FROM THE PASTOR:

ACCOUNTABILITY SUNDAY: the Parish Financial Statements for the 2022 – 2023 period have been posted on our Parish website; to view please access: holycrosschurchfairfield.com.

THE HOLY ADVENT SEASON: begins this weekend December 2nd/3rd with the start of the 4:30 Vigil Mass initiating the Liturgical year of Grace of 2024. The Sunday Readings will follow Cycle B; the weekday Readings will follow Cycle II.

The color for Advent is violet which reflects the period of awaiting and preparing for the birth of the Messiah-Our Lord Jesus Christ. In this spirit of awaiting, the *GLORIA* is omitted during Advent Masses.

We are all reminded to observe Advent as the preparation for the Nativity of the Son of G_D which we celebrate at Christmas. Remember, despite all the secular trappings, Christmas is about the birth of the Holy Child-the Son of G_D made man, so, let us truly rejoice at the coming of the Light from Heaven Who illuminates our life with comfort, peace, and joy as we await His second coming at the end of the Ages, and, our entrance into the glory of Heaven.

The name "Advent" was adopted from Latin adventus "coming; arrival", translating Greek Παρουσία - parousia. In the New Testament, this is the term used for the Second Coming of Christ. Thus, the season of Advent in the Christian calendar anticipates the "coming of the Messiah" from three different perspectives: the physical Nativity in Bethlehem; the reception of Christ in the heart of the individual Believer; and, the Eschatological Second Coming-at the end of the Ages.

According to Saint Gregory of Tours the celebration of Advent began in the fifth century when Bishop Perpetuus directed that starting with the St. Martin's Day on the 11th of November until Christmas, one fasts three times per week; this is why Advent was sometimes also named "*Lent of St. Martin.*" This practice originated in the diocese of Tours and continued until the sixth century.

The Council of Macon held in 581 adopted the practice in Tours and soon all France observed three days of fasting a week from the feast of Saint Martin until Christmas. The most devout worshipers in some countries exceeded the requirements adopted by the Council of Macon, and fasted every day of Advent. By the time of Gregory the Great, (590 - 604) the Liturgical Advent season had been abbreviated to four weeks without the observance of obligatory fast.

HOLY DAY OF OBLIGTION - SOLEMNITY OF THE IMMNACULATE CONCEPTION: is Friday, December 8th celebrating the event of the conception of Blessed Mary by her mother, St. Anne. From her mother's womb, Mary was chosen by Almighty G_D to reverse the sin of Eve by her humble and perfect obedience to the Will of G_D. It was through Mary that the Savior or the world was born.

There will be two Masses on Friday, December 8th: the usual 9:00 am Mass, and a 5:30 pm Mass. Mark your calendars and don't forget to honor the Blessed Virgin Mary for her role in our Salvation.

FEASTDAY OF OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE: Tuesday, December 12th marks the final of four apparitions of the Blessed Virgin Mary to Juan Diego at Tepeyac, outside of Mexico City. As a result of these apparitions, Aztec human sacrifices were ended as many indigenous peoples accepted Christianity and were Baptized into the holy Christian Faith.

HOLY ADVENT SEASON ADVENT I



The Holy Season of Advent has its origins in the 4th Century, when it became custom to celebrate a festival beginning on the Eve of St. Martin of Tours-November 11. This day falls 40 days before the celebration of the birth of the Messiah at Christmas. People all over Europe, esp. in France, celebrated this great feast with grapes and wine tasting (drinking) the new wine of the season.

Winemakers tasted each other's wine-eventually it became known as the day of the "baptism of the wine" an event which evolved into a major festival of eating, drinking and dancing, ending at midnight of the feast day. In the Slavic country (Slovenija) it came to be known as Martinovanje-or St. Martin's Fast-in honor of St. Martin. St. Martin Day then began a 40 day - 6 weeks-season of fast & abstinence similar to that of Lent.

The Church eventually named this period of fast & abstinence "Adventus" -Latin for "the Coming," anticipating the coming of the Messiah. During this time, all drinking, dancing, and eating of meats was forbidden, so as a means of atonement to prepare spiritually for the coming of the Messiah without temporal distraction, but with spiritual anticipation.

Although currently Advent has only 4 weeks as is represented by the Advent Wreath, initially, it was 6 weeks in length. The 4th Sunday in both Advent & Lent were seen as half way points in each season, when the harshness of the fast was mitigated or softened. These Sundays became known as *Gaudete* and *Laetare* Sundays respectively. Prior to these Sundays, the theme of the Readings is the call to await the coming of the Messiah-Our LORD, Jesus Christ. After these Sundays, the theme and the Readings focus on the Mysteries surrounding the birth, the Passion & Death of the Son of G_D respectively.

Hence, Advent is a time to reflect on our relationship with G_D, and a time to prepare to for the birth of His Son on the day we call "Christ's Mass" i.e., Christmas.

Unfortunately, in our day, Christmas has become a secular holiday, where vendors stress the commercial aspect of gift buying and giving to increase their profits, without any regard for the true reason of the season-the birth of the Son of G_D-the Messiah. Advent is a reminder and a call to focus, reflect and celebrate the beginning of Salvation with the birth of the Son of G_D-Jesus the Christ at Christmas. REMEMBER: Keep Christmas in Christ!
