OCTOBER IS THE MONTH OF THE MOST HOLY ROSARY OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY: two major feast days are commemorated in the month of October:

First, October 7th-the Feast of the Most Holy Rosary-commemorates the victory over the invading Muslims of the Ottoman Empire at the Battle of Lepanto, north of the Gulf of Corinth, in the year 1571, wherein Pope Pius V marshaled the naval forces of Naples, Spain and Venice to thwart the invaders threatening Western Christianity massacring the Faithful and destroying both Orthodox and Catholic Churches in the southern Balkans. A large procession & recitation of the Rosary, invoking the intercession of Our Lady, was prayed in Rome at St. Peter's Square. Before entering battle, the soldiers knelt down to pray the Rosary. After a five-hour battle, they were victorious in defeating the invading Muslim Turks at this decisive maritime battle.

Second, next Sunday, October 13th will commemorate the final apparition of Our Lady to 3 shepherd children outside of Fatima, Portugal. Our Lady requested that everyone reverently pray the Holy Rosary in reparation for the many blasphemies, offenses, and sins committed against Almighty G D.

We continue to pray through Our Lady's intercession for the protection, the growth, and, the holiness of the Holy Church of Christ, Our G D on Earth, and for the salvation of souls.

FEAST OF THE MOST HOLY ROSARY: is Saturday, October 7th commemorating the victory of the Naval Forces at Battle of Lepanto. During her 6 apparitions to the 3 children of Fatima, the Blessed Virgin asked everyone to pray the Holy Rosary.

FEAST OF ST. FRANCIS: this Wednesday, October 4^{th} marks the feast of one of the most beloved and celebrated Saints, of the Western Church- St. Francis of Assisi, who was baptized Giovanni – John. Giovanni's father, Giovanni Bernardone was a wealthy cloth merchant from Assisi who married a French woman of a noble family. The young boy was greatly influenced by his French mother, who taught him the French language; he became enamored of all things French. This being so, his father nicknamed him "Francesco" – "the little Frenchman," a name by which he has been exclusively known. After rejecting his father's wealth and entering Monastic life, Francis became a Mystic, who received the Five Wounds of Christ's Crucifixion, known by the Greek name- τa $\Sigma \tau \gamma \mu a \tau a$ – the Stigmata-the Wounds. In a vision, Our LORD appeared to Francesco and told him to "rebuild My Church." By his preaching and miraculous intervention, he brought many lapsed Christians back to the Holy Faith. Francesco was also known to have communicated with animals, who followed his dictates, which is why his feast day is also known for the Blessing of the Animals. He died during the late hours of October 3, 1226 at the age of 44, during the recitation of Psalm 141: "O LORD, to You I call; hasten to me; hearken to my voice when I call upon You. Let my prayer come like incense before You; the lifting of my hands, like the Evening Sacrifice."

Feast of the Most Holy Rosary October 7th



The Chaplet of the Rosary emerged from the practice of Lay Brothers who worked in the fields doing manual labor who did not have time to pray the entire 150 Psalms of the *Monastic Office*. They therefore substituted it by praying the *Hail Mary* 150 times distinguished in groups of 10 followed by the *Lord's Prayer* and a *Glory Be*.

In 1208 in an apparition to St. Dominic, Our Lady bestowed upon him a Chaplet of beads divided into groups of 5, wherein the *Our Father* was followed by a *Hail Mary* prayed 10 times, while meditation on the Mysteries of Our LORD's life. Our Lady taught him that each prayer represented a rose. This is how the chaplet came to be known by the name "*Rosary*," meaning a *crown of roses*. In some countries, esp., Italy, the chaplet is known as "*la Corona-*" the Crown.

In 1213, the praying of the Chaplet of the Rosary & the intercession of Our Lady were both attributed to the defeat of the *Albigensan (Cathar) Heresy*.

In 1529 the Rosary was prayed by soldiers before entering battle at the Siege of Vienna, resulting in a great victory against Muslims Turks invading the Balkans.

On October 7, 1571, Muslims were again threatening to invade Western Europe to destroy Christianity. A large procession & recitation of the Rosary, invoking the intercession of Our Lady, was prayed in Rome at St. Peter's Square. The Muslims were defeated at the decisive maritime battle fought at the Bay of Lepanto north of the Sea of Corinth. Before entering battle, the soldiers knelt down to pray the Rosary. After a five hour battle they were victorious in defeating the invaders.

After news of this victory reached the Holy Father, Pope Pius V attributed it to Our Lady's intercession, and in thanksgiving, established this feast as Our Lady of Victory on October 7th; the name was later changed to the *Feast of the Most Holy Rosary*.

In 1913, when Our Lady appeared to the 3 children of Fatima, she taught them to add: "Oh My Jesus! Forgive us our sins, save us from the fire of Hell, lead all souls to Heaven, especially those in most need of Thy mercy. Amen.".
