world have great need of Eucharistic adoration. Jesus waits for us in this sacrament of love. Let us be generous with our time in going to meet Him in adoration and contemplation full of faith. And let us be ready to make reparation for the great faults and crimes of the world. May our adoration never cease.”<sup>5</sup>

In his 2005 address to the Roman Curia, Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI similarly noted the value of adoring the Blessed Sacrament outside of Mass, saying, “only in adoration can a profound and genuine reception mature. And it is precisely this personal encounter with the Lord that then strengthens the social mission contained in the Eucharist, which seeks to break down not only the walls that separate the Lord and ourselves, but also and especially the walls that separate us from one another.”<sup>6</sup>

More recently, Pope Francis has also reflected on how “one cannot know the Lord without the habit of adoring, of adoring in silence.”<sup>7</sup>

These papal statements and the historical development of Eucharistic adoration indicate that there are three purposes for the worship of the Eucharist outside of Mass:

- “to acknowledge Christ’s marvelous presence in the sacrament;”
- to lead to a fuller participation in the celebration of the Mass, culminating in the reception of Holy Communion; and,
- to encourage and foster “worship which is due to Christ in spirit and truth.”<sup>8</sup>

### Eucharistic Adoration and Exposition

The worship and adoration of the Eucharist outside of Mass most often takes place when the Blessed Sacrament is reserved in the tabernacle. These times of private adoration and prayer offer the faithful a privileged opportunity to “easily, fruitfully, and constantly honor the Lord, present in the sacrament, through personal worship.”<sup>9</sup>

In addition to the private adoration of the Eucharist in the tabernacle, the Blessed Sacrament may be exposed in a monstrance or ciborium for display to the faithful. The exposition of the

Blessed Sacrament is a public liturgical rite which is celebrated by the Church community. As such, the times of exposition should be scheduled when a sufficient number of the faithful can be present to pray before the exposed Eucharist. The Blessed Sacrament should never be exposed for the purposes of private devotion.<sup>10</sup>

### General Regulations for Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament

The Church has established the following norms for the exposition of the Blessed Sacrament:

1. A single genuflection is made in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, whether reserved in the tabernacle or exposed for public adoration.<sup>11</sup>

2. When the Blessed Sacrament is exposed in a monstrance, four to six candles are lit and incense is to be used. When the Blessed Sacrament is exposed in a ciborium, at least two candles are lit and incense may optionally be used.<sup>12</sup>

3. Pastors should arrange annually for the solemn exposition and adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. This may take place within the context of a “Forty Hours” devotion or for some other shorter period.<sup>13</sup>

4. Parishes may also schedule briefer periods of exposition more often throughout the year; however, it is prohibited to expose the Blessed Sacrament only for the purpose of giving benediction.<sup>14</sup>

While they cite “the ongoing battle against theocracy,” it’s clear that our protests significantly impacted their plans. We made it difficult for them to secure a venue, not to mention the negative publicity and security concerns they faced.

This is a major win, but it’s not the end. The Satanic Temple is still committed to spreading their agenda, and we must remain vigilant. Local protests against their initiatives like “After-School Satan Clubs” continue to be crucial.

These events promote activities that mock our faith and sacraments, attempting to normalize a dangerous ideology. We cannot be silent in the face of such blasphemy. Protests, big or small, are a vital tool to defend our values and protect our communities. **The success of the Boston protests is a testament to the power of collective action.** May we continue to pray fervently and stand firm in our beliefs. Together, let us ensure that Satancon becomes a thing of the past.

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## LEANING IN

I remember a conversation with my sister as I was preparing for a career change. We were discussing the emerging synergy between my growing family, career interests, and call to lay ministry.

**“I’m proud of you brother,” she said.  
“You’re leaning into our turbulent times.”**

I’ve thought about that conversation over the years. My sister captured one of the cornerstones of our Catholic life. We are called to lean in and love our neighbor. Jesus explained this in the story of the Good Samaritan. The priest and the Levite leaned away from the man left for dead. But the Good Samaritan leaned in and helped him. (Luke 10: 25- 37)

We arrived in Dubuque as our boys were entering their busy middle-school years. Dagmar, my wife, and I worked to establish ourselves in new jobs. We both attended our first CEW’s (Christian Experience Weekend).

I was invited to run for Parish Council. I didn’t have time. But I heard a speaker who challenged me. He said the church is like a football game. There are 22 people on the field who need rest and 50,000 people in the stands who need exercise.

I picked up the challenge. I try to find a good balance between my growing family, career, and lay ministry. But last year I slipped into a funk. I woke up most days with one thought—get back to bed. I was tired. Was it time to lean out?

Charlie Tremendous Jones once said, “*You will be the same person in five years as you are today except for the people you meet and the books you read.*” John Eldredge has been a favorite author of mine since I devoured *Wild at Heart: Discovering the Secret of a Man’s Soul* (Thomas Nelson, 2001). Dagmar gave me John’s new book, *Resilient: Restoring Your Weary Soul in These Turbulent Times* (Thomas Nelson, 2022).

“*The longing for things to be wonderful is one of the deepest yearnings in the human heart. After times of trial--such as the Covid pandemic, war, job loss, or grief--our desire rises to the surface demanding relief. We’ve all had to rally to face crisis, tapping into our soul’s reserves. But at some point, we have to replenish those reserves, or we will burn out...*

Eldredge validates the weariness we feel and points us to the only way we can recover our joy: through Jesus’ provision of supernatural resilience...The peace and hope provided in Christ is always available to us—and his resilience never fails.” (Back cover of the book)

This was another moment when a book changed my life. I wasn’t broken, just weary. I needed to replenish my reserves. I began praying for supernatural resilience and experienced the peace of Christ in new ways.

I also found a new appreciation for the apostles. When Jesus was alive, the apostles leaned in and followed His teaching.

But, when Jesus died on the cross, believing all had been lost, they leaned back and returned to their old lives. However, after Jesus rose from the dead and promised the Holy Spirit would be with them always, the apostles leaned in for good. All of them were martyred for their faith except St. John who died of old age after receiving the Revelation of our Lord Jesus. They leaned in till the very end.

Nurtured by the Holy Spirit and the growing Church, many in the 1st Century leaned in to share the Gospel and follow the message of the Good Samaritan. The Mission of St. Vincent de Paul extended this work in 1833. We are blessed by its ongoing presence.

Our staff and volunteers lean in to serve. There is also an expectation that we prioritize service to our families and those closest to us. How about you? Are you leaning into challenges in your family? Are you feeling called by God to lean into a problem in your community? Are there people around you who need the peace of Christ and the power of the Gospel?

God never intended us to lean in all by ourselves. The scriptures and lives of the Saints paint a clear picture of God’s intention to help us and His invitation to seek out His grace and mercy. We must also be alert to the two faces of shame. Don’t let Satan shame you into thinking you have nothing to offer. And when you learn that you do, watch out! The Master of Lies will try to tell you that no one cares.

Let’s lock arms and raise a chorus of prayer for supernatural resilience. Together, we can make a great impact as we lean into our turbulent times. +

"O Sacred Heart of Jesus, to Thee I consecrate and offer up my person and my life, my actions, trials, and sufferings, that my entire being may henceforth only be employed in loving, honoring and glorifying Thee."

Conversation can be another profound practice of consecration. Here's how engaging in intentional dialogues can be an ongoing practice of consecration and obedience to the second great commandment: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:39).

**1. Follow Christ's Teachings in everyday encounters:** Sacred Conversations are grounded in scriptural and gospel teachings on love, compassion, friendship, and understanding (Luke 24:17). By engaging in these dialogues, participants embody the spirit of Christ's message, allowing His teachings to guide their grace-filled interactions.

**2. Foster Spiritual Growth:** Just as the Sacred Heart symbolizes Christ's boundless love and mercy, Sacred Conversations serve as vehicles for spiritual growth and transformation. Through intentional dialogue, participants are encouraged to deepen their relationship with Christ, nurture virtues such as compassion and forgiveness, and strive to embody the love exemplified by the Sacred Heart.

**3. Build Community and Connection:** The Sacred Heart of Jesus represents unity and communion with God and one another. Practicing Sacred Conversations fosters community building and strengthens connections among participants. By engaging in open, respectful dialogue, individuals cultivate bonds of friendship, support, and solidarity, mirroring the unity found in the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

**4. Promote Understanding and**

**Empathy:** Sacred Conversations encourage participants to listen attentively, seek understanding, and empathize with one another's perspectives. In doing so, individuals honor the Sacred Heart by embracing the qualities of compassion and empathy exemplified by Christ. Through dialogue, participants strive to see Christ in one another, fostering a deeper appreciation for the dignity and worth of each person.

**5. Seek Guidance from the Holy Spirit:** Central to Sacred Conversations is the presence of the Holy Spirit, guiding and illuminating participants' interactions.



During the month of June, dedicated to the Sacred Heart, individuals can invoke the guidance of the Holy Spirit as they engage in dialogue, seeking wisdom, discernment, and inspiration from the source of all truth and love.

**6. Live Out the Message of Love:** Ultimately, the Sacred Heart of Jesus embodies the message of divine love for humanity. By practicing Sacred Conversations, participants actively live out this message of love in their interactions with others. Through compassionate listening, genuine empathy, and mutual respect, individuals honor the Sacred Heart by spreading the love and kindness that Christ exemplified throughout His earthly ministry.

Through prayer and dialogic practice, June provides a rich invitation to honor the Sacred Heart of Jesus. These forms

of dialogue are grounded in Christian teaching, deepen spiritual connection, foster community, and embody the love and compassion exemplified by the Sacred Heart, emulating His boundless love for all humanity. †

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## THE ANNUNCIATION: THE MOSAIC OF THE FATHER'S MERCY

St. Gabriel is a mighty archangel, and the Annunciation is an extraordinary event, but do we ever meditate on *each* of the participants in this spectacular mosaic of grace?

If we look at St. Gabriel, Our Blessed Mother, and our Incarnational Lord Jesus, we see how there is an order of grace and a heart of mercy! This is something to contemplate during your meditation on the first mystery of the Joyful Mystery of the Rosary.

The Archangel Gabriel teaches us about strength. His name means "Strength of God" in Hebrew.

To understand this message of strength, we must go back to the original place we see Gabriel in Scripture. This is in the book of Daniel chapters 8 and 9. Here, the Archangel Gabriel interprets a dream for Daniel about salvation history (Ch. 8) and speaks of the destruction and restoration of God's Temple (Ch. 9).

In this, Gabriel adds colorful and important aspects to the Mosaic of Mercy. He first shows that our strength must be found in being connected to prayer both in the Temple with community (liturgy) and as individuals (personal prayer).

This brings us to the second stroke of color which teaches us that the Temple is destroyed when it is not connected to God.

In Daniel's time they worshipped idols in the temple, had statues of kings of the world like taking a place of primacy, and abandoned God's teachings.

**As the Church, we must not worship idols of the world in the temple of God, putting money over people, trusting in the world and "progress" instead of God and Tradition (the heresy of Modernism), and emphasizing Ideology instead of the great I AM.**

This is the reason Gabriel brings the third part of this colorful lesson by pointing to the restoration of the temple. He notes this will happen when the Woman of Prayer brings the strength of

God found in the Christ-child into the temple. Gabriel shows us we must have God as our strength to interpret and bring about our dreams as well as uphold the dignity of the Temple (both our individual temples -see 1Cor. 6:19- and the Catholic Church) which Mary embodies as the one who is "full of grace." Therefore, the Archangel Gabriel points to Mary.

Mary teaches us about the colors of grace in life. Mary is known by two names, "full of grace" which equates to beauty. In Hebrew, beauty has the name Naomi. She also has the name of "Lady of Sorrows" which equates to bitterness. In Hebrew, beauty has the name Mara.

Mary shows us that in all situations of life, we can either block out the Son (sun) and be bitter, i.e. become Mara, or we can let in the Son (sun) by prayer and the Sacraments and allow God to do something beautiful through that situation, i.e. become Naomi.

As the letter to the Romans states: More than that, we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us (Rom. 5:3-5).

**Thus, Mary shows us we can either allow life to turn us away from God or point us to Him. Mary points to the Son (sun) and encourages us not to eclipse the Son (sun) by blocking the warm light of grace.**

Finally, we have the third colorful stroke in the Mosaic of grace who is the person Jesus Christ. He is the Word of God forever, but also takes on our human nature. He took upon Himself a human nature so He could forgive our sins and enter our lives. The Gospel of John tells us this powerful truth:

For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. For God sent the Son into the world, not

to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him (Jn. 3:16-17).

**The Father sends His Son not to condemn us, but to save and shower His mercy upon us! Jesus condemns sin but if we repent and decide to separate ourselves from the sin, then He can punish the sin but shower the sinner with grace and mercy!**

We must realize the vastness of God's mercy. If God Almighty, Creator of Heaven and Earth can forgive us, why can we not forgive ourselves? Why do we hold onto guilt that God has freed us from which keeps us from the joy of Divine Mercy as Fr. Rich, M.C brilliantly reminds us. Jesus points to the joy of the Father's Mercy (see LK. 6:36) which He wants for us all to dwell through repentance, Confession, and accepting the grace of forgiveness.

In conclusion, we see that the Archangel Gabriel paints a brilliant stroke on the Mosaic of Mercy showing that our strength must be in God and Him alone. In this He points to Mary.

Then Mary fills in the background by showing us we must choose Naomi in the events of life allowing God to make it beautiful. In this Mary points to Jesus.

Finally, Jesus points us to the Father's Mercy urging us all to repentance and Confession and remembering to accept the Father's Mercy. In this we see the beautiful Mosaic of the Father's Mercy which the Archangel Gabriel, Our Blessed Mother Mary, and Jesus point us to gaze upon for holiness.

May we meditate on the Mosaic of the Annunciation and the Father's Mercy often. †

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## GOD'S MERCY CONTINUES BEYOND DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY!

Alleluia! Alleluia! Jesus is Risen from the dead! The greatest Feast of the year in the Catholic Church was celebrated at Easter: Jesus giving His very life for us and new life to us through His Resurrection.

Following Easter was God's abundant mercy on Divine Mercy Sunday. We know that God's mercy didn't stop with Jesus' death and doesn't stop on Divine Mercy Sunday.

**We have a crucial part to play in Jesus' mission of love and mercy. Jesus asks us to share His mercy with people around us throughout the year.**

*How do we incorporate God's mercy in our everyday lives?*

*How do we give our ourselves to others?*

Jesus revealed His mercy through miracles, but also showed us how the people around Him reacted. Did they accept or reject the love offered to them?

One such miracle is the healing of the man with palsy as detailed in Mark's gospel.

*1 And again he entered into Capharnaum after some days.*

*2 And it was heard that he was in the house. And many came together, so that there was no room: no, not even at the door. And he spoke to them the word.*

*3 And they came to him, bringing one sick of the palsy, who was carried by four.*

*4 And when they could not offer him unto him for the multitude, they uncovered the roof where he was: and opening it, they let down the bed wherein the man sick of palsy lay.*

*5 And when Jesus had seen their faith, he saith to the sick of the palsy: Son, thy sins are forgiven thee.*

*6 And there were some of the scribes sitting there and thinking in their hearts:*


*7 Why doth this man speak thus? He blasphemeth. Who can forgive sins, but God only?*

*8 Which Jesus presently knowing in his spirit that they so thought within themselves, saith to them: Why think you these things in your hearts?*

*9 Which is easier, to say to the sick of the palsy: Thy sins are forgiven thee; or to say, Arise, take up thy bed and walk?*

*10 But that you may know that the Son of man hath power on earth to forgive sins (he saith to the sick of the palsy):*

*11 I say to thee: Arise. Take up thy bed and go into thy house.*



*12 And immediately he arose and, taking up his bed, went his way in the sight of all: so that all wondered and glorified God, saying: We never saw the like. (Mark 2:1-12 Douay-Rheims Bible)*

**Three points are revealed in this miracle.**

Foremost, is Jesus' healing the man with palsy. Jesus saw the faith of the man and the four men who brought the man with palsy, and He did not hesitate to heal the man. His Mercy was evident for all to experience. He desired the man with palsy to be healed.

Second, the opposite was also obvious for the scribes who did not have faith. Rather, they were critical of Jesus, "He blasphemeth. Who can forgive sins, but God only?" Their hearts were hardened and could not enter into Jesus' healing.

Third, what did they people do when the man was healed? "so that all wondered and glorified God: saying: We never saw the like."

**In the same way, Jesus invites us to enter into His mercy for others by having faith and confidence in His mercy and healing power; having eyes of faith instead of having hardened hearts and rejecting God; and glorifying God for His mercy.**

Jesus told St. Faustina, as revealed in her Diary, to revere and have confidence in His mercy.

Jesus also demands us to be merciful to others...always and everywhere, and to embrace the opportunity to be merciful to someone rather than ignore or walk away from it.

*My daughter, if I demand through you that people revere My mercy, you should*

*be the first to distinguish yourself by this confidence in My mercy. I demand from you deeds of mercy, which are to arise out of love for Me. You are to show mercy to your neighbor always and everywhere. You must not shrink from this or try to excuse or absolve yourself from it.*

*I am giving you three ways of exercising mercy toward your neighbor: the first, by deed; the second, by word; the third, by prayer. In these three degrees is contained the fullness of mercy, and it is an unquestionable proof of love for Me. By this means a soul glorifies and pays reverence to My mercy. (Diary of Saint Maria Faustina Kowalski, Paragraph 742)*

### Question: Who is our neighbor?

Jesus tells us to show mercy to anyone who is in need, whether a family member, someone who lives near or far from you, a co-worker, or a stranger: which are all the same to Our Lord. He tells us to show mercy to our neighbor – anyone – always and everywhere.

However, there may be circumstances where we can't show mercy because of material means. Jesus makes it clear that spiritual mercy is effective as material means.

*St. Faustina: I understand Your words, Lord, and the magnitude of the mercy that ought to shine in my soul, Jesus: I know, My daughter, that you understand it and that you do everything within your power. But write this for the many souls who are often worried because they do not have the material means with which to carry out in an act of mercy. Yet spiritual mercy, which requires neither permissions nor storehouses, is much more meritorious and is within the grasp of every soul. If a soul does not exercise mercy somehow or other, it will not obtain My mercy on the day of judgement. (Diary, 1317)*

Furthermore, Jesus challenges us in a most challenging way in Luke's gospel.

*27 But I say to you that hear: Love your enemies. Do good to those that hate you.*

*28 Bless them that curse you and pray for them who calumniate you.*

*35 But love ye your enemies: do good, and lend, hoping for nothing thereby: and your reward shall be great, and you shall be the sons of the Highest. For he is kind to the unthankful and to the evil.*

*36 Be ye therefore merciful, as your Father also is merciful. (Luke 6:27-28, 35-36 DRB)*

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


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## DOES GOD WANT OUR PERSONAL FAITH TO BE PRIVATE?

It scares me to think that God could use a sinner like me to reach people. It frightens me that God would ask me to share my faith in the world today. **I never thought I'd see the day when:**

- » The United States is so divided
- » The same story sounds so different on different news outlets
- » Lawlessness and violence shake our communities
- » Church leaders are divided on life, abortion, gender identity, and same-sex attraction
- » Priests and bishops are canceled for speaking out against Church leadership
- » Antisemitism and hatred of the Jewish people are promoted on college campuses
- » Our children and grands are walking away from the Church, many no longer believing in God, period

**But this is the post-pandemic, rushing towards a one-world, volatile, everyone is worn out world we live in.**

We have questions. Is this true? Is that true? Do we listen to what the Pope said three years ago or last fall? Does spiritual truth change that quickly? Unanswered questions lead to doubts. Doubts, if left unchecked, can mature into total disbelief.

Maybe God isn't aware of the times we live in. If He were, would He take mercy on us and let us keep our personal faith private? Would He want to spare us being called a hater when we share His Word based on the full council of the Bible?

**As G.K. Chesterton often said, "The answers are hidden in plain view."**

Jesus spent much of His time preparing believers for tough times to come:

*"If the world hates you, keep in mind that it hated me first. If you belonged to the world, it would love you as its own. As it is, you do not belong to the world, but I have chosen you out of the world. That is why the world hates you."*  
(John 15: 18-19)

*"Blessed are you when people insult you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you for my sake. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven. In the same manner, they persecuted the prophets who preceded you."* (Matthew 5: 11-12)

**St. Paul extended the foretelling of tough times in his second letter to Timothy.**

*"For the time is coming when people will not accept sound doctrine, but they will follow their own desires and accumulate teachers who will preach to their itching ears. They will shut their ears to the truth and be captivated by myths."* (2 Timothy 4:3-4)

Do you see any of these conditions present in our time? It seems clear to me that Jesus saw the challenges of our day on the horizon. It seems clear that God knows full well what we are facing. And still, and perhaps even more because we are living in challenging times, God calls us to share our faith.

After the Resurrection, Jesus gave the disciples the famous instruction found in Acts 1:8.

*"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem, but throughout Judea and Samaria, and indeed to the farthest ends of the earth."*

Unsettling as it may be, we are called to share our personal faith in public.

**Sometimes it feels like God throws me into public to share my faith!**

At these times, it helps me to recall what Jesus has and is doing for me. He offers to forgive my sins and pay the penalties for my wrongdoings. He restores my harmony with God. He offers me wisdom to help me through my days and peace through my nights. God helps me discern the signs of our times and offers me an eternity with Him in a great neighborhood.

In gratitude I find courage. I can't think of a better movie to encourage my friends to see. I can't think of a better recipe to share with my neighbors.

When we open our mouth, our faith goes on parade. I wonder what people see when my parade passes by. What do you want people to see when your parade passes by?

I must remember when I come to the end of my parade route, I get to have a little chat with Almighty God. When I'm tempted to think that I'll be okay on my own, I read Hebrews 10:31. "It is a dreadful thing to fall into the hands of the living God." Then I fall on my knees and crawl back to Christ.

Let's continue to nurture our faith and grow closer to the Lord Jesus and then share what we know with those closest to us. It matters! It's a great privilege to lean in and do our small part while the Holy Spirit softens hearts and beckons people to get caught up in Christ. †

love you and to help a friend in need, like the four men who took the man with palsy to Jesus; but it can be very difficult to show mercy to people who are annoying, irritating, frustrating to you, and even hate you.

Yet, Jesus speaks loudly to us that people who are vexing or troubling to us: *to love and be merciful to them as well.*

Jesus tells St. Faustina: *I demand from you deeds of mercy, which are to arise out of love for Me. You are to show mercy to your neighbor always and everywhere. You must not shrink from this or try to excuse or absolve yourself from it.* (Diary 742).

St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta, in her ministry to the poorest of the poor, is our role model for loving and showing mercy to those who love us, those who do not love us, and those that make life difficult for us.

Take St. Mother Teresa's words in your heart, meditate on them, and then act on these words of wisdom.

*People are often unreasonable and self-centered, Forgive them anyway.*  
*If you are kind, people may accuse you of ulterior motives, Be Kind anyway.*  
*If you are honest, people may cheat you, Be Honest anyway.*  
*If you find happiness, people may be jealous, Be Happy anyway.*  
*The good you do today may be forgotten tomorrow, Do Good anyway.*  
*Give the world the best you have and it may never be enough, Give your Best anyway.*  
*For you see, in the end... It is between you and God.*  
*It was never between you and them anyway.*

## SEVEN SISTERS APOSTOLATE CELEBRATING TEN YEARS

The Seven Sisters Apostolate started ten years ago in the Archdiocese of Dubuque. To celebrate this milestone, an Anniversary Celebration is set for **Saturday, June 8, 2024**, at St. Columbkille Catholic Church in Dubuque.

This Apostolate's mission is for seven women each to commit to offer one Holy Hour, each on a specific day of the week, in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament for their pastor.

This celebration will begin with an 8:00 a.m. Rosary followed by Mass at 8:30 presided by Fr. David Schatz who also will be the Keynote speaker. Breakfast treats and coffee in Presentation Hall follows Mass.

There will be time to share ideas and testimonies, a time for questions and door prizes. It concludes with lunch.

**All women from any diocese are invited and encouraged to attend. We especially would like all women who pray a Holy Hour for their priest or bishop to attend.**

The Seven Sisters in this Archdiocese got its start in April/May of 2014 when JoAnn Olson invited two friends to join her in this grassroots effort. We personally invited women from the parishes in Dubuque and surrounding parishes to be the Anchoress and invite six other women to each take one day of the week to pray one Holy Hour in front of the Blessed Sacrament.

## EMBER DAYS OF AUTUMN HARVEST THE GRAPES TO MAKE THE WINE

And God said, "Let the earth sprout vegetation, plants yielding seed, and fruit trees bearing fruit in which is their seed, each according to its kind, on the earth." And it was so. The earth brought forth vegetation, plants yielding seed according to their own kinds, and trees bearing fruit in which is their seed, each according to its kind. And God saw that it was good. Genesis 1: 11-12

The Catholic Church recognizes the beauty of the earth and the contributions of farmers with Ember Days, a time to give thanks for a bountiful harvest. The term *ember* is believed to have been derived from the Latin term *quattour tempora* which means four times or four seasons.

The church has established four sets of Ember Days, one to mark every season of the year. Each set of Ember Days consists of a Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday. Wednesdays mark the day on which Christ was betrayed; Friday, the day that He died. Saturdays are honored as the day on which Christ was placed in the tomb. Until Vatican II, Ember Days had been days of fasting and abstinence. Fasting and abstinence are no longer required during these times, but they're still an opportunity to show gratitude for gifts from the garden.

The Fall Ember Days begin in the week following the Feast of the Holy Cross (September 14). Fall is a time to harvest grapes, a crop which has played a significant role in church events.

As His first public miracle, Christ turned water into wine at the Wedding Feast of Cana. The gospel of St. John notes that in the hours before death on the cross, Christ said "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine-dresser. Every branch in me that bears no fruit he will take away; and every branch that bears fruit he will cleanse that it may bear more fruit." (John 15: 1-2)

Many saints have labored in the vineyards to prepare wine for the table of the Lord.


St. Urban of Langres is the patron saint of wine and vineyard workers because he gave comfort and spiritual guidance to vineyard workers who hid him from enemies of the church. St. Urban was appointed Bishop of Langres, France, in 374.

Chaos erupted in that area shortly after his appointment and the bishop was forced to leave his home and hide from his enemies in near-by vineyards. He didn't, however, hide from the workers of the fields.

St. Urban used this time in exile to convert vineyard workers to Catholicism.

About 1300 years later, another Catholic leader, Dom Pierre Pérignon (December 1638 – September 1715), harvested grapes as he praised God and raised funds needed to support his monastery.

Circa 1670, Dom Pierre Pérignon entered the Benedictine Abbey of Hautvillers in the Champagne region of France. Upon arrival, he was given the job of cellarar, the person responsible for maintaining the monastery's supply of food and drink.



Since wine was an important part of their diet, Dom Pérignon made daily trips to the monastery's vineyards to oversee the grape harvest. The abbey didn't yield the best-tasting fruit so their wine was not well-received.

Dom Pérignon moved the abbey's vines so that the optimum amount of sunlight would reach the grapes. He also began blending varieties of grapes to improve the taste of the wine. Dom Pérignon soon gained a reputation as the best winemaker in France. The clever monks recognized the value he brought and named the wine after him. Wines bearing the name of Dom Pérignon could sell for twice the price of the competitors.

Some mistakenly call Dom Pérignon the inventor of the sparkling wine known as champagne. In reality, sparkling wine existed before Dom Pérignon began his work. Dom Pérignon's study of grape production, however, paved the way for the Widow Clicquot, who created the modern champagne industry nearly 100 years later.

The fine wines that are served today to royalty and world leaders may not meet the standards for the Table of the Lord.

Canon Law 924.3 states that when

preparing for Mass, "The wine must be natural, made from grapes of the vine, and not corrupt".

The General Instructions of the Roman Missal (GIRM) further state, "The wine for the celebration of the Eucharist must be made from the fruit of the vine (Luke 22:18), natural and unadulterated, that is, without admixture of extraneous substances." Those extraneous substances refer to preservatives and flavor enhancements. Altar wines may contain only the grapes and the minimum amount of sulfite, a preservative that prevents the wine from turning into vinegar.

With permission from his bishop, during the consecration of the Mass, a priest may use Mustum, a grape juice that has started to ferment but has not become alcoholic. Mustum is a non-alcoholic alternative that enables recovering alcoholics and others who cannot drink wine to receive communion.

As we gather for the autumn Ember Days, we give thanks for the grape harvest and the skill of winemakers. We remember God's goodness as we celebrate together. †



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## THE PRO-LIFE COMMITMENT IS THE EUCHARIST

Did you ever realize that the same four words that were used by the Lord Jesus to save the world are also used by some to promote abortion?

**"This is my body."**

The same simple words are spoken from opposite ends of the universe, with meanings that are directly contrary to each other.

Scripture tells us that on the night before He died to save all people, the Lord Jesus took bread, blessed it, broke it, and gave it to His disciples, saying, *"This is My Body, which is given up for you."*

He was pointing to what would happen the next day, when He would give that same Body on the cross. He sacrifices Himself so that we may live. He gives up His Body so that He can destroy the power of sin and death. As a result, He welcomes us into His life, into His Kingdom. He makes us members of His Body!

On the other hand, abortion supporters say, *"This is my body! I can do what I want, even to the point of killing the life within it."*

**Abortion is the exact opposite of love.** Love says, *"I sacrifice myself for the good of the other person."* Abortion says, *"I sacrifice the other person for the good of myself."* In the Eucharist we see the meaning of love and receive the power to live it.

Gustave Thibon has said that the true God transforms violence into suffering, while the false god transforms suffering into violence. The woman tempted to have an abortion will transform her suffering into violence unless she allows love to transform her, and make her willing to give herself away.

The Eucharist gives both the lesson and the power. Mom is to say *"This is my body, my blood, my life, given up for you, my child."*

Everyone who wants to fight abortion needs to say the same. We need to exercise the same generosity we ask the Moms and Dads to exercise. We need to imitate the mysteries we celebrate.

**This is what the Eucharist teaches us; it is the Sacrifice and Sacrament of love. And, love is the energy of the pro-life movement.**

Indeed, if the pro-life movement is not a movement of love, then it is nothing at all. But if it is a movement of love, then nothing will stop it, for *"Love is stronger than death, more powerful even than hell."* (Song of Songs 8:6)

The Eucharist also shapes our pro-life commitment in many other ways.

The Eucharist is a sacrament of faith. The Consecrated Host looks no different after the consecration than before. It looks, smells, feels, and tastes like bread. Only one of the five senses gets to the truth: hearing.

**Jesus says, "This is My Body."**

Christians are used to looking beyond appearances. Neither the baby in the manger nor the man on the cross look like God.

Yet, by faith, we know He is no mere man. The Bible does not have a particular glow setting it off from other books, nor does it levitate above the shelf. Yet by faith we know it is uniquely the Word of God. The Eucharist seems to be bread and wine, and yet by faith we say, *"My Lord and My God!"* as we kneel in adoration.

The same dynamic of faith that enables us to see beyond appearances in these mysteries enables us to see beyond appearances in our neighbor. We can look at the persons around us, at the sick and the poor, and we can say, *"Christ is there as well. There is my brother, my sister, made in the very image of God!"*

In the same way we can look at the child

in the womb and say, *"There, too, is my brother, my sister, equal in dignity and just as worthy of protection as anyone else!"*

**Some people will say the child in the womb, especially in the earliest stages, is too small to be the subject of Constitutional rights. But is the Sacred Host too small to be God, too unlike Him in appearance to be worshipped? The slightest particle of the Host is fully Christ. Eucharistic Faith is a powerful antidote to the dangerous notion that value depends on size.**

We can also reflect on the fact that the Eucharist is the Sacrament of Unity, whereas abortion divides humanity at its core. The Eucharist is, furthermore the Bread of Life, and brings to the world the sacrifice by which Jesus destroyed the power of death, and therefore the power of abortion.

The Church in the United States is engaged in a renewed effort to foster Eucharistic Faith. At the same time, our nation is engaged in a fierce battle against those who want to impose abortion as a fundamental right.

Let's allow these two dynamics to illumine one another. May the Eucharistic Faith we have strengthen our pro-life commitment, and lead to the full unfolding of the victory of life! **†**

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## PRO-LIFE LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Here's some legislative and court news from Iowa, the Midwest, and around the country.

### IOWA COURT NEWS

We are still awaiting a decision from the Iowa Supreme Court on Iowa's so-called heartbeat law, which states that "a physician shall not perform an abortion upon a pregnant woman when it has been determined that the unborn child has a detectable fetal heartbeat," except in certain limited circumstances like life of the mother, rape and incest reported within a specified time, or fetal abnormality incompatible with life.

This proposed law provides that it shall not be interpreted "to impose civil or criminal liability on a woman upon whom an abortion is performed in violation of the law."

In other words, and in contrast to what you might hear from the news media, **women are NOT being punished by the heartbeat law**. The physician must also inform the mother of the results of the test done to determine if a fetal heartbeat is present, and the woman must acknowledge receiving that information by signing a written verification. Doctors are being required to perform normal testing and to give the woman appropriate information regarding the detectability of her child's heartbeat. Thus, the law is meant to protect the mother and her child by giving the woman easily obtainable medical data on her child.

It is not a perfect law, however, because as you know, **medical science proves that the unborn child is a human being from her/his conception**, and all conceived children deserve to be born. Some of the media characterize the heartbeat law as requiring that doctors test for "pre-cardiac electrical impulses detectable in a woman's uterus."

Such reporting is a stain on good journalism and you should watch for it and call it out when you see it. It wrongfully dehumanizes Iowa's pre-born human beings and it does not quote the language of the law itself. We should have a decision from the Iowa Supreme Court in June.

### IOWA LEGISLATIVE NEWS

The Iowa Legislature has now adjourned. Here is the news on the bills we were watching:

**HF 2276** – Zoning protection for maternity homes (like Mary's Inn) PASSED.

This bill prohibits cities from having zoning regulations that discriminate against maternity homes. It means that maternity homes can live in residential neighborhoods pretty much just like the rest of us. It's justice for expectant moms, their unborn children, and for the staff and volunteers who serve their needs.

**HF 2617** – The so-called "Baby Olivia" bill (named after the Live Action video) that would have required schools to play for 7 – 12th graders an accurate video showing human fetal development from fertilization to birth **did NOT pass**.

**SF 2095** – Bill to increase Medicaid eligibility and benefits post birth from six months to one year PASSED. This is a great thing, as it will dramatically extend the time new moms can get financial help when their babies are still very young.

**HF 2267** – MOM'S Bill amendments (*More Options for Maternal Support*) – to clean up language and get more money flowing sooner to new moms, and allow private organizations to take over management from the state of Iowa PASSED.

This is good, but still needs to have more funding. Texas allocated \$120 million dollars to their version of MOMS. The Iowa legislature only approved \$2.5 million dollars.

**HF 2637** – Bill that would have increased the adoption tax credit for adopting parents from \$5,000 to \$20,000 **did NOT pass**. This is unfortunate because we need to encourage adoption as an alternative to abortion.

**SF 523** – Bill to increase civil and criminal penalties if an unborn human being is intentionally or negligently killed under certain circumstances.

For example, a person who kills an unborn child during a robbery would be guilty of a felony, and a person who negligently kills an unborn child in an auto accident could be sued by the child's mother. This bill **did NOT pass**.

### OTHER STATES

**ILLINOIS** - The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDDPH) **rejected a request made by the absurdly named "Hope" Clinic** to disregard safety standards when aborting babies. This abortuary is notorious for often calling an ambulance for patients who need to be hospitalized after an abortion due to excessive bleeding and other trauma.

However, its Director wanted to allow her staff to perform abortions without having licensed-based privileges in any hospital, have non-physicians perform abortions, and to be exempt from having a licensed pathologist examine the dead babies they kill. Fortunately, the Illinois Department of Public Health rejected all three requests.

**WISCONSIN** - Longtime Supreme Court Justice Ann Walsh Bradley announced recently that she will not seek another term on the state's highest court, which creates an open seat critical to the pro-life movement.

She is a liberal justice who has served on the court since 1995. She plans to continue on the court until July, 2025. This means pro-abortion Governor Tony Evers will not be able to appoint a pro-abortion justice to serve the remainder of her term.

Fortunately, pro-life former Wisconsin Attorney General Brad Schimel plans to run for the seat. While Attorney General, he fought Planned Parenthood in numerous court cases to protect moms and the unborn in Wisconsin.

# Advocating for Life from conception to natural death

**CALIFORNIA, ARIZONA** - Arizona currently has a law in place to protect women and babies from abortion, due to a recent Arizona Supreme Court decision. In response, California Governor Gavin Newsom is pushing a new bill that would expedite California medical licensing for Arizona abortionists who want to abort their patients in California. The pro-abortion Governor and Attorney General of Arizona are working with Newsom to make this happen.

## NATIONAL NEWS

**Chemical abortions:** On March 26, 2024, the U.S. Supreme Court heard oral arguments in a case that has the potential to make a major impact on the widespread accessibility of chemical abortion (abortion pills). Chemical abortions are now the most common form of abortion in the United States. The case is in response to the Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) promoting the availability of chemical abortion while ignoring the risks to women and violating federal law. A decision is expected by the end of June.

**Emergency Medical Treatment and Labor Act:** On April 23, 2024, the U.S. Supreme Court heard oral arguments on the Biden Administration's attempt to force Idaho emergency room doctors to perform abortions even if it is against their conscience or state law.

A federal law known as the Emergency Medical Treatment and Labor Act (EMTALA) requires hospitals receiving federal funds to provide urgent care for all patients, regardless of their ability to pay. Biden lawyers argued hospitals receiving Medicare must direct their emergency room doctors to abort babies in certain circumstances even if a state's law says otherwise. Under Biden's pro-abortion view of how EMTALA should be interpreted, hospitals that do not comply face penalties of up to \$120,000 per violation.

So, in Idaho for example, the state law protects all babies from abortion unless the mother's life is endangered. The Biden administration is trying to use the EMTALA to force more emergency room abortions beyond the state exception of life of the mother, and punish the hospital and doctor if they won't kill more babies.

Texas has a similar law, and the Idaho lower courts ruled in favor of Biden, but the Texas lower courts ruled in favor of life. The Supreme Court will make the final ruling that will cover Idaho, Texas, and all other states, including Iowa.

During the oral argument, Supreme Court Justices Samuel Alito and Neil Gorsuch drew attention to the fact that the EMTLA statute does not mention "abortion" but includes the term "unborn child" when defining what constitutes a patient. Alito asked the pro-abortion lawyer representing the Biden Administration, "Isn't that an odd phrase to put in a statute that imposes a mandate to perform abortions? Have you ever seen an abortion statute that uses the phrase 'unborn child'?"

The Biden lawyer had no good answer....because there is none. A decision is expected by the end of June, 2024.

## OVER 500 ATTEND - RAISE NEARLY \$160,000 AT RIGHT TO LIFE DINNER

A coalition of pro-life supporters from the Illinois-Iowa-Wisconsin tri-state area converged on Dubuque, Iowa on the evening of April 4th for the annual fundraising dinner for Dubuque County Right to Life. (link provided at end.)

Over 500 attendees, representing individuals and many organizations throughout the region came to hear keynote speaker Mark Houck. He recapped the situation of the SWAT-team-led sunrise arrest at gun-point in front of his startled and crying children on September 23, 2022.

His "crime" in October of 2021 – almost a full year earlier – was defending his son who had been accosted and threatened while praying legally outside of a Planned Parenthood abortion center.

## It is the Mass that Matters (part 2)

From the inception of Freemasonry, pontiffs have warned the faithful against its dangers. Pope Leo XIII highlighted that the secret sect had attained such power in his days as to be in control of most all governments.

"But there (in the strange big church) all the work was being done mechanically (i.e., according to set rules and formula). Everything was being done, according to human reason. I saw all sorts of people, things, doctrines, and opinions. There was something proud, presumptuous, and violent about it, and they seemed to be very successful.

"I did not see a single Angel nor a single saint helping in the work. But far away in the background, I saw the seat of a cruel people armed with spears, and I saw a laughing figure which said: 'Do build it as solid as you can; we will put it to the ground'.


"I saw that many of the instruments in the new Church, such as spears and darts, were meant to be used against the living Church. Everyone dragged in something different: clubs, rods, pumps, cudgels, puppets, mirrors, trumpets, horns bellows – all sorts of things.

In the cave below (the sacristy) some people kneaded bread, but nothing came of it; it would not rise. The men in the little mantles brought wood to the steps of the pulpit to make a fire. They puffed and blew and labored hard, but the fire would not burn. All they produced was smoke and fumes. Then they broke a hole in the roof and ran up a pipe, but the smoke would not rise, and the whole place became black and suffocating. Some

## Of Mary There is Never Enough

### Queen of Martyrs

One of the titles we come across for Mary in the Litany of Loreto is “Queen of Martyrs.” St. Louis De Montfort tells us that Mary wanted nothing other than to remain hidden, to be less than nothing, unknown to the world. It was this humility that God loved most. This humility shines whenever we begin analyzing the life of our Blessed Mother.

Her title, “Queen of Martyrs” does not disappoint in how it is a fitting title and also provides the glimpse of her glorious humility. It shows her humility because even her martyrdom was hidden!

At first, the title seems open to scorn, for Mary was not martyred in body. Unlike other saints, she was not drawn and quartered, cooked on a gridiron, burnt at the stake, beheaded, shot full of arrows, or had nails driven through her fingernails. No, she “simply” accompanied her Son through His passion.

As always, because of her great humility, we must once again pull back the curtains a bit to understand that she is indeed worthy of the title “Queen of Martyrs,” and that her martyrdom was greater than all the other martyrdoms of other saints. This idea that her martyrdom was greater than all other saints is not a mere platitude, but really the case.

St. Alphonsus Liguori, in his *Glories of Mary* first highlights the innocence of Jesus.

*“This Son was the most amiable that can be imagined — innocent, virtuous, beautiful, who loved His mother most tenderly, so much so that He had never caused her the least displeasure, but had ever shown her all respect, obedience, and affection: hence had this mother placed all her affections on earth in this Son.”*

When we imagine our own children, innocent, tender, loving, with the glow of divine image behind their eyes, we cannot but feel the strongest of human affection. And these little ones are under the slavery

of original sin! For Mary it was not so! Her Son was the divinity; her Son had no imperfections. All that we admire in our own fallen children are mere dark reflections in comparison to the light Mary had before her to tenderly love.

We read in scripture that the Holy Spirit overshadowed Mary. At that moment, if not before, she became the most learned theologian in the mysteries of the Trinity, sitting in the most unique relation to the Trinity that any mere creature could.

She was daughter to the Father, mother to the Son, and spouse to the Holy Spirit. She captured all of the most intimate relations with the Trinity that a finite creature could.

With that power infused by God, St. De Montfort relates she had the ability to perform all miracles, but she never did out of humility. St. Alphonsus tells us that this uplifting into the mysteries of the Trinity most certainly made her aware, from the moment of the Annunciation, of the death her Son would have to endure. This, indeed, was part of her “fiat”!

St. Alphonsus relates that Mary’s martyrdom was the most intense and longest in duration of any of the martyrs.

How can this be if she was never martyred in body?

First, St. Thomas tells us that “to have the glory of martyrdom, it is sufficient to exercise obedience in its highest degree, that is to say, to be obedient unto death.”

Mary certainly exceeded this standard of obedience for she gave her fiat knowing the martyrdom it would entail. Mary, however, was not killed by the executioner, but by the “bitter sorrow of heart.”

We can here imagine the Immaculate heart of Mary surrounded by thorns as it is. St. Alphonsus runs through a myriad of quotes from saints about her bitter heart, and the way he interprets this is that her martyrdom resided in the soul. Again, this may seem a platitude because it’s not physical death, but a little reflection on “soul pain,” highlights the horror of her martyrdom in comparison to martyrs in body.

Many of us have experienced something like this “soul pain,” where there is no escaping the sorrow and it haunts at every level and in every waking moment. The soul pain of depression, or the loss of a loved one, or rejection by loved ones, or life failures, or the loss of a job, seems ubiquitous and inescapable.

When going through such sorrow our desire shifts to wishing for physical pain if it meant the spiritual pain would subside.

St. Thomas Aquinas, in asking the question of whether happiness consists in sense pleasures writes, “Therefore, sense, which is a power of the body, knows the singular, which is determinate through matter: whereas the intellect, which is a power independent of matter, knows the universal, which is abstracted from matter, and contains an infinite number of singulars. Consequently, it is evident that good which is fitting to the body, and which causes bodily delight through being apprehended by sense, is not man’s perfect good, but quite a trifle as compared with the good of the soul.” (ST 1-2 q.2 a.6).



The inverse of this logic holds true. The pain of the body, which causes pain through being apprehended by sense, is but a trifle as compared with the sorrow of the soul. Mary’s martyrdom was in the soul!

**St. Alphonsus also relates that Mary’s martyrdom was the longest in duration. The body expires after a time and the death of the “common” martyr happens relatively quickly when the body can no longer endure.**

We experience this temporality when doing penances. The pain is temporary and passes when the time is up. Mary’s time of martyrdom started at minimum at the Annunciation and carried through until the end of her earthly life.

She related in private revelations to St. Bridget that the sorrow of the passion haunted her until the end of her life and was with her every time she looked upon Jesus. How many millions of looks are passed between mother and son over a lifetime? How many millions of martyrdoms in soul!?

In granting Mary the title “Queen of Martyrs,” the Catholic Church does not err and is without hyperbole. Just as we owe her hyperdulia (great praise) as opposed to the dulia (praise) we owe the “common” saints, so too she deserves the greater praise as Queen of Martyrs, for she is the greatest of all the martyrs.

blew the horns so violently that the tears streamed from their eyes.

All in this church belonged to the earth, returned to the earth. All was dead, the work of human skill, a church of the latest style, a church of man's invention like the new heterodox church in Rome."

To bring about the destruction of all religion, Leo XIII states the Freemasons' strategy plainly:

Again, as all who offer themselves are received whatever may be their form of religion, they thereby teach the great error of this age — that regard for religion should be held as an indifferent matter, and that all religions are alike.

This manner of reasoning is calculated to bring about the ruin of all forms of religion, especially of the Catholic religion, which, as it is the only one that is true, cannot, without great injustice, be regarded as merely equal to other religions. (Humanum Genus, pa. 16)

The Freemasons' logic works like this: *If all religions are true, and are then compared, contradictions inevitably follow. But if they are all contradictory and at the same time true, then none are true.*

We have seen this play out culturally within the West over the last three centuries. Simply turn on any modern television program or movie and it is the religious that are made fools. Not because there does not exist a faith that can withstand worldly onslaught, but because there are false religions that cannot.

Bundle the one true faith with the false faiths under the category of "religion," and then fire away at the fools.

Rarely, if ever, do our cultural oligarchs challenge the Catholic Church head on. Rather they caricature it, or hold

individuals that are part of it to its own moral principles to embarrass it when it does not live up to its own exacting standards.

**Ironically, there is nothing more sane or logical than the Catholic faith.**

So, religious indifference is a plan of action to destroy all religion. Keeping in mind this has been the strategy and rule of action of the Freemasons, we turn to Pope Francis and the document he signed entitled, *Human Fraternity and World Peace and Living Together*.

He signed the document with a Mohammedan imam that recognized that all religions are alike, i.e. religious indifference. In the document it states: "The pluralism and the diversity of religions...are willed by God in His wisdom."

The Freemasonic principle of religious indifferentism warned about by Pope Leo XIII comes out even more strongly later in the document:

*In conclusion, our aspiration is that this Declaration may constitute an invitation to reconciliation and fraternity among all believers, indeed among believers and non-believers, and among all people of good will...an appeal to those who cherish the values of tolerance and fraternity that are promoted and encouraged by religions...*

Living together peaceably is certainly a noble goal. But when we know the principle of religious indifferentism is a tool utilized by the enemies of religion to destroy religion, and we read words like the above, can we be justified in asking whether this is soft language being utilized to destroy religion, and most egregiously the (one true) Catholic religion?

Fraternity has long been one of the principles of Freemasonry. When the Freemasons of the 19th Century claimed they aimed at a "revolution in Tiara and cope," and we see documents signed by the

Pope about fraternity seemingly aiming at religious pluralism, is it fair to ask if this pluralism is the camel's nose under the tent with a target of indifferentism?

Does this aim suggest the mind of the Church has been captured and eclipsed by those men who claimed its capture as their goal?

As we saw from St. Maximilian Kolbe in 1917:

*It (Freemasonry) did not even hesitate to brandish in the streets of the City during the festivities in honor of Giordano Bruno, a black flag showing the Archangel St. Michael beneath the feet of Lucifer, still less did they hesitate to brandish masonic insignia beneath the windows of the Vatican.*

*A reckless hand felt no repugnance in writing: Satan will rule in the Vatican and the Pope will serve him in the uniform of the Swiss Guard, and other things of that kind. This mortal hatred for the Church was not just a prank on the part of deranged individuals, but a systematic action proceeding from the principle of Freemasonry: Destroy all religion, whatever it may be, especially the Catholic religion.*

With the Vatican broadcasting "Fraternity," is it fair to ask if we are living the fulfillment of Our Lady and Emmerich's prophecies?? +


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# Christ Calls for the Conversion of — Not Collaboration With — the Marxist and Masonic Enemies of His Church

The infiltration of Marxist and Masonic ideologies upon every facet of modern life—manifest as an inversion of God's truth and morality in societal norms, education, government, and religion.

Duly reported by now was the Vatican's hosting of a Marxist-Christian dialogue in January, earlier this year. Pope Francis freely encouraged the interaction while, moreover, conspicuously neglecting to mention Christ, Christianity, or the fact that the Catholic Church has a long history of decided condemnation of Marxist Communism. Similar disconcerting dealings include Cardinal Francesco Coccopalmerio's presiding over a Masonic conference in February in which he renewed requests for a "permanent dialogue" with Freemasonry.

"Dialogue" is an important theme to Masons, as expressed by the Grand Master Gustavo Raffi upon Francis' election: he celebrated the hope for "a Church of the people [which] may...

dialogue with...Freemasonry.... This is the 'white smoke' that [Masons] are waiting for from the Church of our time." Yet, like Communism, membership in Freemasonry remains forbidden due to irreconcilable differences with Church doctrine.

Papal condemnation of Marxism and Freemasonry, in fact, goes back to just after the founding of these movements, the mid-nineteenth and mid-eighteenth centuries, respectively. Membership in either is strictly forbidden by Mother Church, disallowing the reception of Holy Communion for affiliates (and full excommunication by some Church councils). Collaboration with Communists was warned against as recently as Pope Benedict XVI's Deus Caritas Est, even on the level of charitable activity, in that Catholic charity must be centrally such rather than effectively supportive of other ideologies. And paradoxically, just late last year, the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith reaffirmed the Church's ban on Catholics joining Freemasonry.

## Coalition For Canceled Priests Questions & Answers

We regularly receive questions regarding priests who may have been canceled. We will address these questions here along with further clarification as needed.

### Has my priest been canceled?

As you might expect, we are not free to disclose this information since it is a personnel matter within the diocese. This information is confidential between the priest and his bishop.

It is the individual priest or the diocese that may disclose this information. As you might expect, making this news public can often make reconciliation between a bishop and his priest difficult.

Our role is to process the priests application to the Coalition as it is submitted for assistance and then to provide guidance for his return to his priestly vocation as soon as possible.

### What can I do to help a canceled priest?

The most valuable thing anyone can do for the priest is pray for them. Eucharistic adoration, spending time alone with Our Lord, is perfect for praying for your active priest, a canceled priests, and priests everywhere. Do not forget to pray for your bishops as well!

### Do you have housing available for canceled priests?

Most priests who come to us for help want to stay in their home region and might ask for financial assistance to pay rent. Most prefer to stay within the communities they served or near their family and friends.

### Can the laity help with housing?

If you mean to provide housing, we do have a database of donors who have offered rooms in their homes or entire homes to needy priests, but we have not needed to ask for this help. †



I went to confession, although not as often as I should have, and not with true contrition, and certainly not with the ardent desire to stop committing my sins.



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
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
